Introduction

s part of the responsibility to promote and protect the well-being of Alaskans, the Alaska Department of Health and Social Services provides a broad array of health and human services supported through grants to nonprofit agencies, Alaska Native entities, and municipalities around the state. Grants issued to date are first tabulated in reports by program, with a subsequent report providing a summary of grants by Election District. Significant changes have been implemented within the department this year, with strategies designed to improve statewide service coordination and delivery. Those who are familiar with the department's programs and this annual publication will note an increase in program funding combined with a considerable reduction in the total number of grants. This reduction has been accomplished through consolidation of grants to help ease the administrative and reporting burden for grantee agencies, and by supporting ongoing efforts to integrate and improve related services.

In fiscal year 2006, more than \$137 million of the department's annual budget is estimated for award through grants, with additional services supported through contracts and Provider Agreements, where those mechanisms better serve the targeted populations. The department and its employees continue their commitment to the provision of responsive and effective community-based services.

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Alaska Traumatic Brain Injury Advisory Board (ATBIAB)

Authority: AS 47.30 Community Mental Health Services; 7AAC 78 Grant Programs

Priorities: The State of Alaska conducted a federally funded two-year planning process, which culminated in the creation of the ATBIAB, identification of the Division of Behavioral Health (DBH) as a lead state agency and formulation of a state plan. The State of Alaska has identified an acute need for support and services for individuals with Traumatic Brain Injuries (TBI) and their families. In addition to other activities, the ATBIABs function is to conduct Advisory Board quarterly meetings for purposes of overseeing statewide planning for program services and support. At least one quarterly meeting per year will be held in a rural location.

Target Group: Services are provided statewide to Alaskans with a Traumatic Brain Injury and their families.

- **Resource Allocation:** The appropriation of funding for the ATBIAB is specifically identified in the State of Alaska's approved federal grant from the Health Resources Services Administration (HRSA) and the Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority.
 - Criteria: Criteria for awarding this grant is derived from regulation 7 AAC 78.095(a)2, as the ATBIAB is the only agency with the capability to accomplish the goals of the grant project; being specifically identified as the sub-recipient in the State of Alaska's federally approved TBI Implemention grant.
 - Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Behavioral Health.

Alcohol Safety Action Program (Adult & Juvenile)

Authority: AS 47.37 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act; 7AAC 78 Grant Programs.

- **Priorities:** Priorities of the program are alcohol and substance abuse screening, referral, and monitoring education or treatment requirements of misdemeanor cases. Quarterly reports and program reviews demonstrating performance and Advisory Board recommendations are also considerations. Each program has an adult component and may have a juvenile component.
- **Target Group:** Adult ASAP: Services are intended for clients who have a current or pending misdemeanor criminal case. Most clients are referred directly from the court as a condition of their sentence, although they may be assigned prior to their conviction as a condition of release.

Juvenile ASAP: Services are intended for clients who are served for adolescent assessment, referral, and treatment related to underage drinking and drug offenses. Juvenile ASAP serves clients aged 14-21 who have been convicted of a minor consuming, minor in possession, or tobacco violation. Most clients are referred directly from the court as a condition of their sentence, although they may be assigned prior to their conviction as a condition of release.

- **Resource Allocation:** Criteria for allocation of funds for these services are 1) cost per case; 2) size of caseload and; 3) support of the local justice system. Geographic consideration is based on the number of cases in each court location. Award of Juvenile Alcohol Safety Action Program funding is made only to grantees that currently have an adult ASAP infrastructure in place. A 25% match is required except where reduced by approved exemption.
 - **Criteria:** Criteria for awarding grants are derived from statute and regulation and include evaluation of component costs, budget summary and narrative, program narrative, and goals and objectives. Recommendations are made by an evaluation of statistical data reported from the courts and the information provided in applications. Final funding decisions are made by the Commissioner of Health and Social Services.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Behavioral Health.

- **Priorities:** To enhance behavioral health services and quality of life for all Alaskans by providing leadership, which ensures high quality, affordable behavioral health services.

Target Group: This grant targets primary providers of behavioral health services in Alaska.

Resource Allocation: Funds for this grant are identified in the Division of Behavioral Health Federal Block Grant.

Criteria: The Alaska Behavioral Health Association is the only statewide association eligible under 7 AAC 78.030, whose members are the primary providers of behavioral health services in Alaska.

Bridge Home - Housing and Housing Retention Support Services

Authority: AS 37.14.041 and AS 47.30.056 Use of Trust Settlement Income Account; 7 AAC 78 DHSS Grant Programs

Priorities: The Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority allocated funding for grants to provide rental subsidies and related housing costs, as well as residential support services, for up to 40 adult individuals. Participants will receive intensive, on-site residential support services and living skills development, as well as supportive employment training. 24-hour outreach services will be available to respond in time of need.

This program provides funding to address a critical gap in our system for long-term housing assistance to a population that is excluded from current programs. Clients are offered a chance to demonstrate the ability to remain in stable housing and reestablish eligibility for the HUD Housing Choice Voucher program.

- **Target Group:** The pilot Bridge Home program targets adults who are exiting institutions with a serious, chronic mental illness and a history of cycling from the Department of Corrections, Alaska Psychiatric Institute and homelessness.
- **Resource Allocation:** This is a demonstration project to begin in the Anchorage area with a single grant to provide services to the highest density target population. The pilot is anticipated to be made available to other Alaska communities in the future.
 - **Criteria:** The successful proposal must demonstrate a thorough understanding of the goals and outcomes anticipated by the Department and the project must meet or exceed the anticipated outcomes. Program goals include: ensuring public safety; reducing criminal and clinical recidivism; providing a supported housing alternative to corrections; assisting clients to achieve self-sufficiency by accessing mainstream resources, such as a social security benefits and federal housing subsidies; and demonstrating the overall cost savings to the State of Alaska for the use of supported housing vs. institutionalization.
 - Appropriation: Funding is appropriated to the Division of Behavioral Health.

- Authority: AS 18.08.010, AS 44.29.150, AS 47.30.477, AS 47.30.520 620, AS 47.37 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act, and 7 AAC 71.010 - 71.300 Community Mental Health Services; 7 AAC 29, State Standards for Alcoholism Programs and 7 AAC 78 DHSS Grant Programs
- **Priorities:** The program goal is to enhance or establish an array of services statewide through pilot projects to ensure that all children in out-ofstate custody have appropriate treatment options within their community or close to their families. Having treatment options and family support within their own community enhances the child's likelihood of success for returning home. Pilot projects include enhancing inhome treatment services and resources for the prevention of crisis situations; crisis nursery/treatment preschool; individualized support services for transitional aged youth 16-21; mental health respite/stabilization homes; treatment resource homes; therapeutic group homes; and individualized high risk therapeutic group homes.
- Target Group: The program serves children in out-of-state treatment care; children aged 1-10 in need of crisis treatment, and transitional aged youth, aged 16-21, in need of individualized support services.

Resource Allocation: Programs and funding have been allocated statewide.

Criteria: Eligibility criteria for this program includes the criteria found in 7 AAC 78.030, and requires the applicant have the ability to bill Medicaid. Applicants, as well as their proposed project partners must have prior experience providing similar services.

Appropriation: Grant funds for this program were allocated to the Division of Behavioral Health from the Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority.

Comprehensive Behavioral Health Prevention and Early Intervention Services

- Authority: AS 47.37 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act; AS 47.37.045 Community Action Against Substance Abuse; AS 47.30.475 Grant-in-aid program; AS 47.30.470-AS 47.30.500; Public Health Service Act, as amended, Title V, Part B, Section 501(d)(5), 42 U.S.C. 290aa; State FAS Comprehensive and Integrated Project. 7AAC 78 Grant Programs. The suicide prevention funding is based on recommendations contained in the March 1988 report of the Senate Special Committee on Suicide Prevention.
- **Priorities:** The goal of this program is to provide comprehensive, integrated behavioral health prevention and early intervention services related to substance use and abuse, suicide, fetal alcohol spectrum disorders, youth development and resiliency, and promotion of community, family and individual wellness across Alaska. This program is representative of the new focus of Division of Behvioral Health on a broader behavioral health direction to integrate social and health services into intertwined holistic services that will lead to improvement in our suicide rates, family wellness, reduced drinking among teens and adults, healthy pregnancies free of alcohol-related disabilities, and stronger and healthier communities, families and individuals.
- Target Group: Statewide, focusing on prevention and early intervention services across the life span (all ages). Primary focus will be on the individuals we know are at higher risk including children whose parents have a problem with alcohol and/or drug addiction and dependency. Attention will be given to regional location of grant programs, making sure there is a fair distribution of grant funds across the state and among rural and urban populations.
- **Resource Allocation:** Funding is from a combination of federal funding, general funds and alcohol tax funds. A 25% match is required except where reduced by approved exemption.
 - **Criteria:** Eligible applicants include nonprofit organizations; municipalities and Regional Educational Attendance Areas or other political subdivisions of the state; other State agencies; Alaska Native Tribes; or a combination of these entities. Funding is issued through a statewide competitive solicitation process. Proposals are solicited that address the goal of promoting communities utilizing effective practices and partnerships.

Proposals are categorized in four (4) categories based on community size and agencies offering multi-programs or programs to multicommunities. Proposals must contain tangible evidence of participation in community association, partnership or collaborative agreements that will enhance the applicants ability to achieve program goals and desired outcomes.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Behavioral Health.

Integration of mental health and substance abuse treatment services, an EBP, was the first major step in developing a phased statewide behavioral health system. Pilot projects under this program represent additional steps towards implementing program designs that current evidence suggest will be the most successful therapeutic and cost effective program models.
- **Target Group:** Women and Children programs deliver services for addressing special treatment needs of women with children, for women with substance abuse problems: health services, mental health treatment, child care, transportation, safe housing and parenting skills training, as well as problems arising from histories of domestic violence and sexual assault. Youth with Families programs deliver services for adolescents and their families, addressing unique treatment needs of adolescents and issues that play significant roles in their lives, such as cognitive, emotional, physical, social and moral development, and family and peer environment.

Illness Self-Management & Recovery refers to peer-facilitated services to help people cope with mental illness more effectively and facilitate their ability to care for themselves. Collaboration between consumer organizations and community mental health centers are encouraged to maximize resources, and share expertise.

Supported Employment - Competitive work in integrated work settings, consistent with the resources, priorities, abilities, and informed choice of individuals for whom competitive employment has not traditionally occurred, has been interrupted or intermittent as a result of a significant disability.

SED Children and Youth with FASD program promotes development of an Alaskan model, combining promising practices in wraparound for children and youth with SED, with research contributing to the evidence base of best practices for treating children with FASD. This project is intended to provide needed individualized services, and add to the evidence base for promising practices for children and youth with these multiple diagnoses.

Resource Allocation: Funding is allocated statewide.

Criteria: Grantees provide independent project evaluation to assess the process and outcome of evidence based practices delivered.

Appropriation: Grant funds are appropriated to the Division of Behavioral Health.

- Authority: AS 47.30.056 Use of money in the mental health trust settlement income account; AS 47.30.475-477 Grant-in-aid program; AS 47.30.520-620 Community Mental Health Services Act; AS 47.37 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act; 7 AAC 78 Grant Programs.
- **Priorities:** This grant program makes funds available for the development and operation of Family Recovery Camps. These camps are intended to promote the health and preservation of Alaskan families and communities by providing substance abuse treatment services to individuals and their families, and by reducing or eliminating the abuse of alcohol, other drugs, and inhalants. This program differs from other treatment programs in that it is community-based, located in rural settings, admits and works with all family members, and relies heavily on the use of culturally-relevant treatment modalities. This project is perceived by the Mental Health Trust to have high potential for partnering. Opportunities to form partnerships with other funding entities are encouraged. While no specific amount of match (in kind or cash) is required, the project requires significant resources from local communities and/or other tribal entities.
- **Target Group:** The primary target populations for family recovery camp services are those persons and families whose presenting problem is addiction to, dependency on, or chronic, disabling use or abuse of alcohol or other drugs, including prescribed and over-the-counter medications and household general use products that contain inhalant chemicals and substances.
- **Resource Allocation:** Resources are allocated to rural settings, statewide, with grants initially determined through competitive solicitation.
 - **Criteria:** Proposals are evaluated based on criteria established in the solicitation. Grant applicants are required to describe their organization and project management structure, previous grants, program description and description of individuals to be served. A complete description of equipment to be purchased, coupled with the program need is also required. The applicants must provide information on their project's financial feasibility. Evaluation recommendations are submitted to the Commissioner of the Department of Health and Social Services, who has final authority over approval of the grant awards.
 - Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Behavioral Health.

Independent Case Management and Flexible Supports

Authority: AS 47.30.520-620 Community Mental Health Services Act; 7 AAC 78 Grant Programs.

Priorities: Independent Case Management offers an option, especially in larger communities, of case management services by independent entities as an alternative to services from local community mental health centers. This allows consumer choice for this crucial service, in turn promoting increased accountability in the system of care. Independent case managers help initiate and attain appropriate housing, and employment services, along with other community support services.

Flexible Support Services are linked with the Recovery by Choice concept, which was designed to reduce recidivism at the Alaska Psychiatric Institute. The intention is to bring intensive services in a community setting to people identified as at risk of re-hospitalization and is an adaptation of assertive community treatment models across the nation. Flexible Support Services are also designed to validate consumers' recognition of their need and understanding of necessary and effective services prior to the existence of an emergency situation. Funding for these services would be available only if other sources are not available in a timely manner. Specific limits on expenditures per client will be established. Eligible services could include medications, psychiatric care, counseling, peer support, medical care, housing or other emergent necessities.

Target Group: Serious mentally ill person means a person who is 18 years of age or older and who satisfies both of the following criteria:

1. Must be diagnosed as having a major Psychotic or Mood Disorder or another serious persistent mental disorder; and

2. Must have impaired role functioning, consisting of at least two of the following:

a. Social role: an inability to function independently in the role of worker, student, or homemaker;

b. Daily living skills: an inability to engage independently in personal care (grooming, personal hygiene, etc.) or community living activities (handling personal finances, using community resources, performing household chores, etc.); or

c. Social acceptability: an inability to exhibit appropriate social behavior, which results in demand for intervention by the mental health and/or judicial system.

- **Resource Allocation:** This is a new program funded through the Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority. Independent Case Management funds requested are for startup costs, which will transition to Medicaid billing as agencies establish operations.
 - **Criteria:** The intent of this project is prevention of institutionalization, promoting service effectiveness, choice, recovery, and accountability, all within a consumer-centric perspective.

Appropriation: Funds are appropriated to the Division of Behavioral Health.

Rural Human Service System

Criteria for awarding grants are derived from statute and regulation and evaluation of applications includes proposed costs, project description and goals. Recommendations are based on evaluation of the information provided in applications.

Non-secure attendant care shelters assist the State in complying with the first three core mandates by providing short-term staff -secure placement and facilities for youth who do not require secure detention. This provides an alternative to incarceration until a parent or legal guardian can be located or until the youth can be transported to another facility.

Target Group: The target group is youth who are in need of protective custody and/or youth who do not require secure detention.

Resource Allocation: Allocations are made to communities according to the service demand in each area.

Native Family Assistance Program

In some areas, the Native Organization will operate a regional program that includes all families eligible for assistance, regardless of race, when this is the most efficient approach and there is agreement between the State and the Native Organization. The service area is defined by the Native Organization to include all or some communities located within the federally recognized Native Organization's region.

Resource Allocation: Allocation of funds is based on the grantees' share of statewide clients and available state general funds.

- **Criteria:** The criteria for the award of funds is that the grantee administers a Native Family Assistance Program, approved and authorized by the federal government.

Transportation Services

Priorities: Accessible, reliable transportation remains out of reach for a majority of Alaska's Temporary Assistance clients. This is particularly true for Matanuska-Susitna Borough, Kenai, and Fairbanks Temporary Assistance families. In Mat-Su and Kenai, grant funding under this program will assist local non-profit transportation entities develop the necessary match for two earmarked federal Job Access and Reverse Commute (JARC) grants. The intent of these federal grants is to promote more systematic approaches to alleviate transportation barriers by the expansion of existing, or the creation of new transportation systems.

In Fairbanks, funding under this program will be used to continue Temporary Assistance client transportation services provided by the Love INC Call-A-Ride Transportation program. Love INC is the only organization in the Fairbanks North Star Borough that provides free transportation services to Temporary Assistance clients.

- Target Group: Alaska Temporary Assistance families who live in the Matanuska-Susitna Borough, Kenai Peninsula, and the Fairbanks North Star Borough.
- **Resource Allocation:** Allocation in the Mat-Su Borough and Kenai Peninsula is based on providing 20% of the anticipated operating costs for one year of services. In Fairbanks, allocation is based on providing funding for a full-time transportation coordinator, 30% funding for a program manager, and costs for hotline and voice mail software.
 - **Criteria:** A request for alternative method of solicitation was approved to allow an award to Mat-Su Community Transit, the only public transportation service available in the Matanuska-Susitna Borough eligible to receive JARC funds; Central Area Rural Transport System, the only public transportation service on the Kenai Peninsula eligible for JARC funding; and Love INC in Fairbanks, the only organization in the area that provides free transportation services to Temporary Assistance clients.

Transportation Services

Abstinence Education Program

- Authority: AS 44.29.020; AS 47.05.015; 7AAC 78 DHSS Grant Programs; and Section 510 of the Title V (Maternal Child Health) Block Grant provides limited funds for abstinence education
- **Priorities:** The primary purpose of this grant program is to provide funds for abstinence education to students in grades 7 and 8, and their parents, through peer outreach and education. The program is also available to high school aged students who serve as peer educators in the program.
- **Target Group:** The target audience for this funding is middle school students, before they have become sexually active. Research has found that prevention efforts are most effective when they are started before the concerning behavior has begun. Selected high school students will be trained to become cross-age, peer educators of the Postponing Sexual Involvement (PSI) curriculum for middle school students.
- **Resource Allocation:** Funds will be awarded to one agency, which is located in a community with a school district that has at least three years of experience with the PSI project. Due to the limited amount of funding available, PSI will be coordinated by one local, non-profit, youth-serving agency, able to work with six school districts in the state, which are implementing the PSI curriculum. These school districts currently are the Kenai Peninsula Borough, Mat-Su Borough, Fairbanks/North Star Borough, Ketchikan, Kodiak, and Juneau School districts.
 - **Criteria:** The criteria for awarding funds includes a match of local cash or in-kind services in the amount of 3 non-federal dollars to every four federal dollars, agreement to comply with the federal and state abstinence education definitions/criteria, completion of all state and federal program reports and evaluations, and inclusion of a youth-adult partnership and a training component. Participating schools must: 1) document their history of experience working with peer education programs; and 2) have youth involved in planning, and teaching and evaluation. The Abstinence Education coordination agency also must have: 1) experience delivering health education and promotion efforts for adolescents; 2) experience working with school districts; 3) experience working with peer education programs; 4) have youth as members of program planning, evaluation, or governance; and 5) experience coordinating conferences, training or other events for other agencies/schools regionally or statewide.

Breast & Cervical Health

Authority: AS 44.29.020, AS 47.05.015; and DHSS Grant Regulations 7AAC 78.

- **Priorities:** Services required from the organizations receiving these grants must include a variety of outreach efforts that are creatively specific to the community. All activities are designed to bring women of the target population to screening for breast and cervical cancer.
- **Target Group:** The target groups include income eligible women who are at or below 250% of the poverty level and who are under or uninsured and are not covered by Medicaid or Medicare for these services. Income eligible women age 18 to 64 receive a clinical breast exam, pelvic exam and cervical cancer screening; women 50-64 years of age may also receive a screening mammogram. Geographic areas served include those towns or cities where one or more medical providers with a signed Breast and Cervical Health Check (BCHC) Provider Agreement are operating, and which have the capacity to accept referrals for screening into their clinical practice; and where BCHC one-to-one outreach projects are currently operational.
- **Resource Allocation:** Grant funds are awarded to communities who have a BCHC screening provider who has indicated a willingness to accept women into their clinical practice recruited through outreach. Resources are allocated based on screening provider capacity, community need and available funding from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
 - **Criteria:** Criteria for awarding funds are based on the needs experienced by or projected for an area, federal priorities, and the amount of federal funds received. Grantees must demonstrate knowledge of community assessment and successful one-to-one outreach methods which allow the grantee to find, refer and provide assistance in getting hard to reach women into screening services. Quarterly progress and financial reports are required, along with any specified deliverables. The Division may require changes in project activities based on project evaluation, and will develop methodologies for implementing such changes in consultation with the grantee.

Clinical Family Planning Services

Authority: Title X, Family Planning; AS 44.29.020 and 7 AAC 78 DHSS Grant Programs.

Priorities: Kachemak Bay Family Planning Clinic (KBFPC) provides confidential, clinical family planning services to approximately 1000 lowincome women and men on the lower Kenai Peninsula. Services include clinical breast examinations, Pap smear screening and pelvic examination, counseling and screening for sexually transmitted diseases and a contraceptive method. In addition to clinical services, KBFPC provides client education and referral to other local agencies regarding infant adoption, abstinence education and other riskreduction counseling.

Target Group: This program serves low-income women and men residing on the lower Kenai Peninsula.

- **Resource Allocation:** The Division of Public Health receives federal funding awarded by the Office of Population Affairs (OPA) to administer the Title X Family Planning Services grant for high-risk, low-income women and men. As a recipient of funds through the federal Title X Family Planning Services Program, KBFPC must follow very strict Title X policies and procedures for determining eligibility and enrolling women and men.
 - **Criteria:** Historically, there have been limited family planning funds available in Alaska. In order to ensure that funds were allocated to areas with the highest need, the census areas with the highest number of unintended births (based on Alaska Pregnancy Risk Assessment Monitoring data) were identified as priority areas for family planning funds. The Kenai Peninsula census area has the third highest number of unintended births in the state, and KBFPC is the only non-profit provider of clinical family planning services to low income women and men on the lower Kenai Peninsula. Providers in the census areas with more unintended births have been able to identify other funding sources to continue to provide limited family planning services to low income women who are not eligible for Medicaid. KBFPC is the only agency with no other funding sources for this care, and would have to terminate family planning services to approximately 1000 low-income, non-Medicaid eligible women and men if they did not receive Title X funds. KBFPC has been approved by OPA/Title X as a family planning provider.

Community Health Aide Training and Supervision

Authority: AS 44.29.020 and AS 18.28.010; 7 AAC 78 DHSS DHSS Grant Programs

- **Priorities:** Services are for the training and supervision of Community Health Aides (CHAs) and Community Health Practitioners (CHPs). The training is established by and monitored by the Academic Review Committee and the Review and Approval Committee; committees established by and under the direction of the Community Health Aide Director's Association.
- **Target Group:** CHA/Ps are located predominantly in the rural areas where more advanced medical personnel are unavailable. These grants target the CHA/Ps themselves and the rural population they serve. All regional and local health organizations that receive contract funds from the federal government for a community health aide program are eligible for funding through this program. The program provides funding for CHAs to complete approximately 2,500 training courses, including CHA training, ETT/EMT training, and continuing medical education. Additionally, CHA supervisors are expected to make over 15,000 contacts with CHAs as part of training and supervision. Finally, CHAs are expected to have close to 300,000 patient encounters during each fiscal year. These projections are based on required self-reporting.
- **Resource Allocation:** The funding level is derived from a formula established during the 1985 legislative session. It is adjusted based on the amount of funding appropriated.

Criteria: The potential grantee must have a contract with the Indian Health Service for community health aide services.

Diabetes

Authority: AS 44.29.020 and 7 AAC 78 DHSS Grant Programs

The potential grantee is required to specify goals, objectives, activities, timelines for implementation, an itemized budget, and evaluation mechanisms to address the area(s) identified in the solicitation. Quarterly progress and financial reports are required, along with specified deliverables. Changes in project activities may be required based on project evaluation, and methodologies for implementing such changes will be developed in consultation with the grantee.
 - Appropriation: Grant funds are appropriated to the Division of Public Health.

1) planning, development and coordination of regional EMS systems; and

2) training and certification testing for emergency medical personnel, including those working with ground and air medical services.

A statewide system of local, regional, and state EMS councils has been organized for client input. The councils provide two primary services. First, they provide direct input regarding the needs and abilities of each respective community and region. Secondly, because an EMS system is highly complex, involving many disciplines, the councils traditionally are composed of knowledgeable people in many different fields, from physicians and nurses to pre-hospital EMS providers and communications experts.

- **Target Group:** Services are targeted to the entire state population through regional providers. Whenever a life or limb threatening injury or illness strikes suddenly, the EMS system serves to stabilize and transport a patient to the most appropriate treatment facility as quickly as possible. Prompt stabilization and timely transportation are often the keys to saving a life. The EMS program also provides specialized emergency medical training to physicians, mid-level practitioners, and nurses in the pre-hospital, rural clinic, and hospital settings. EMS grants to regions will result in approximately 4,000 pre-hospital emergency medical providers being trained or certified. These emergency medical providers will transport an estimated 40,000 patients to hospitals by ground ambulance during the year and perform several thousand emergency air ambulance transports. Based on a history of required self-reports, approximately 2,000 additional people will be provided Emergency Trauma Technician (ETT), CPR, and first aid training during the year. In addition, councils work with local communities to identify, prioritize and seek funding for essential equipment. Finally, councils operate injury prevention programs, which provide information and materials regarding injury prevention activities to many thousands of persons each year.
- **Resource Allocation:** Resources are allocated statewide, through regional organizations, which include three native organtizations that provide Emergency Medical Services under their multi-program grants.
 - **Criteria:** Grantees are required to address all 14 nationally and state recognized components of an EMS system in terms of goals, objectives, and methodology for achieving those goals. The 14 components of an EMS system include personnel, training, communications, patient transport/transfer, facilities/equipment/supplies, coordination with public safety agencies, accessibility to care, coordinated record keeping, public education and information, evaluation, disaster response, mutual aid agreements, medical direction, and injury prevention. In addition, grantees are required to show what has been achieved in the first six months of each respective year in terms of their stated goals and objectives.
 - Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Public Health.

Authority: AS 44.29.020 and 7 AAC 78 Grant Programs.

- **Priorities:** The objective of this program, as defined in the Preventive Health and Health Services Block Grant agreement with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, is to make progress toward the goals identified in the Department of Health and Human Services report, Healthy People 2010: National Health Promotion and Disease Prevention Objectives, through identified risk reduction objectives and strategies. All states that receive this block grant are obligated to establish an advisory committee chaired by the State Health Officer (Director of Public Health) for the purpose of recommending appropriate uses of these funds to supplement, not supplant, State programs for preventive health activities. The Division of Public Health provides a grant to the Alaska Health Fair for rural health screening services to assist the State of Alaska in meeting key Healthy Alaskans 2010 Goals and Objectives.
- **Target Group:** Alaska's Preventive Health and Health Services Block Grant designates funding for rural and remote communities to reach disparate populations through the organization of community health fairs, training and health screening throughout the state.

Resource Allocation: The grant program is intended to provide services throughout the state.

Criteria: The grantee has demonstrated prior experience providing quality and cost effective community health promotion and screening services and monitors the impact of these services and programs on health issues. The grantee must: 1) meet at least three of the allowable Healthy Alaskans 2010 Objectives; 2) provide a detailed project description identifying the need and target population; 3) demonstrate community support and provide evidence of the applicant's community leadership ability in working cooperatively with other community organizations; 4) show that proposed activities will not duplicate or supplant existing activities; 5) produce a clearly written project work plan; and 6) project a budget that is appropriate, cost effective, and supports objectives.

The North Slope Borough is the governmental agency for the region and the region's only nonfederal health agency. Grants with the Municipality of Anchorage and the North Slope Borough are deemed the most effective means of providing area-wide public health nursing services.

Public Health Preparedness and Response for Bioterrorism

Authority: AS 44.29.020 (Department Authority); and 7 AAC 78 Grant Programs

Priorities: Organizations receiving grants will increase preparedness for and response to bioterrorism, outbreaks of infectious disease, and other public health threats and emergencies, and participate in development of a statewide assessment of needs, communication plans and targeted communication strategies.

Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium: (1) Develop a plan that describes the Alaska Native health System's role in a bioterrorist attack and ensure Native health system issues and resources are identified in and coordinated with the State of Alaska plans; (2) Promote participation of the Native health system organizations and personnel in federal drills and exercises; (3) Surveillance for key infectious disease syndromes; (4) Support preparedness training for Native health facility and organization staff statewide.

Municipality of Anchorage, Department of Health and Human Services: (1) Enhance direct surveillance activities; (2) Increase capacity for planning and coordinating activities, including pharmaceutical caches; (3) Coordinate testing the Municipality Health Department's Emergency Response Plan; (4) Participate in development and implementation of the Health Alert Network; (5) Develop a training plan for public health staff and assist in their continued participation in the Alaska Public Health Training Network.

Alaska State Hospital and Nursing Home Association: The prime focus will be to develop and implement regional terrorism preparedness plans and protocols for hospitals, outpatient facilities, EMS systems and poison control centers in collaborative statewide or regional models. This grant also assists with preparation for non-terrorist epidemics of rare diseases and exposure to chemical toxins and radiological materials, and mass casualties due to explosions.

Target Group: Target groups are: (1) Alaska Native healthcare facilities and the people they serve; (2) the population within and around the Municipality of Anchorage, training to the health department staff and other healthcare professionals in Anchorage; (3) Hospitals, emergency medical systems, poison control centers, community health centers, rural health clinics, federally qualified health centers, tribally-owned health care facilities, and other outpatient facilities that serve as vital points of entry into the health care system.

Tobacco Prevention and Control (Community Based Grants)

Authority: AS 44.29, AS 47.050.010 and 7AAC 78 DHSS Grant Programs

Priorities: The mission of the Tobacco Prevention and Control (TPC) Program is to improve the health of all Alaskans by decreasing death, disability and economic burden caused by tobacco use and exposure to second hand smoke. Tobacco use continues to be Alaska's number-one public health problem. This grant program provides funding to communities that are actively involved in population-based, policy-focused tobacco prevention and control strategies.

The Alaska TPC Program has developed four major public health goals:

(1) to prevent initiation of tobacco use among young people;

(2) to promote quitting among adults and young people;

(3) to identify and eliminate tobacco-related disparities in specific populations identified as of special vulnerability or with above-norm tobacco use patterns; and

(4) to eliminate exposure to secondhand smoke.

The structure of Alaska's tobacco program is based on recommendations from the CDC's Best Practices for Comprehensive Tobacco Control Programs. The statewide program is organized, funded, and managed as program components designed to accomplish and measure the TPC Program goals. The program components include:

(1) community-based programs to reduce tobacco use;

(2) enforcement (in Division of Behavioral Health);

(3) statewide programs that increase the capacity of local programs by providing technical assistance on evaluating programs, promoting media advocacy, implementing smoke free policies, and reducing minors' access to tobacco;

(4) cessation programs;

(5) media/counter-marketing;

(6) surveillance and evaluation; and

(7) administration and management.

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Tobacco Use Cessation in Health Care Centers

Authority: AS 44.29, AS 47.050.010 and 7AAC 78 DHSS Grant Programs

Priorities: The mission of the Tobacco Prevention and Control (TPC) Program is to improve the health of all Alaskans by decreasing death, disability and economic burden caused by tobacco use and exposure to second hand smoke. Tobacco use continues to be Alaska's number-one public health problem. The purpose of these grants is to implement the systems interventions recommended by the U.S. Public Health Service Clinical Practice Guideline Treating Tobacco Use and Dependence to enable identification and treatment of tobacco users within health care systems.

The Alaska TPC Program has developed four major public health goals:

(1) to prevent initiation of tobacco use among young people;

(2) to promote quitting among adults and young people;

(3) to identify and eliminate tobacco-related disparities in specific populations identified as of special vulnerability or with above-norm tobacco use patterns; and

(4) to eliminate exposure to secondhand smoke.

The structure of Alaska's tobacco program is based on recommendations from the CDC's Best Practices for Comprehensive Tobacco Control Programs. The statewide program is organized, funded, and managed as program components designed to accomplish and measure the TPC Program goals. The program components include:

(1) community-based programs to reduce tobacco use;

(2) enforcement (in Division of Behavioral Health);

(3) statewide programs that increase the capacity of local programs by providing technical assistance on evaluating programs, promoting media advocacy, implementing smoke free policies, and reducing minors access to tobacco;

(4) cessation programs;

(5) media/counter-marketing;

(6) surveillance and evaluation; and

(7) administration and management.

Target Group: All Alaskans affected or potentially affected by tobacco use.

Resource Allocation: Grant awards of up to \$100,000 are available for regional health care centers. This program is funded through Tobacco Use Education and Cessation Funds, appropriated annually by the State legislature.

Criteria: Grantees must:

1) Adhere to the Clinical Practice Guidelines for Treating Tobacco Use and Dependence, and

2) Implement a State approved project evaluation plan.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Public Health.

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Tuberculosis Control

Authority: Section 301 and 317 of the Public Health Services Act, as amended; AS 44.29.020 and 7 AAC 78 DHSS Grant Programs

- **Priorities:** Services required from the organization receiving this grant include the following: 1) Provide comprehensive tuberculosis (TB) medical care for indigent TB clients; 2) Provide written clinical consultation and advice to clinicians statewide regarding management of patients with suspected or documented active TB or with latent TB infection (LTBI).
- **Target Group:** Target groups include TB patients, their close contacts, and other high-risk populations. Services are Statewide; an estimated 1,500 Alaskans are served annually.
- **Resource Allocation:** Funding levels are based on the needs experienced by or projected for an area, federal priorities, and the amount of federal funds received.
 - **Criteria:** The grantee is asked to demonstrate a history of providing services to persons with TB, and is required to specify goals, objectives, activities, and timelines for implementation, an itemized budget and evaluation mechanisms to measure success. Quarterly progress and financial reports are required, along with any specified deliverables. The Division may require changes in project activities based on project evaluation, and methodologies for implementing such changes will be developed in consultation with the grantee.

Community Developmental Disabilities Grants

Authority: AS 47.80 and Department of Health & Social Services; and 7 AAC 78 DHSS Grant Programs

Priorities: The Community Developmental Disailities Grant Program (CDDG) addresses the needs of individuals with developmental disabilities for Habilitation, which is the acquisition or maintenance of skills to live with independence and improved capacity. CDDGs strengthen and sustain the capacity of rural and remote communities to provide services to all members of their community. Equally important is the ability for individuals to remain with their natural families, while being able to access the support they need to participate in the social and economic lives of their community; thereby minimizing institutionalization. CDDGs help provide care in the local community for people having severe disabling conditions such as mental retardation, autism, or cerebral palsy.

Services vary depending upon the persons age and unique needs; and may include supported employment, respite care, care coordination, day habilitation, case management, specialized equipment. In some situations, the Program may provide residential care in a group living or independent living arrangement. For those who qualify by meeting the diagnostic and income limits, the Home and Community Based Waiver Program may provide similar services. However for those who are not eligible or who do not need the long-term residential care that the MRDD Waiver is designed to provide, CDDGs allow cost effective services to be tailored to each individual recipient, particularly to those whose families act as primary caregivers. Core Services, limited to \$3,000 per person, are also offered through the CDDGs to individuals on the waitlist who receive no other services from the Division. This is done with the intent that the early availability of Core Services may alleviate crisis until individuals are in need of long-term care and are selected from the waitlist.

- **Target Group:** Services are provided statewide to persons who meet specific criteria outlined in the State of Alaska's definition of developmental disabilities (AS 47.80.900). Since the program participant is authorized to choose their provider from a list of qualified providers, individuals currently receive services in nearly 90 communities across the state. Services in some areas of the state are limited to grantees that operate in a specific community.
- **Resource Allocation:** Grant funds are allocated to purchase expertise in serving people with developmental disabilities consistent with the state plan described in AS 47.80.090 (5). Since the needed expertise is not equally divided on the basis of population or regional characteristics, the plan directs funds for specific needs of persons with developmental disabilities wherever they may live.
 - **Criteria:** Grant funds are distributed through the Department's grant process. Each grantee is required to be reviewed regularly by the Division's Quality Assurance review team, and by an independent financial auditor. A Division-approved action plan is required from each grantee responding to any recommendations made by the review team. Standards of care are expressed as Service Principles stated in AS 47.80.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services.

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Home & Community Based Care

Authority: Federal Title III-E Family Caregiver Support Program, The Older American's Act; AS 44.21 & 47.65, and 7 AAC 78 Grant Programs.

Priorities: Alaska's Family Caregiver Support Program offers a system of caregiver support. Services are implemented through partnerships between state, tribal, and local governments, and community service providers to provide relief from emotional, physical and financial stress experienced by family caregivers. Services include: information; assistance; individual counseling, support groups and caregiver training; respite care; and supplemental services.

Senior In-Home Services provide Care Coordination, Chore, Respite, and Extended Respite Care services to individuals of any age with Alzheimer's Disease or Related Disorders (ADRD), and individuals 60 years and older who are frail, have physical disabilities and/or mental health issues. Flexible, wrap-around services in the home are targeted toward individuals at risk for institutional placement, who have the greatest social and economic need, are Alaska native, or reside in a rural area.

Adult Day services provide an organized program of daytime services in community group settings to support adults' personal independence, and promote social, physical and emotional well-being. Activities are designed to meet individual needs and interests of participants, and referral to and assistance in using appropriate community resources. Services often help stabilize individuals after a health crisis, providing assistance in daily living activities.

ADRD Education, Support and Mini-Grants provide statewide education and support services to people with Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders and their caregivers, and provide education about ADRD to the general public, health care professionals, professional caregivers, agencies and organizations. Services include a statewide toll-free number (Helpline); individual and group education and family consultations; participation in the Safe Return program; and a lending library of ADRD books, videos and printed materials. This program is also responsible for statewide mini-grants to individuals with ADRD, for supplies or services to remove or reduce barriers to an individual's ability to function independently.

Target Group: Grantees must target seniors at or below the 100% of poverty level. Services support Alaskans over sixty years of age, and caregivers.

Resource Allocation: Based on the Federally approved State plan for services.

Criteria: Eligibility is dependent on several factors including funding source(s), staffing levels, and appropriateness of placement for those individuals who require assistance and supervision due to physical, emotional, or cognitive impairments.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services.

Nutrition, Transportation & Support

- **Priorities:** The Nutrition, Transportation and Support Services (NTS) program, authorized under the Title III of the Older Americans Act, provides grants to support services for seniors 60 and over in their communities. Services are provided to seniors through local community organizations such as senior centers, non-profit agencies, and tribal or local governments in order to meet the needs of Alaska's aging population. The NTS program provides services that enable seniors to remain independent and stay healthy in their communities. Services are targeted to those with the greatest economic and social need through a State Plan funding formula developed by Alaska Commission on Aging in collaboration with the Department of Health and Social Services. Services provided through this program include information and assistance, congregate meals, home delivered meals, assisted and unassisted transportation, homemaker, legal assistance, health promotion and prevention, senior companion, foster grandparent and Retired Senior Volunteer Programs.
- Target Group: These services are available to Alaskans 60 years of age and over. In addition, the target populations include those seniors who live in poverty, rural areas, are members of minority groups and are physically frail. These categories for targeting services are based on requirements in the Federal Older Americans Act.
- **Resource Allocation:** Funding is allocated through the Intra State Funding Formula approved in the State Plan for Services using the most current U.S. Census data. Each of six regions in the state receive an allocation for funds based on 60 years old and over population, and the target populations stated above with specific weighting factors.
 - **Criteria:** Applicants must meet the requirements for program delivery. Proposals are evaluated based on the criteria in the Request for Proposals and prior year performance.
 - **Appropriation:** Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services.

Protection of Rights & Investigation of Abuse

Authority: Programmatic: Public Law 106-402 DD Act; Americans with Disabilities Act; AS 47.80. Grant Regulations: 7 AAC 78.

- **Priorities:** The Protection of Rights & Investigation of Abuse program provides people with developmental disabilities (DD) and their families training and assistance in methods to resolve grievances they may have with providers of community developmental disability services. Services funded by the program range from information and referral, negotiation and mediation, various interventions in line with administrative recourse and, as a last resort, legal consultation and remedies. Under the Federal DD Act, the state must have a system of protection and advocacy that has the capacity to provide administrative and legal remedies to civil rights concerns for people with developmental disabilities. The program exists to assist eligible individuals, sometimes through their families and guardians to engage in their own advocacy. In collaboration with the Division of Senior Services, this grant has been used to emphasize training to recipients in such areas as special education, social security and the Americans with Disabilities Act.
- **Target Group:** In order to receive this grant, an organization must have the capacity to provide the Department with an immediate statewide response to complaints of abuse and neglect by persons meeting the definition developmentally disabled as described in AS 47.80.900.
- **Resource Allocation:** A single agency provides statewide Protection and Advocacy Services. This award incorporates and makes maximum use of other federal, state, and private funds, which are awarded directly to the sole provider to establish and maintain protection and advocacy services to Alaskans with mental illness and other unique populations with concerns similar to those of persons with developmental disabilities. The Disability Law Center has continuously performed these unique services for 25 years.
 - **Criteria:** The grantee must have the unique legal authority under state and federal law to investigate complaints by vulnerable people with developmental disabilities, of abuse and neglect in institutions. Additionally, the grantee must assist and train the target population statewide in identifying and obtaining needed services from generic public benefits and entitlement programs, and special education for adolescents with developmental disabilities. The Disability Law Center (DLC) was created in 1977 to meet the requirements of Alaska Statute 47.80.020 to have a system of protection and advocacy for people experiencing developmental disabilities (DD).

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Senior and Disability Services.

This program addresses the severe statewide shortage of qualified direct care staff and professionals with critical expertise necessary to deliver services to people with DD.

Short-Term Assistance & Referral Programs STAR and Mini-Grants

Authority: AS 47.80; 7 AAC 78 Grant Programs.

- **Priorities:** The STAR program exists to assist people with developmental disabilities (DD) and their families by addressing short-term needs before a crisis occurs, and to defer the need for more expensive residential services or long-term care. Many people who are on the DD waitlist access STAR services. Allowable costs under the STAR program include, but are not limited to: environmental modifications, adaptive equipment, and services that assist the family (such as behavioral training, personal care, or medical appointments). Assistance with basic living needs necessary to avert a crisis that are not covered by another public or private program such as emergency transportation and clothing may be approved on a limited basis. Mini-Grants are a one-time awards made to individuals, not to exceed \$2,500 per recipient, for health and safety needs not covered by grants or other programs, to help beneficiaries attain and maintain healthy and productive lifestyles. The kinds of supplies or services the Mental Health Trust considers appropriate for Mini-Grants include, but are not limited to: therapeutic devices, access to medical, dental and vision care, and special health-care needs. Adult dental care is the service most frequently requested Mini-grant recipients.
- **Target Group:** People with developmental disabilities and their families may access STAR services. Alaska Mental Health Trust Beneficiaries who have a developmental disability or receive Infant Learning Program Services may apply for Mini-grants through local non-profit agencies. Funds are distributed across the state, and amounts assigned by geographic census area.
- **Resource Allocation:** STAR grants, geographically allocated and capped in the amount of \$85,000 each, are awarded through the Department's grant process. Awards provide adequate personnel and operating costs to enable each grantee to serve people within their census area. Mini-Grants are distributed to the agencies with STAR Programs, according to the percentage of population in the agency's designated area.
 - **Criteria:** These 2 programs were designed to be flexible and to respond immediately to meet the needs of consumers who are on the wait list for services. In so doing, the STAR and Mini-grant programs have been an effective way to prevent crisis situations and to provide necessary supports, reducing the need for more intensive services. These programs address the type of needs of the designated beneficiary group intended by the Mental Health Trust Authority.
 - Appropriation: STAR Program funding is appropriated to the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services.

Alaska Transition Training Initiative

- Authority: U.S. Department of Education (DOE) funding is awarded to the Alaska Department of Education and Early Development and is passed through to the Department of Health & Social Services. Funds are awarded to a non-profit agency chosen by both departments for the provision of services under AS 44.29, AS 47.05.015, and 7 AAC 78.
- **Priorities:** The US Department of Education provides funding for the training of providers who help families, whose children have disabilities, with transition from the home based Early Intervention/Infant Learning Programs (EI/ILP) to the local school district or Head Start program at the age of three. Training occurs at the community level with the local school district, parent representatives, EI/ILP and other relevant health, social service and educational agencies present. The funding covers the costs of substitute teachers, so all involved personnel can attend training without added expense to the district or infant learning program. The Governor's Council on Disabilities and Special Education has identified this transition as a major concern for families in Alaska.
- **Target Group:** The target populations are children with disabilities and their families in school districts, Head Start and El/ILP programs and other related agencies statewide. It is anticipated that trainings will be held in at least five communities with total of 12 community-based teams receiving training during the year. Follow-up and technical assistance will be provided to communities trained in prior years on an as-needed basis.

Resource Allocation: A single agency is funded to provide training services statewide to all EI/ILP grantees and other local agencies on rotating-bases.

Criteria: Funds are awarded to a single agency most capable of meeting the goals and objectives of the grant project. The grantee is chosen in a collaborative selection process by the Departments of Health and Social Services and Education and Early Development as the entity that best meets the needs of departments, the school districts, and the EI/ILP and Head Start programs for this very specific type of training.

Child And Family Visitation Center

Authority: AS 47.17.010, AS 47.17.290; and DHSS Grant Regulations 7 AAC 78.

- **Priorities:** The grant is awarded for the purpose of developing a Child and Family Visitation Center in the Anchorage Region to provide safe, conflict free supervision in a space specifically designed for a family setting. Children in out-of-home care are very vulnerable. Children that are removed from their homes due to abuse or neglect have no control over the separation, it occurs in the middle of trauma, they often have little understanding about why they are being separated from their families, and they do not have the ability to control the resources that could maintain contact. A child and family visitation center is a location where a child and parent separated by a court order can meet. The meeting is monitored by a trained worker who is either in the room with the parent and child, or standing nearby. This allows for supervision that can provide parent-child contact when it would otherwise be impossible, both ensuring child safety and protecting rights to visitation. Visitation centers offer a teaching and therapeutic potential, by observing, correcting, and providing feedback. Successful visitation centers offer clear expectations, a variety of homelike activities, and immediate feedback to the social worker and foster parents. It is important that visitation center staff, OCS staff, and foster parents provide a supportive team approach to visitation. Supervised visitation, reunification, or an alternative permanent placement. The Center also communicates with OCS workers and foster parents, birth parents, and family members; and provides transportation to and from the visits. The Center provides information through court testimony when appropriate.
- **Target Group:** Services provided through this grant category are designed for families who require supervised visitation services when children are removed from the home due to abuse and/or neglect. There are also instances when a parent is involved with alcohol or drug abuse, violence, is incarcerated, or OCS has intervened in a custody battle that has aroused serious concerns regarding the safety of the child.

Resource Allocation: The Office of Children's Services has funded the Family Visitation Center in the area where the target population is most dense.

Criteria: Awards are based on competitive solicitation through a Request for Proposals. Criteria includes requirements for qualified and sufficient staff levels, hours of operation, accessibility to the target population as well as other program specific needs and the criteria contained in 7 AAC 78.100.

Commodity Supplemental Food Program

Authority: Federal Regulations - 7 CFR Part 247; CSFP State Plan (2003); DHSS Grant Regulations 7AAC 78

- **Priorities:** Commodity Supplemental Foods Program (CSFP) grants fund local administration of the CSFP program, which increases the access of nutritious foods, increases food security, and provides nutrition education to low income women, infants, children and seniors. This goal is in compliance with federal and state regulations and policies. The relative need among geographic areas and populations for expanding or providing services is evaluated by determining the percentage of women, infants, and children whose income is below 185% of federal poverty guidelines and seniors whose income is 130% of the federal poverty level.
- **Target Group:** Those low income persons include: pregnant, breast-feeding, and postpartum women; infants and children up to 6 years old; and seniors over the age of 60. The target area is Anchorage and Fairbanks currently. The projected number of clients to be served is 3,000 per month. Counts are kept on the number of women, infants, children and seniors served.
- **Resource Allocation:** The first priority for funding is for the continuation of services to enrolled families and seniors. Criteria include: staffing needed to provide program services; number of satellite clinics; other necessary expenses; and in-kind contribution/resources available to the local agency. Budgets are based on assigned caseload slots.
 - **Criteria:** Grantees must have the capability to warehouse commodity foods shipped directly to/from the USDA, package foods into individual monthly allotments, distribute foods to certified program participants, or box foods and transport to distributions sites. These grants are evaluated with the requirements of 7ACC 78.100.
 - Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Office of Children's Services.

Differential Response

- Authority: AS 47.17.030 Termination of parental rights, describes the responsibilities the Office of Children's Services has to investigate reports of harm on children. DHSS Grant Regulations 7AAC 78
- **Priorities:** This program is a differential response system that accepts low-risk 'Priority 3' reports of harm referred by the Office of Children's Services(OCS) for assessment. The OCS conducts an initial screening following receipt of a report of harm and, if considered a Priority 3 low-risk referral, the OCS refers the report to the Differential Response Program for a family assessment and possible services.
- **Target Group:** The Differential Response program is designed to investigate low-risk referrals. The program assesses the family situation and risk to the child. Family Assessment Workers provide direct services, as needed, or provide referrals for families who could benefit from community-based programs. All services are geared to ameliorate the conditions leading to the report of harm. If child protection issues appear more serious upon assessment, the case will be referred back to the OCS for a full investigation.
- **Resource Allocation:** The Differential Response program was established in the Matanuska-Susitna Valley as a result of the high number of referrals of child abuse and neglect.
 - **Criteria:** Proposals are evaluated based on criteria established in the solicitation. Criteria include evaluation of the applicant's access to the target population and ability to provide the services defined in the grant solicitation. All applicants must have an operational differential response program. Eligible applicants must provide assessment and referral services to families referred from Office of Children's Services on Priority 3 Reports of Harm involving children ages birth to 18. (Priority 3 is families who are considered low risk).
 - Appropriation: Funds are appropriated to the Office of Children's Services.

Early Intervention/ Infant Learning Program

Authority: Federal Part C of IDEA (PL 105-17); 7AAC 23.010 - 7AAC 23.100 & AS 47.20; DHSS Grant Regulations 7AAC 78

- **Priorities:** The purpose of the Early Intervention / Infant Learning Program (EI/ILP) is to enhance the developmental potential of children from birth to three who experience developmental delays or are at risk for them. The program integrates the early intervention services that are crucial in the first three years of life for children with special needs.
- **Target Group:** The program serves families of infants who experience disabilities or special needs as well as those who are at risk for developmental delays. Services are available statewide. In addition to itinerant services provided from hub communities, programs based in Anchorage provide statewide services for hearing and visually impaired children. Approximately 1,800 children will be enrolled for comprehensive services with about 1,700 additional children receiving screening, evaluation and referral services annually.
- **Resource Allocation:** Allocation of funds is based on the population of children under the age of three in the region, the number of eligible children enrolled who are underserved or waiting for services, caseload characteristics such as the numbers who qualify for Part C, non Part C and at-risk services, the cost of travel and service delivery in the region, size of the caseload and expansion of service areas, and the availability of a community-based team for multi-disciplinary evaluations. Grantees and their contractors bill families and third party payers (health insurance and Medicaid) for some services.
 - **Criteria:** Grant applications require measurable goals and objectives, the proximity of the applicant to the population to be served, and the applicant's ability to employ early intervention providers. All grants are reviewed according to the requirements of 7 AAC 78.100.
 - Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Office of Children's Services.

- **Priorities:** Family Support services allow children to remain in their homes from birth to onset of their teens, and grow in a healthy home environment. Services are intended to be preventative in nature. Preventative is defined as the prevention of child abuse and neglect by teaching parents to develop healthy life skills and relationships.  - **Criteria:** Grants are awarded through a competitive RFP process. The RFP stipulated that only one Family Support program would be awarded in any given village or city in Alaska, with the exception of Anchorage, Juneau, Fairbanks, and Palmer/Wasilla. In each of these four cities, a mximum of two Family Suport programs may be awarded. Funding is determined on a regional basis with at least one rual area in each of the Northern, Southcentral and Southeast regions.

Healthy Families Alaska

Authority: AS 44.29, AS 47.05.015; and 7 AAC 78 Grant Programs

- **Priorities:** Healthy Families Alaska is designed to improve child health outcomes, including the prevention of child abuse and neglect. The program incorporates screening pregnant women and parents of newborns for risk factors and providing intensive home visiting for three to five years for families whose life situation places their children at risk. Services provided to families who voluntarily agree to participate in the program, focus on supporting the parent, supporting positive parent-child interaction and child development. Healthy Families Alaska programs collaborate with other agencies in order to utilize scarce resources, provide a comprehensive array of services to families, and avoid duplication of services.
- **Target Group:** Eligible families will be identified during the systematic screening of all new parents during pregnancy or at delivery in communities with a Healthy Families Alaska program. Families in these communities will be eligible if they are identified as having life circumstances that place them at increased risk of providing less than a nurturing environment for their child.
- **Resource Allocation:** Funds are allocated based on grantee needs to deliver required services that meet the Healthy Families Program goals and objectives, to maintain program caseloads, and based on available funding for the program
 - **Criteria:** The criteria for awarding funds includes an evaluation of the applicants understanding of the services to be provided, a description of the organization, details of budget, population to be served, program plans with measurable goals and objectives, previous experience, demonstrated effectiveness, and documentation of community support. Applications are reviewed and evaluated by Department staff and a Proposal Evaluation Committee. Final award decisions are determined by the Commissioner.

Appropriation: Funding is appropriated to the Office of Children's Services.

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Independent Living

Authority: Under AS 47.10 and AS 47.17 to support youth transition from foster care to self-sufficiency; 7 AAC 78 Grant Programs .

- **Priorities:** The purpose of this mentoring program is to establish long-term relationships between youth in state custody and adults who will help those youth develop self-sufficiency skills necessary for independent living. The overall goal of this program is to support youth in state custody, age 14 and older, to make successful transitions from foster care to independent living as young adults. - Authority: AS 47.40.011 Purchase of Services for minors for whom the state has assumed responsibility under AS 47.10; 7 AAC 78 DHSS Grant Programs, 7 AAC 81 Grant Services for Individuals; and AS 47.12.
- **Priorities:** The primary focus of Residential Child Care (RCC) grants has been to protect and treat children who are victims of child abuse and neglect as well as to rehabilitate juvenile offenders. Services provided are intended to achieve both immediate and long term solutions to family problems; promote the preservation, rehabilitation, and reunification of families to the extent possible; and to promote independence and the use of least restrictive alternatives. The major emphasis is to provide Behavioral Rehabilitation Services (BRS) to children in their own communities whenever possible. Programs include emergency shelter, day treatment, specialized residential care; staffed secure care, residential diagnostic treatment, and residential sex offender treatment. Length of stay in care ranges from one day up to two years.

One additional grant funds a statewide training program for residential providers, to provide forums for the ongoing training of line staff. This includes Managing Aggressive Behaviors, Residential Child and Youth Care Professional Skill Development, and Train the Trainers workshops. It also provides access to Fetal Alcohol Syndrome curricula, Effects of Abuse and Neglect on Child Development training, as well as additional staff and program support.

Target Group: Services are provided in communities across the state to children who are victims of child abuse and neglect, and to juvenile offenders.

Resource Allocation: OCS guarantees a grant for Core Capacity amount, per bed per day, to ensure availability for the Division clients. The award amounts listed include only the Core Capacity Grants. Additional funding is earned through Behavioral Rehabilitation Services (BRS) based on actual utilization, payable through Provider Agreements under 7 AAC 81. Funding amounts are also based on service need and treatment under each level of care: Level II - Emergency Shelter, Level III - Specified Residential Treatment, Level IV - Residential Diagnostic Treatment.

Behavioral Rehabilitation Services (BRS) were developed by the Department to provide a minimum level of operating funds to grantees while setting up an incentive funding structure to encourage maximum utilization of available treatment beds; and increasing grantees RCC daily rates, while setting higher standards for residential child care. BRS are provided by the RCC grantees and billed through the Office of Children's Services (OCS).

Criteria: Facilities operating under this grant program are required to be in compliance with state licensing requirements following AS 47.35 and 7 AAC 50.005 - 7 AAC 50.990.

Appropriation: Grant funds are appropriated to the Office of Children's Services.

Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC)

Authority: Federal Regulations - 7 CFR Part 246; WIC State Plan (1998); 7AAC 78 DHSS Grant Regulations

- **Priorities:** Women, Infant and Children (WIC) grants fund local administration of the WIC program, which provides supplemental nutritious foods to alleviate specific health problems to low income women, infants and children. This goal is in compliance with federal and state regulations and policies. The relative need among geographic areas and populations for expanding or providing services is evaluated by determining: 1) the incidence of low birth weight among newborn infants; 2) the rate of infant mortality; 3) the percentages of births to women under 19 years of age; 4) the rate of participation in the Food Stamp Program; 5) the rate of employment; and 6) the percentage of people whose income is below 185% of federal poverty guidelines. Families enrolled in Denali Kid Care with incomes above 185% of the federal poverty level are adjunctively WIC income-eligible.
- **Target Group:** Those persons served by the programs administered by these grantees include: pregnant and breast-feeding women, infants and children up to 5 years old at nutritional risk, and postpartum women. The target area is statewide. The projected number of clients to be served is 26,000 per month. Counts are kept on the number of women, infants and children served.
- **Resource Allocation:** The first priority for funding is for the continuation of services to enrolled families. Criteria include: staff needed to provide program services; number of satellite clinics; other necessary expenses; and in-kind contribution/resources available to the local agency. Budgets are considered individually in order to meet local agency needs and compared to ensure equity.
 - **Criteria:** Grant applications require description of organization, details of budget, population to be served, a program plan with measurable goals and objectives, previous experience, and documentation of community support. Department staff and a Proposal Evaluation Committee review and evaluate applications.
 - Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Office of Children's Services.

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Supported Parenting Grants

Authority: Under AS 47.17.010 - AS 47.17.290; 7 AAC 78 Grant Programs to provide direct parenting support services.

- **Priorities:** The services obtained through the Supported Parenting grants are for parents with developmental disabilities, mental health illness, or severe alcohol problems, who often need support in fulfilling their parenting responsibilities. Without support, these parents are often referred for child protection services to the Office of Children's Services. Beneficiary parent groups are at a disadvantage since many of them have life long disabilities. Adult services to these beneficiary parent groups focus on treatment services to help the individual and many do not have the funding necessary for services that address the important role of parenting.
- Target Group: Services provided through this grant category are direct services for beneficiaries of the Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority. These are Alaskans who experience mental illness; mental retardation or similar disabilities; chronic alcoholism with psychosis; or Alzheimer's disease or related dementia. The services focus on providing direct parenting support services to these special-needs parents who may have increased risk of their children being removed from their homes.

Resource Allocation: Grants are awarded to the Southeast, Northern, and Anchorage Regions of the state.

- **Criteria:** FY 06 is the last year of MHTAAR funding for this program. Grantees will develop an exit strategy which may allow for the continuation of these programs without MHTAAR funding.
- Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Office of Children's Services.

Time Limited Family Reunification

- Authority: Under AS 47.10 Children in Need of Aid; AS 47.17 Child Protection; Title IV-B Subpart 2 Sec. 430.[42.U.S.C. 629](a) to develop and establish, or expand and to operate a program of family preservation services, community-based family support services, time-limited family reunification services, and adoption promotion and support services. Adoptions and Safe Families Act (ASFA 11/19/97) ASFA amended Title IV-B subpart 2 by adding two new services: Time Limited Family Reunification Services and Adoption Promotion and Support Services.
- Priorities: Time Limited Family Reunification grants provide services to families whose children have been in foster care 15 out of 22 months with the goal of finding a permanent placement for the child. These services are geared toward either reunifying families or moving towards guardianship or adoption. Safety is always deemed paramount when reunification is the goal. The services accomplished through this program include supervised visitations, transportation, parenting education and support services, anger management counseling, case management services with an outcome based case plan, information and referral services, structured parent-child activities, respite care, pre-school individual skill development for SED children, mental health services, drug and alcohol treatment/referral services, and individual and family therapy.
- Target Group: Time Limited Family Reuinification grants provide services to families whose children have been in foster care 15 out of 22 months. Clients must be referred by OCS. The goal is to find a permanent placement for the child. Services are also provided to the parents or primary caregivers of such children, in order to facilitate the reunification of the children safely and appropriately in a timely fashion, but only during the 15-month period that begins on the date the child enters foster care. Services include in-home services, supervised visitation, transportation, substance abuse treatment, counseling, mental health services, and counseling and education for victimes of domestic violence.
- Resource Allocation: Funding allocations for the Timed Limited Family Reunification Services grants are based on population, numbers of family services clients, numbers of youth services clients, and community resources.
 - Criteria: Grants are awarded through a competitive RFP process. The RFP stipulated that only one Time Limited Family Reunification (TLFR) program would be awarded in any given village or city in Alaska, with the exception of Anchorage, Juneau and Fairbanks. In each of these three cities, a maximum of two TLFR programs may awarded.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Office of Children's Services.



AS 44.20.020. Duties of Department, (a) The Department of Health and Social Services shall administer the state programs of public health and social services. (12) Child welfare services. 7 AAC 78 Grant Programs.

- Priorities: The purpose of this grant is to pass IV-E funds through Office of Children's Services (OCS) to grantees in order to provide a higher level of foster care related services to IV-E eligible native children. The grantees will facilitate cooperation between the division, tribes and tribal organizations; provide for the best interest of Alaska Native American Indian children; meet the policies and goals of the Indian Child Welfare Act of 1978 (ICWA); assure compliance with the Adoption and Safe Families Act; and provide the council with access to federal funding under the Title IV-E administration and training regulations.
- **Target Group:** The target groups include tribes and tribal organizations throughout Alaska providing services to Title IV-E eligible children. Projects are located in the Anchorage, Fairbanks, Juneau, Bethel, Nome, Bristol Bay, Aleutian Pribilof, and Sitka service areas. Services also include coordination and communication between Office of Children's Services, tribes, and tribal organizations statewide.
- **Resource Allocation:** The funding level is based on a cash or in-kind contributions by the tribal council. Contributions by grantees will be reimbursed through IV-E. The allowable administration cost incurred by the grantees will be cost allocated based on: The percentage (%) of all children statewide in foster care who are in OCS custody and who are Title IV-E eligible times (x) 50 percent (Federal Financial Participation for administration costs), if available; The percentage (%) of all Native American children statewide in foster care who are in OCS custody and who are Title IV-E eligible times the percentage (%) of all Native American children statewide in foster care who are in OCS custody and who are Title IV-E eligible times (x) 50 percent (Federal Financial Participation for administration costs).
 - **Criteria:** Federal funding is designated to tribes providing adoption and foster care services. Grantees are required to sign a Title IV-E agreement. This agreement also requires approval by the Federal Administration for Children and Family Services.
 - Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Office of Children's Services.
