uberculosis was the cause of death for 46% of all Alaskans who died in 1946. The battle against tuberculosis was the territory's major health issue, especially among Alaska Natives. The crisis led to the creation of a unique health care delivery system, using marine vessels. The M/V Yukon Health tended to villagers' medical needs along the Yukon River, while the "floating clinics" M/V Health and M/S Hygiene, both of which were stationed at Juneau, served coastal villagers from Western Alaska to the Southeast. Today, nearly every Alaskan village has a clinic and/or a CHAP aide trained through the Community Health Aides Program.

The courage and self-sacrifice of itinerant public health nurses who endured challenging and often dangerous conditions in those trying times is inspirational. The battle against tuberculosis in Alaska is a story of victory against untold suffering and staggering odds, but it is also a cautionary tale, as villages experience the remergence of increasingly resistant strains in the twenty-first century, as well as other new and emerging diseases.



Introduction

rants are vital to fulfilling the Department of Health and Social Services' mission of promoting and protecting the health and well-being of Tall Alaskans. In advancing the goal of government transparency, this report provides information on grants the Department has issued in FY10, including funding sources, programs, grantees, and where the services are being provided throughout the State.

Over 600 grants, totaling more than \$155 million dollars, provide services to Alaskans ranging from heating assistance to emergency medical services and injury prevention; from family preservation to training and supervision for Health Aides in communities throughout the State.

This year we have made substantial progress toward attaining the goals of the Department and the Grantee Partnership Project. Standardized training for grant management was developed and provided to Grant Administrators, Program Managers and other key staff, to further coordinate grant processes department wide. The eGrants team has also been instrumental in developing tools necessary to achieve Department goals, including the creation of a new Grant Closeout Performance Report which evaluates grantees' success in providing services. In addition, the eGrants online Continuation Application was tested by a number of pilot grantees, and will be available to all grantees with continuation applications to file for FY11. The On-Line Continuation Grant Application has multi-user capability, automatically pre-fills much of the application information for the grantee, allows grantees to update resumes, job descriptions and more with their application, and offers convenient online access, automatic budget summary, and guaranteed delivery.

As we head into the New Year, we can take pride in our achievements, while we continue working in the spirit of cooperation and mutual advancement to face the challenges that lie ahead of us.

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Alaska Youth Suicide Prevention

Authority: Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration SAMHSA, 7AAC 78 Department of Health and Social Services Grant

Programs.

Priorities: Youth ages 20-29 have the highest number and rate of suicide in Alaska. The Alaska Youth Suicide Prevention Program funds

Regional Suicide Prevention Teams around the state that utilize the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Strategic Prevention Framework (SPF). Community planning methods include identifying needs, resources, readiness necessary for building capacity and the development of a Strategic Regional Suicide Prevention Plan. The plan will identify the utilization of best practices including environmental and other prevention-based strategies that will demonstrate anticipated outcomes associated with increasing protective factors and reducing risk factors associated with suicide and suicide behaviors.

Target Group: Youth ages 20-29. This program will also target higher risk populations such as Alaska Native male teens, preteen females, returning

veterans ages 18-24, gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender youth and youth residing in an institutional setting such as residential

treatment, foster care, and detention or correctional facilities.

Resource Allocation: Services are sought Statewide.

Criteria: Eligible applicants include nonprofit organizations; municipalities and Regional Educational Attendance Areas or other political

subdivisions of the state; other State agencies; Alaska Native Tribes; or a combination of these entities. Funding is issued through a statewide competitive solicitation process. Proposals are solicited that address the goal of promoting communities utilizing effective practices and partnerships. Proposals must contain tangible evidence of participation in community association, partnership or

collaborative agreements that will enhance the applicants ability to achieve program goals and desired outcomes.

Appropriation: Grant Funding is appropriated to the Division of Behavioral Health.

Alcohol Safety Action Program (Adult and Juvenile)

Authority: AS 47.37 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act; 7AAC 78 Department of Health and Social Services Grant Programs.

Priorities: Priorities of the program are alcohol and substance abuse screening, referral, and monitoring education or treatment requirements of alcohol-related misdemeanor cases. Each program has an adult component and may have a juvenile component.

Target Group: Adult ASAP: Services are intended for clients who have a current or pending DUI misdemeanor criminal case. Most clients are referred directly from the court as a condition of their sentence, although they may be assigned prior to their conviction as a condition of release.

Juvenile ASAP: Services are intended for clients who are referred for adolescent assessment, referral, and treatment related to underage drinking and drug offenses. Juvenile ASAP serves clients aged 14-21 who have been convicted of a minor consuming, minor in possession, or tobacco violation. Most clients are referred directly from the court as a condition of their sentence, although they may be assigned prior to their conviction as a condition of release.

Resource Allocation: Criteria for allocation of funds for these services are 1) cost per case; 2) size of caseload and; 3) support of the local justice system.

Geographic consideration is based on the number of cases in each court location. Award of Juvenile Alcohol Safety Action Program funding is made only to grantees that currently have an adult ASAP infrastructure in place. A 10% match is required.

Criteria: Eligible applicants will provide services in communities that is an Alaska Court System site with an approved alcohol and/or drug abuse treatment program. Criteria for awarding grants are derived from statute and regulation and include evaluation of component costs, budget summary and narrative, program narrative, and goals and objectives. Recommendations are made by an evaluation of statistical data reported from the courts and the information provided in applications.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Behavioral Health.

Priorities: The Community Service Patrol is an integral part of a multi-faceted service system designed to provide protection, identification, and referral for treatment for the targeted population. The sobering center will provide a more appropriate and preferable setting than the local correctional facility or emergency room.

Target Group: The targeted population are chronic inebriates in need of detoxification services.

Resource Allocation: The Bethel region has been identified by the AMHTA as a target area for specialized chronic inebriate services due to the large number of Title 47 protective holds that result in people being taken to local correctional facilities or hospital emergency rooms.

Criteria: Available data documenting incarcerations associated with proctective custody holds demonstrates that the City of Bethel has one of the highest incidences of protective holds in the State. Because of this, the Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority (AMHTA) and Division of Behavioral Health have identified the region as a priority for additional program efforts.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Behavioral Health.

Bridge Home - Housing and Housing Retention Support Services

Authority: AS 37.14.041 and AS 47.30.056 Use of the Mental Health Trust Settlement Income Account; 7 AAC 78 Department of Health and Social Services Grant Programs

Priorities: The Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority allocated funding for grants to provide rental subsidies and related housing costs, as well as residential support services, for up to 40 adult individuals. Participants will receive intensive, on-site residential support services and living skills development, as well as supportive employment training. 24-hour outreach services will be available to respond in time of need.

This program provides funding to address a critical gap in our system for long-term housing assistance to a population that is excluded from current programs. Clients are offered a chance to demonstrate the ability to remain in stable housing and reestablish eligibility for the HUD Housing Choice Voucher program.

Target Group: The Bridge Home program targets adults who are exiting institutions with a serious, chronic mental illness and a history of cycling from the Department of Corrections, Alaska Psychiatric Institute and homelessness.

Resource Allocation: This is a demonstration project to begin in the Anchorage area with a single grant to provide services to the highest density target population. The pilot is anticipated to be made available to other Alaska communities in the future.

Criteria: The successful proposal must demonstrate a thorough understanding of the goals and outcomes anticipated by the Department and the project must meet or exceed the anticipated outcomes. Program goals include: ensuring public safety; reducing criminal and clinical recidivism; providing a supported housing alternative to corrections; assisting clients to achieve self-sufficiency by accessing mainstream resources, such as a social security benefits and federal housing subsidies; and demonstrating the overall cost savings to the State of Alaska for the use of supported housing versus institutionalization.

Appropriation: Funding is appropriated to the Division of Behavioral Health.

Having treatment options and family support within their own community enhances the child's likelihood of success for returning home. Pilot projects include enhancing inhome treatment services and resources for the prevention of crisis situations; crisis nursery/treatment preschool; individualized support services for transitional aged youth 16-21; mental health respite/stabilization homes; treatment resource homes; therapeutic group

homes; and individualized high risk therapeutic group homes.

Target Group: The program serves children in out-of-state treatment care; children aged 1-10 in need of crisis treatment, and transitional aged youth,

aged 16-21, in need of individualized support services. The program also provides in-state treatment facilities and programs to enable

children currently in out-of-state treatment to return and to avoid further out-of-state placements due to the lack of appropriate programs.

Resource Allocation: Programs and funding have been allocated statewide.

Criteria: Eligibility criteria for this program includes the criteria found in 7 AAC 78.100, and requires the applicant have the ability to bill Medicaid.

Applicants, as well as their proposed project partners must have prior experience providing similar services.

Appropriation: Division of Behavioral Health and the Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority.

Comprehensive Behavioral Health Prevention and Early Intervention Services

Authority: AS 47.37 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act; AS 47.37.045 Community Action Against Substance Abuse; AS 47.30.475 Grant-in-aid program; AS 47.30.470-AS 47.30.500 Alchoholism and Drug Abuse; Public Health Service Act, as amended, Section 501-05 (42 U.S.C. 290aa); and 7AAC 78 Department of Health and Social Services Grants

Priorities: The goal of this program is to provide comprehensive, integrated behavioral health prevention and early intervention services related to substance use and abuse, suicide, fetal alcohol spectrum disorders, youth development and resiliency, and promotion of community, family and individual wellness across Alaska. This program is representative of the new focus of Division of Behavioral Health on a broader behavioral health direction to integrate social and health services into intertwined holistic services that will lead to improvement in our suicide rates, family wellness, reduced drinking among teens and adults, healthy pregnancies free of alcohol-related disabilities, and stronger and healthier communities, families and individuals.

Target Group: Services are provided statewide, focusing on prevention and early intervention services across the life span (all ages). Primary focus will be on the individuals we know are at higher risk, including children whose parents have a problem with alcohol and/or drug addiction and dependency. Attention will be given to regional location of grant programs, making sure there is a fair distribution of grant funds across the state and among rural and urban populations.

Resource Allocation: Funding is from a combination of federal funding, general funds and alcohol tax funds. A 10% match is required except where reduced by approved exemption.

Criteria: Eligible applicants include nonprofit organizations; municipalities and Regional Educational Attendance Areas or other political subdivisions of the state; other State agencies; Alaska Native Tribes; or a combination of these entities. Funding is issued through a statewide competitive solicitation process. Proposals are solicited that address the goal of promoting communities utilizing effective practices and partnerships.

Proposals are categorized in four (4) categories based on community size and agencies offering multi-programs or programs to multi-communities. Proposals must contain tangible evidence of participation in community association, partnership or collaborative agreements that will enhance the applicants' ability to achieve program goals and desired outcomes.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Behavioral Health.

SED Children and Youth with FASD program promotes development of an Alaskan model, combining promising practices in wraparound for children and youth with SED, with research contributing to the evidence base of best practices for treating children with FASD. This project is intended to provide needed individualized services, and add to the evidence base for promising practices for children and youth with these multiple diagnoses.

Resource Allocation: Services are solicited statewide.

Criteria: Grantees provide independent project evaluation to assess the process and outcome of Evidence Based Practices delivered. Evidence

Independent Case Management and Flexible Supports

Eligible services could include medications, psychiatric care, counseling, peer support, medical care, housing or other emergent necessities.

Target Group: Serious mentally ill person means a person who is 18 years of age or older and who satisfies both of the following criteria:

- 1. Must be diagnosed as having a major Psychotic or Mood Disorder or another serious persistent mental disorder; and
- 2. Must have impaired role functioning, consisting of at least two of the following:
- a. Social role: an inability to function independently in the role of worker, student, or homemaker;
- b. Daily living skills: an inability to engage independently in personal care (grooming, personal hygiene, etc.) or community living activities (handling personal finances, using community resources, performing household chores, etc.); or
- c. Social acceptability: an inability to exhibit appropriate social behavior, which results in demand for intervention by the mental health and/or judicial system.

Resource Allocation: Independent Case Management funds were initially provided for startup costs that transition to Medicaid billing as agencies establish operations.

Criteria: The intent of this project is prevention of institutionalization, promoting service effectiveness, choice, recovery, and accountability, all within a consumer-centric perspective.

Program services under the Youth Court component include case screening, adjudication, disposition, and case management for youth referred for non-violent first or second misdemeanor offenses and/or status offenses. All cases handled by youth courts must be congruent with statutory authority, specifically AS 04.16.050(b)(1) and AS 47.12.400.

This program will also manage minor consuming alcohol (MCA) and minor in possession (MIP) cases from referral to completion.

Target Group: The program's target population consists of Bethel-area youth under the age of 18.

Resource Allocation: A need for services was identified in Bethel by community members and more than 10 local agencies, resulting in services to be

provided through a single local agency working directly with the Bethel Community Diversion Panel.

Target Group: The target group consists of the communities served by the regional non-profit tribal organizations identified in the Final Settlement Agreement between the Native Village of Curyung et al and the Office of Children's Services.

Resource Allocation: The service area of this program includes the communities served by the twelve identified regional non-profit tribal organziations. As outlined in the Final Settlement Agreement, a Request for Letters of Interest will be issued to all twelve of the eligible organizations. If all twelve are interested in participating, the \$1,200,000 will be divided equally (\$100,000 each). If fewer than all twelve of the corporations are interested, the \$1,200,000 will be divided equally between the interested parties. Should an eligible corporation request funds less than the equal portion allowed between all participating corporations, the Office of Children's Services will determine if and how any excess funds should be distributed.

Criteria: The case filed by the Native Village of Curyung et al contends the State has violated the Indian Child Welfare Act and the Adoption Assistance & Child Welfare Act of 1980 by failing to 1) properly screen children for special needs, 2) provide the villages with adequate notice of the children's placement transfers, 3) comply with placement provisions and 4) adequately recruit and retain native foster homes. Establishing the compliance grants will provide the identified regional non-profit corporations the opportunity to use their resources to improve the State's compliance with ICWA. As a requirement of the Agreement, each grantee awarded an ICWA Compliance Grant will generate reports demonstrating the success of the compliance grants. Continuation of the program will depend on if reported outcomes demonstrate an improvement in compliance.

Authority: Federal Regulations - 7 CFR Part 246; Annual WIC State Plan; 7AAC 78 DHSS Grant Regulations

Priorities: Women, Infant and Children (WIC) grants fund local administration of the WIC program, which provides supplemental nutritious foods to alleviate specific health problems to low income women, infants and children. This goal is in compliance with federal and state regulations and policies. The relative need among geographic areas and populations for expanding or providing services is evaluated by determining: 1) the incidence of low birth weight among newborn infants; 2) the rate of infant mortality; 3) the percentages of births to women under 19 years of age; 4) the rate of participation in the Food Stamp Program; 5) the rate of employment; and 6) the percentage of people whose income is below 185% of federal poverty guidelines. Families enrolled in Denali Kid Care with incomes above 185% of

the federal poverty level are adjunctively WIC income-eligible.

Target Group: Those persons served by the programs administered by these grantees include: pregnant and breast-feeding women, infants and children up to 5 years old at nutritional risk, and postpartum women. The target area is statewide. The projected number of clients to be served is 26,000 per month. Counts are kept on the number of women, infants and children served.

Resource Allocation: The first priority for funding is for the continuation of services to enrolled families. Criteria include: staff needed to provide program services; number of satellite clinics; other necessary expenses; and in-kind contribution/resources available to the local agency. Budgets are considered individually in order to meet local agency needs and compared to ensure equity.

Criteria: Grant applications require description of organization, details of budget, population to be served, a program plan with measurable goals and objectives, previous experience, and documentation of community support. Department staff and a Proposal Evaluation Committee review and evaluate applications.

Appropriation: As of July 1, 2007, grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Public Assistance.

Autism Evaluation and Diagnostic Services

Authority: 7AAC 78 Department of Health & Social Services Grant Programs

Priorities: This program provides for the delivery of statewide pediatric neurodevelopmental evaluation and diagnostic services for autism and cooccurring neurodevelopmental and other medical needs using an interdisciplinary team model of care from an already established instate health care agency. Specifically, the grantee will provide expanded diagnostic services through a pediatric or family nurse practitioner who will receive training in autism evaluation, diagnosis and service delivery as part of the grant award. This project was initiated by families who currently have children with autism who participate as an autism subcommittee for the Governor's Council on Disabilities and Special Education and in response to feedback collected as part of the Maternal and Child Health (MCH) Title V Block grant needs assessment. This project will assist in meeting the 6 core national performance measures for children with special health care needs required by the Maternal, Child and Family Health Bureau.

Target Group: Children ages newborn to five years throughout the State of Alaska. Families who experience developmental delays associated with autism spectrum disorders and other co-occurring neurodevelopmental disorders.

Resource Allocation: Available funding is provided to one agency to respond to the need for autism evaluation and diagnostic services statewide.

Criteria: To maximize the use of limited resources and efficiency of services, funds will be awarded to a single entity in the State that has established and delivered pediatric neurodevelopmental services to children using a medical model and other disciplines; and is an effective change agent/system-builder collaborating with various agencies around Alaska to assist in developing family-centered systems of care for children with disabilities and their families.

Criteria: Applicants for grants are asked to demonstrate a history of: 1) involvement in developing/implementing community-based diabetes intervention projects; 2) providing diabetes services to minorities, medically underserved and/or elderly known to be at high risk for developing diabetes and its complications; and 3) monitoring health outcomes.

Emergency Medical Services & Injury Prevention

Authority: AS 18.08 Emergency Medical Services; 7 AAC 78 Department of Health & Social Services Grant Programs.

Priorities: The EMS-IP program helps to accomplish the goals and objectives of the EMS system. Three primary services are received from the grants: 1) planning, development and coordination of regional EMS systems; 2) training and certification testing for emergency medical personnel, including those working with ground and air medical services; 3) targeted injury prevention services.

A statewide system of local, regional, and state EMS councils has been organized for client input. The councils provide direct input regarding the needs and abilities of each respective community and region. Because an EMS system is highly complex, involving many disciplines, the councils traditionally are composed of knowledgeable people in many different fields, from physicians and nurses to prehospital EMS providers and communications experts.

Target Group: Services are targeted to the entire state population through regional providers. Whenever a life or limb threatening injury or illness strikes suddenly, the EMS system serves to stabilize and transport a patient to the most appropriate treatment facility as quickly as possible. Prompt stabilization and timely transportation are often the keys to saving a life. The EMS program also provides specialized emergency medical training to physicians, mid-level practitioners, and nurses in the pre-hospital, rural clinic, and hospital settings. EMS -IP grants train and certify approximately 4,000 pre-hospital emergency medical providers. These emergency providers will transport an estimated 40,000 patients to hospitals by ground ambulance during the year and perform several thousand emergency air ambulance transports. Based on a history of required self-reports, approximately 2,000 additional people will be provided Emergency Trauma Technician (ETT), Cardio Pulminary Resuscitation (CPR), and first aid training each year. In addition, councils work with local communities to identify, prioritize and seek funding for essential equipment. Finally, councils operate injury prevention programs, which provide information and materials regarding injury prevention activities to thousands of Alaskans.

Resource Allocation: Resources are allocated statewide, through regional organizations, and to three Native organizations that provide Emergency Medical Services.

Criteria: Grantees are required to address nationally and state recognized components of an EMS system in terms of goals, objectives, and methodology for achieving those goals.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Public Health.

Resource Allocation: Funding levels are determined based upon the relative number of HIV positive people projected to be served in each area, federal priorities, and the amount of federal HIV Care funds received by the State.

Criteria: Potential grantees must: demonstrate a history of providing services to persons with HIV and AIDS; identify services to be provided/purchased; specify objectives, activities, and timelines for implementation; identify evaluation mechanisms; and provide an itemized budget to address the area(s) identified in the Request for Proposals. Grantees provide quarterly progress, data and financial reports; complete federal data forms annually; and provide any specified deliverables. The Division may require changes in project activities based on project evaluation, and will develop methodologies for implementing such changes in consultation with the grantee.

Appropriation: Grant funds are appropriated to the Division of Public Health.

Priorities: Required services include one or more of the following, depending upon the populations for which they are proposed: 1) partner notification services for newly reported cases of HIV, AIDS and STDs; 2) targeted street and community outreach; 3) community-level intervention; 4) single or multiple session group health education/risk reduction interventions, using interactive approaches and based on curricula shown to be effective; 5) individual health education/risk reduction counseling; 6) non-clinic HIV counseling and testing; 7) prevention case management; and 8) health communications/public information activities. Resource Allocation: Funding levels are determined based on priorities established collaboratively with the Alaska HIV Prevention and Planning Group, federal funding agency requirements, state needs, the quality of the proposed interventions, and the amount of federal funds available.

Criteria: Grantees are required to demonstrate capacity to reach the target population and carry out the activities proposed; to specify objectives, activities, and timelines for implementing interventions likely to be effective; to specify evaluation mechanisms; and provide an itemized budget to address the area(s) identified in the Request for Proposals. Quarterly progress, data, and financial reports are required along with any specified deliverables. The Division may require changes in project activities based on project evaluation, and will develop methodologies for implementing such changes in consultation with the grantee.

Public Health Preparedness and Response for Bioterrorism

Authority: AS 44.29.020 (Department Authority) and 7 AAC 78 Department of Health & Social Services Grant Programs.

Priorities: Organizations receiving grants will participate in development of a statewide assessment of needs, communication plans and targeted communication strategies. Services provided will increase preparedness for and response to bioterrorism, outbreaks of infectious disease, and other public health threats and emergencies with three specific areas of focus.

The Alaska Native Health system focus will develop a plan describing the role of the Alaska Native health system in a bioterrorist attack; ensure Native health system issues and resources are identified in and coordinated with the State of Alaska plans; promote participation of the Native health system organizations and personnel in preparedness training, and federal drills and exercises; and surveil for key infectious disease syndromes.

The greater Anchorage area focus will enhance direct surveillance activities; increase capacity for planning and coordinating activities, including pharmaceutical caches; coordinate testing the Emergency Response Plan of the Municipality Health Department; participate in development and implementation of the Health Alert Network; and develop a training plan for public health staff and assist in continued participation in the Alaska Public Health Training Network.

The healthcare facilities focus will develop and implement regional preparedness plans and protocols for hospitals, outpatient facilities, EMS systems and poison control centers in collaborative statewide or regional models. Preparedness services will also address nonterrorist epidemics of rare diseases, exposure to chemical toxins and radiological materials, and mass casualties due to explosions.

Target Group: Target groups, respective to the areas of program focus are: Alaska Native healthcare facilities and those they serve; Municipality of Anchorage health department staff and other healthcare professionals in Anchorage, as well as the population in and around the Municipality of Anchorage; and hospitals, emergency medical systems, poison control centers, community health centers, rural health clinics, federally qualified health centers, tribally-owned health care facilities, and other outpatient facilities known to be vital points of entry into the health care system.

Resource Allocation: Funding levels are based on federal priorities and the amount of federal funds available to the State.

Criteria: Awarded proposals must provide a work plan for enhancing public health infrastructure and coordinate planning, exercises, and response efforts with the State of Alaska, Division of Public Health. The work plan must specify goals, objectives, activities, and

Tobacco Cessation Interventions

Priorities: As a means to reduce death, disability and the economic burden caused by tobacco use, evidence-based tobacco control programs are needed that respond to the four goal areas of the State of Alaska Tobacco Prevention and Control (SOA-TPC) Program, and the current Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) Best Practices for Comprehensive Tobacco Control Programs. Tobacco Prevention and Control (Community Based Grants)

Authority: AS 44.29, AS 47.050.010 and 7AAC 78 Department of Health & Social Services Grant Programs.

Priorities: The mission of the Tobacco Prevention and Control (TPC) Program is to improve the health of all Alaskans by decreasing death, disability and economic burden caused by tobacco use and exposure to second hand smoke. Tobacco use continues to be Alaska's number-one public health problem. This grant program provides funding to communities that are actively involved in population-based, policy-focused tobacco prevention and control strategies.

The Alaska TPC Program has developed four major public health goals:

- (1) to prevent initiation of tobacco use among young people;
- (2) to promote quitting among adults and young people;
- (3) to identify and eliminate tobacco-related disparities in specific populations identified as of special vulnerability or with above-norm tobacco use patterns; and
- (4) to eliminate exposure to secondhand smoke.

The structure of Alaska's tobacco program is based on recommendations from the CDC's Best Practices for Comprehensive Tobacco Control Programs. The statewide program is organized, funded, and managed as program components designed to accomplish and measure the TPC Program goals. The program components include:

- (1) community-based programs to reduce tobacco use;
- (2) enforcement (in Division of Behavioral Health);
- (3) statewide programs that increase the capacity of local programs by providing technical assistance on evaluating programs, promoting media advocacy, implementing smoke free policies, and reducing minors' access to tobacco;
- (4) cessation programs;
- (5) media/counter-marketing;
- (6) surveillance and evaluation; and
- (7) administration and management.

Target Group: Alaskans who are affected by tobacco use.

Resource Allocation: Tobacco prevention and control community-based grants are funded through State of Alaska Tobacco Use Education and Cessation funds

Criteria: Community based grantees that demonstrate broad-based community involvement in their local tobacco control alliance, and submit an action plan that includes long-term policy interventions.

Since the program participant is authorized to choose their provider from a list of qualified providers, individuals currently receive services in nearly 150 communities across the state.

National Family Caregiver Support Program

Authority: Federal Title III-e of the reauthorized Older American Act; AS 47.65 Service Programs for Older Alaskans & Other Adults; and 7 AAC 78 Department of Health & Social Services Grant Programs

Priorities: The Older Americans Act programs have long recognized caregivers as key players in meeting the needs of Older Persons in the community. The creation of the National Family Caregiver Support Program (NFCSP) in the 2000 Reauthorized Older Americans Act for the first time, requires all State units on aging to focus on the caregiver rather than the Older Consumer, and to provide service primarily for the benefit of caregivers themselves. The NFCSP is intended to offer a multi-faceted system of caregiver support that includes, at a minimum, the following services: Information to caregivers about available services; Assistance to caregivers in gaining access to support services; Individual counseling, Support groups and Training to caregivers to assist the caregivers in making decisions and solving problems related to their care giving roles; Respite care to enable caregivers to be temporarily relieved from their care giving responsibilities; and Supplemental Services, on a limited basis, to complement care provided by eligible caregivers. These services are implemented through partnerships between State, Tribal, and Local Governments, both Public and Private organizations,

and Community Service providers in order to develop programs whose sole purpose is to provide relief from emotional, physical and

financial stress experienced by Family Caregivers.

Target Group: Two population groups are to be served by the program: Family Caregivers of adults 60 and older, and grandparents and relative caregivers aged 60 and over of children not more than 18 years of age, are eligible to received support services offered by Alaska's

Family Caregiver programs.

Resource Allocation: Allocation of resources is based on the Federally approved State Plan for Services and funding limitations as indicated in Title III-e.

Criteria: Grantees must have demonstrated knowledge and experience in providing services to the target population.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services.

Nursing Facility Transition Program

Authority: Americans with Disabilities Act; Olmstead Decision; New Freedom Initiative; and 7 AAC 78 Department of Health & Social Services

Grant Programs

Priorities: The Nursing Facility Transition Program provides services for people with disabilities or the elderly to move from nursing facilities into the community in order that they might live in the least restrictive setting possible and integrate into and participate in their community. Grantee Transition Coordinators work closely with nursing facility social workers and discharge planners and the DSDS-LTCU staff for timely and efficient discharge and transition. Funds from these grants may provide services as diverse as security deposits (no rent payments); groceries; trial visits to home or to an Assisted Living Home; or transportation, room and board for a caregiver from a rural area to an urban area for training in the care of the recipient.

Services to be provided: outreach and counseling, assessment of consumer for appropriateness of transition, peer counseling, home assessment for safety, transition planning and implementation of the plan. Funding for: home or environmental modifications, Travel/Room/Board for rural caregivers to receive client specific training, trial trips to home or assisted living home, short-term payment for an appropriate worker of skill level needed, security deposits, one-time initial cleaning of home, basic furnishings necessary to set up a livable home, transportation to a new home, other needed items or services as may be approved by State Program Coordinator, ongoing follow-up and counseling as needed, evaluation of effectiveness of services, and evaluation of continuing quality of life for the consumer.

Target Group: The Nursing Facility Transition Program targets any Alaska resident over the age of 21 who resides in a nursing facility and who wants to transition back into the community. Clients must have, or be expected to have, Medicaid Waiver approval within six months. This program is available to any resident of a nursing facility in Alaska. Alaska residents residing in a facility outside the state will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

Resource Allocation: Priority is given to applicants who document that they can provide staff time as matching in-kind funds and/or other resources necessary to deliver and coordinate services statewide.

Criteria: Proposers must have a statewide network specific to the type of services requested and the capability to coordinate activities with satellite agencies or through agreements with like agencies. Applicants must submit a map showing the location of satellite offices or agreement agencies. The description of proposed services through satellite agencies and/or coordination with like agencies must be fully supported by written agreements.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services.

Nutrition, Transportation and Support Services

Authority: Title III Older Americans Act; AS 47.45 Older Alaskans & 47.65 Service Programs for Older Alaskans and Other Adults; 7 AAC 78 Department of Health & Social Services Grant Programs

Priorities: The Nutrition, Transportation and Support Services (NTS) program, authorized under Title III of the Older Americans Act, provides grants to local community organizations such as senior centers, non-profit agencies, and tribal or local governments, in order to meet the needs of Alaska's aging population. NTS program provides services to Seniors age 60 and over, helping them to remain independent and healthy in their communities. Services are targeted to those with the greatest economic and social need through a State Plan funding formula developed by the Alaska Commission on Aging in collaboration with the Department of Health and Social Services. Services provided through this program include Information and Assistance, Outreach, Congregate and Home Delivered Meals, Assisted and Unassisted Transportation, Homemaker, Health Promotion and Disease Prevention, Senior Companion, Foster Grandparent/Elder Mentor, and Retired Senior Volunteer Programs. Also funded are Statewide Media and Legal Service providers.

Target Group: These services are available to Alaskans 60 years of age and over. In addition, the target populations include those Seniors whose incomes are below the poverty guidelines, live in rural areas, are members of minority groups, and are physically frail. These categories for targeting services are based on requirements in the Federal Older Americans Act.

Resource Allocation: Funding is allocated through the Intra State Funding Formula approved in the State Plan for Services using the most current U.S.

Census data. Each of six regions in the state receive an allocation of funds based on the number of individuals 60 years old and over, and the target populations stated above with specific weighting factors.

Criteria: Applicants must meet the requirements for program delivery. Proposals are evaluated based on the criteria in the Request for Proposals and prior year performance.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services.

Protection and Advocacy

Authority: Programmatic: Public Law 106-402 DD Act; Americans with Disabilities Act; AS 47.80 Persons with Disabilities and 7 AAC 78

Department of Health & Social Services Grant Programs

Priorities: The Protection of Rights & Investigation of Abuse program provides people with developmental disabilities (DD) and their families

training and assistance in methods to resolve grievances they may have with providers of community developmental disability services. Services funded by the program range from information and referral, negotiation and mediation, various interventions in line with administrative recourse and, as a last resort, legal consultation and remedies. Under the Federal DD Act, the state must have a system of protection and advocacy that has the capacity to provide administrative and legal remedies to civil rights concerns for people with developmental disabilities. The program exists to assist eligible individuals, sometimes through their families and guardians to engage in their own advocacy. In collaboration with the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services, this grant has been used to emphasize training

to recipients in such areas as special education, social security and the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Target Group: In order to receive this grant, an organization must have the capacity to provide the Department with an immediate statewide response

to complaints of abuse and neglect by persons meeting the definition developmentally disabled as described in AS 47.80.900.

Resource Allocation: A single agency provides statewide Protection and Advocacy Services. This award incorporates and makes maximum use of other federal, state, and private funds, which are awarded directly to the sole provider to establish and maintain protection and advocacy

services to Alaskans with mental illness and other unique populations with concerns similar to those of persons with developmental

disabilities. The Disability Law Center has continuously performed these unique services for 25 years.

Criteria: The grantee must have the unique legal authority under state and federal law to investigate complaints by vulnerable people with developmental disabilities, of abuse and neglect in institutions. Additionally, the grantee must assist and train the target population

statewide in identifying and obtaining needed services from generic public benefits and entitlement programs, and special education for adolescents with developmental disabilities. The Disability Law Center (DLC) was created in 1977 to meet the requirements of Alaska

Statute 47.80.020 to have a system of protection and advocacy for people experiencing developmental disabilities (DD).

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services.

Senior In-Home Services

Authority: The Older Americans Act; AS 47.65 Service Programs for Older Alaskans & Other Adults; AS 47.30.056 Use of money in the mental

health trust authority settlement income account; and 7 AAC 78 Department of Health & Social Services Grant Programs

Priorities: The goal for DSDS Senior Grants is to provide a flexible delivery system that best meets the needs of seniors in their homes and communities statewide and to provide a safety net to seniors and their caregivers who do not meet level of care for the Home

Community Based (HCB) Medicaid Waiver. Senior In-Home Services is the provision of Care Coordination, Chore, Respite Care and Extended Respite Care services to individuals of any age with Alzheimers Disease or Related Disorders (ADRD) and individuals 60 years of age and older, who are frail, have physical disabilities or mental health issues. These services will be targeted toward individuals who are at risk for institutional placement, have greatest social and economic need, are Alaska Native or are residing in a rural area. The intent of this program is to provide in-home services to help recipients remain independent in their homes and

communities for as long as possible.

Target Group: The target group includes persons of any age with Alzheimers disease or related disorders, Frail/Elderly, physically or mentally disabled

persons 60 years of age or older, Adults 18 years of age or older with similar disabilities and service needs to older Alaskans.

Resource Allocation: Resource allocation is based on the funding formula in the Alaska State Plan on Aging. Service area is statewide.

Criteria: Grantees must be a certified Care Coordination, Respite and/or Chore provider agency under the most current DSDS Medicaid Waiver

regulations. In addition, all Care Coordination and Respite providers must meet Care Coordination and Respite standards adopted by

the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services.

Senior Information Office - Medicare Outreach

Authority: PL 101-508 codified at 42 USC 1395 b-4, Section 4360 of Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1990; and 7 AAC 78 Department of Health & Social Services Grant Programs

Priorities: Services through this program provide personalized counseling, education and outreach to assist current Medicare beneficiaries and persons eligible for Medicare benefits with their Medicare questions. Funds support a network of local programs, staff and volunteers that provide accurate and objective information to help beneficiaries understand and utilize their Medicare benefits including preventive benefits. This grant will supplement outreach efforts to the targeted populations.

Target Group: Alaska has 52,000 Medicare beneficiaries of which approximately 36,000 reside in the Anchorage area. This project begins with targeting those that should be applying for low income subsidy "extra help". Federal funders have prioritized the DHSS efforts to direct services to low income seniors in Anchorage including Korean, Filipino, Asian Pacific, African American and Spanish-speaking citizens, and people who experience mental health issues and/or homelessness. Special emphasis will be placed on partners that can penetrate the unmet needs of limited income seniors living in designated zip code areas.

Resource Allocation: This grant funds part time Medicare information/outreach counselors located in Anchorage and positioned to reach the many low income seniors in the Anchorage area.

Criteria: To maximize the benefit of the available resources, eligibility for grant award is limited to agencies with existing infrastructure already providing services to seniors, and/or agencies that provide culturally based activities or services to the targeted communities. Applicants must also demonstrate adequate accessibility to services by potential recipients, and have staff with current training in current in Medicare counseling services. A consideration for award includes the ability to provide language appropriate counseling to the targeted ethnic populations.

Short-Term Assistance and Referral Programs STAR

Authority: AS 47.80 Persons with Disabilities and 7 AAC 78 Department of Health & Social Services Grant Programs

Priorities: The STAR program exists to assist people with developmental disabilities (DD) and their families by addressing short-term needs before

a crisis occurs, and to defer the need for more expensive residential services or long-term care. Many people who are on the DD waitlist access STAR services. Allowable costs under the STAR program include, but are not limited to: respite, transportation, adaptive equipment, and services that assist the family, such as behavioral training or medical appointments not funded by another source. Assistance with basic living needs necessary to avert a crisis that are not covered by another public or private program, such as emergency medical transportation and clothing may be approved on a limited basis. Rent and utilities expenses may be approved as a

one-time payment if necessary to keep the family in the home and while other resources are being secured.

Target Group: People with developmental disabilities and their families may access STAR services.

Resource Allocation: STAR grants are allocated geographically and provide funding for personnel and operating costs to enable grantees to serve people

within their census area.

Criteria: This program was designed to be flexible and to respond immediately to meet the needs of consumers who have been determined

eligible for developmental disabilities services under AS 47.80.900. In so doing, the STAR grant program has been an effective way to

prevent crisis situations and to provide necessary supports, reducing the need for more intensive services.

Appropriation: STAR Program funding is appropriated to the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services.

Student Living Center Services for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing

Authority: AS 47.80 Persons with Disabilities; 7 AAC 78 Department of Health and Social Services Grant Programs

Priorities: The program provides residential services and daily support to students from outside the Anchorage area while they are attending the

Alaska State School for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing, within two licensed board and care homes and one foster care placement home. Individuals participate in life skills training, community activities, and after school sports or clubs. Services are provided 24 hours a day, seven days a week during the academic year. During summer, when students do not occupy the living center, the residences may be

used as temporary housing for families of developmentally disabled children who are in Anchorage for medical treatment or evaluation.

Target Group: Services are provided statewide to persons who meet specific criteria outlined in the State of Alaska's definition of developmental

disabilities (AS 47.80.900) in need of educational services at the Alaska State School for Deaf and Hard of Hearing. Priority placement

is given to children from outside the Anchorage area.

Resource Allocation: Services are provided in Anchorage where the Alaska State School for Deaf and Hard of Hearing is located. Funding is provided to

DHSS through a Reimbursable Services Agreement with the Alaska Department of Education and Early Development.

Criteria: Grant funds are distributed through the Department's grant process. Each grantee is required to be reviewed regularly by the Division's

Quality Assurance review team, and by an independent financial auditor. A Division-approved action plan is required from the grantee, responding to any recommendations made by the review team. Standards of care are expressed as Service Principles stated in AS

47.80.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services.


