

piscopal Archdeacon of the Yukon and the Arctic, Hudson Stuck was a missionary, social reformer, explorer, environmentalist, mountaineer, and author. Karstens, he co-led the first expedition to successfully climb the South Peak of Denali (1913), which is the highest peak in North America. He died of bronchial pneumonia at Fort Yukon, Alaska, on October 10, 1920. He shares a feast day with John Muir of April 22 on the liturgical calendar of saints and commemorations of the Episcopal Church in the United States of America.

s part of the responsibility to promote and protect the well being of Alaskans, the State of Alaska Department of Health and Social Services provides a broad array of health and human services. Many services are provided through grants to nonprofit agencies, Alaska Native entities, and municipalities around the State.

In Fiscal Year 2012, over \$165 million of the Department's annual budget was awarded through grants, with additional services supported through contracts and provider agreements, where those mechanisms better serve the targeted populations. DHSS manages 109 programs and 609 operating grants, which were awarded to over 200 agencies. Alaska Youth Suicide Prevention

Authority: Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration SAMHSA, 7AAC 78 Department of Health and Social Services Grant

Programs.

Priorities: Youth ages 20-29 have the highest number and rate of suicide in Alaska. The Alaska Youth Suicide Prevention Program funds Regional

Suicide Prevention Teams around the state that utilize the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Strategic Prevention Framework (SPF). Community planning methods include identifying needs, resources, readiness necessary for building capacity and the development of a Strategic Regional Suicide Prevention Plan. The plan will identify the utilization of best practices including environmental and other prevention-based strategies that will demonstrate anticipated outcomes associated with

increasing protective factors and reducing risk factors associated with suicide and suicide behaviors.

Target Group: Youth ages 20-29. This program will also target higher risk populations such as Alaska Native male teens, preteen females, returning

veterans ages 18-24, gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender youth and youth residing in an institutional setting such as residential

treatment, foster care, and detention or correctional facilities.

Resource Allocation: Services are sought Statewide.

Criteria: Eligible applicants include nonprofit organizations; municipalities and Regional Educational Attendance Areas or other political

subdivisions of the state; other State agencies; Alaska Native Tribes; or a combination of these entities. Funding is issued through a statewide competitive solicitation process. Proposals are solicited that address the goal of promoting communities utilizing effective practices and partnerships. Proposals must contain tangible evidence of participation in community association, partnership or

collaborative agreements that will enhance the applicants ability to achieve program goals and desired outcomes.

Appropriation: Grant Funding is appropriated to the Division of Behavioral Health.

Alcohol Safety Action Program (Adult and Juvenile)

Authority: AS 47.37 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act; 7AAC 78 Department of Health and Social Services Grant Programs.

Priorities: Priorities of the program are alcohol and substance abuse screening, referral, and monitoring education or treatment requirements of alcohol-related misdemeanor cases. Each program has an adult component and may have a juvenile component.

Target Group: Adult ASAP: Services are intended for clients who have a current or pending DUI misdemeanor criminal case. Most clients are referred directly from the court as a condition of their sentence, although they may be assigned prior to their conviction as a condition of release.

Juvenile ASAP: Services are intended for clients who are referred for adolescent assessment, referral, and treatment related to underage drinking and drug offenses. Juvenile ASAP serves clients aged 14-21 who have been convicted of a minor consuming, minor in possession, or tobacco violation. Most clients are referred directly from the court as a condition of their sentence, although they may be assigned prior to their conviction as a condition of release.

Resource Allocation: Criteria for allocation of funds for these services are 1) cost per case; 2) size of caseload and; 3) support of the local justice system.

Geographic consideration is based on the number of cases in each court location. Award of Juvenile Alcohol Safety Action Program funding is made only to grantees that currently have an adult ASAP infrastructure in place. A 10% match is required.

Criteria: Eligible applicants will provide services in communities that is an Alaska Court System site with an approved alcohol and/or drug abuse treatment program. Criteria for awarding grants are derived from statute and regulation and include evaluation of component costs, budget summary and narrative, program narrative, and goals and objectives. Recommendations are made by an evaluation of statistical data reported from the courts and the information provided in applications.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Behavioral Health.

Priorities: The Community Service Patrol is an integral part of a multi-faceted service system designed to provide protection, identification, and

referral for treatment for the targeted population. The Sobering Center will provide a more appropriate and preferable setting than the local correctional facility or emergency room. At the Sobering Center, these consumers will also be screened and will recive case management services to connect them to other services such as referrals for Substance Abuse assessments, Mental Health

Assessments and referrals into substance abuse treatment and mental health treatment.

Target Group: The targeted population is chronic inebriates in need of detoxification services.

Resource Allocation: The Bethel region has been identified by the AMHTA as a target area for specialized chronic inebriate services due to the large number

of Title 47 protective holds that result in people being taken to local correctional facilities or hospital emergency rooms.

Criteria: Available data documenting incarcerations associated with protective custody holds demonstrates that the City of Bethel has one of the

highest incidences of protective holds in the State. Because of this, the Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority (AMHTA) and Division of

Behavioral Health have identified the region as a priority for additional program efforts.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Behavioral Health.

Priorities: The Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority allocated funding for grants to provide rental subsidies and related housing costs, as well as

residential support services, for adult individuals. Participants will receive intensive, on-site residential support services and living skills development, as well as supportive employment training. 24-hour outreach services will be available to respond in time of need. This program provides funding to address a critical gap in our system for long-term housing assistance to a population that is excluded from current programs. Clients are offered a chance to demonstrate the ability to remain in stable housing and reestablish eligibility for the

HUD Housing Choice Voucher program.

Target Group: The Bridge Home program targets adults who are exiting institutions with a serious, chronic mental illness and a history of cycling from

the Department of Corrections, Alaska Psychiatric Institute and homelessness.

Resource Allocation: Services will be provided in the Anchorage area with a single grant to provide services to the highest density target population.

Criteria: Program goals include: ensuring public safety; reducing criminal and clinical recidivism; providing a supported housing alternative to

corrections; assisting clients to achieve self-sufficiency by accessing mainstream resources, such as a social security benefits and federal housing subsidies; and demonstrating the overall cost savings to the State of Alaska for the use of supported housing versus

institutionalization.

Appropriation: Funding is appropriated to the Division of Behavioral Health.

Priorities: The program goal is to enhance or establish an array of services statewide through pilot projects to ensure that all children in out-of-

state custody have appropriate treatment options within their community or close to their families. Having treatment options and family support within their own community enhances the child's likelihood of success for returning home. Pilot projects include enhancing inhome treatment services and resources for the prevention of crisis situations; crisis nursery/treatment preschool; individualized support services for transitional aged youth 16-21; mental health respite/stabilization homes; treatment resource homes; therapeutic group

homes; and individualized high risk therapeutic group homes.

Target Group: The program serves children in out-of-state treatment care; children aged 1-10 in need of crisis treatment, and transitional aged youth,

aged 16-21, in need of individualized support services. The program also provides in-state treatment facilities and programs to enable children currently in out-of-state treatment to return and to avoid further out-of-state placements due to the lack of appropriate programs.

Resource Allocation: Programs and funding have been allocated statewide.

Criteria: Eligibility criteria for this program includes the criteria found in 7 AAC 78.100, and requires the applicant have the ability to bill Medicaid.

Applicants, as well as their proposed project partners must have prior experience providing similar services.

Appropriation: Division of Behavioral Health and the Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority.

Priorities: The goal of this program is to provide comprehensive, integrated behavioral health prevention and early intervention services related to substance use and abuse, suicide, fetal alcohol spectrum disorders, youth development and resiliency, and promotion of community, family and individual wellness across Alaska. This program is representative of the new focus of Division of Behavioral Health on a broader behavioral health direction to integrate social and health services into intertwined holistic services that will lead to improvement in our suicide rates, family wellness, reduced drinking among teens and adults, healthy pregnancies free of alcohol-related disabilities, and stronger and healthier communities, families and individuals.

Target Group: Services are provided statewide, focusing on prevention and early intervention services across the life span (all ages). Attention will be given to regional location of grant programs, making sure there is a fair distribution of grant funds across the state and among rural and urban populations.

Resource Allocation: Funding is from a combination of federal funding, general funds and alcohol tax funds. A 10% match is required except where reduced by approved exemption.

Criteria: Eligible applicants include nonprofit organizations; municipalities and Regional Educational Attendance Areas or other political subdivisions of the state; other State agencies; Alaska Native Tribes; or a combination of these entities. Funding is issued through a statewide competitive solicitation process. Proposals are solicited that address the goal of promoting communities utilizing effective practices and partnerships.

Proposals are categorized in four (4) categories based on community size and program-type (Building Capacity or Implementation). Proposals must contain tangible evidence of participation in community coalitions, partnerships and/ or collaborative agreements that will enhance the applicants' ability to achieve program goals and desired outcomes.

Evidence Based Practices

Authority: AS 47.30 Mental Health; AS 47.37 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act; 7 AAC 78 Department of Health and Social

Services Grant Programs.

Priorities: Evidence Based Practices (EBP) are those programs that are scientifically tested to demonstrate that they improve client outcomes.

Integration of mental health and substance abuse treatment services, an EBP, was the first major step in developing a phased statewide behavioral health system. Projects under this program represent additional steps towards implementing program designs that current

evidence suggest will be the most successful therapeutic and cost effective program models.

Target Group: Women and Children programs deliver services for addressing special treatment needs of women with children, for women with substance abuse problems: health services, mental health treatment, child care, transportation, safe housing and parenting skills

training, as well as problems arising from histories of domestic violence and sexual assault.

Youth with Families programs deliver services for adolescents and their families, addressing unique treatment needs of adolescents and issues that play significant roles in their lives, such as cognitive, emotional, physical, social and moral development, and family and peer

environment.

Illness Self-Management & Recovery refers to peer-facilitated services to help people cope with mental illness more effectively and facilitate their ability to care for themselves. Collaboration between consumer organizations and community mental health centers are encouraged to maximize resources, and share expertise.

Supported Employment - Competitive work in integrated work settings, consistent with the resources, priorities, abilities, and informed choice of individuals for whom competitive employment has not traditionally occurred, has been interrupted or intermittent as a result of a significant disability.

SED Children and Youth with FASD program promotes development of an Alaskan model, combining promising practices in wraparound for children and youth with SED, with research contributing to the evidence base of best practices for treating children with FASD. This project is intended to provide needed individualized services, and add to the evidence base for promising practices for children and youth with these multiple diagnoses.

Resource Allocation: Services are solicited statewide.

Criteria: Grantees provide independent project evaluation to assess the process and outcome of Evidence Based Practices delivered. Evidence

Based Practices are those practices for which there is consistent scientific evidence showing that they improve client outcomes.

Appropriation: Grant funds are appropriated to the Division of Behavioral Health.

Family Wellness Warriors Initiative

Target Group: Family Wellness Warriors Initiative targets the Alaska Native and American Indian populations of Alaska, but all individuals, regardless of race, gender, or religion can apply for services.

The Family Wellness Warriors Initiative (FWWI) is a movement that brings together leaders of the Alaska Native Community, the faith community, regional corporations and agencies, health care providers, and many other interested people, in an effort to restore wellness to the Alaska Native Community. It specifically addresses all forms of violence that occur within the family. These include child abuse and neglect, sexual abuse, vulnerable adult abuse and neglect, domestic violence, and adult sexual assault.

Resource Allocation: Funds available for this grant are anticipated to total \$200,000 per year. The match requirement is 10% for this grant or \$20,000.

request for services and meeting the program guidelines and readiness to embrace the FWWI model of comprehensive service delivery.

Independent Case Management and Flexible Supports

Authority: AS 47.30.520-620 Community Mental Health Services Act; 7 AAC 78 Department of Health and Social Services Grant Programs.

Priorities: Independent Case Management offers an option, especially in larger communities, of case management services by independent entities as an alternative to services from local community mental health centers. This allows consumer choice for this crucial service, in turn promoting increased accountability in the system of care. Independent case managers help initiate and attain appropriate housing, and employment services, along with other community support services.

Flexible Support Services are linked with the Recovery by Choice concept, which was designed to reduce recidivism at the Alaska Psychiatric Institute. The intention is to bring intensive services in a community setting to people identified as at risk of re-hospitalization and is an adaptation of assertive community treatment models across the nation. Flexible Support Services are also designed to validate consumers' recognition of their need and understanding of necessary and effective services prior to the existence of an emergency situation. Funding for these services would be available only if other sources are not available in a timely manner. Eligible services could include medications, psychiatric care, counseling, peer support, medical care, housing or other emergent necessities.

Target Group: Serious mentally ill person means a person who is 18 years of age or older and who satisfies both of the following criteria:

- 1. Must be diagnosed as having a major Psychotic or Mood Disorder or another serious persistent mental disorder; and
- 2. Must have impaired role functioning, consisting of at least two of the following:
 - a. Social role: an inability to function independently in the role of worker, student, or homemaker;
- b. Daily living skills: an inability to engage independently in personal care (grooming, personal hygiene, etc.) or community living activities (handling personal finances, using community resources, performing household chores, etc.); or
- c. Social acceptability: an inability to exhibit appropriate social behavior, which results in demand for intervention by the mental health and/or judicial system.

Resource Allocation: Independent Case Management funds were initially provided for startup costs that transition to Medicaid billing as agencies establish operations.

Criteria: The intent of this project is prevention of institutionalization, promoting service effectiveness, choice, recovery, and accountability, all within a consumer-centric perspective.

Residential Behavioral Rehabilitation Services for Children

Authoritv: Program Services are authorized under 7 AAC 78, AS 47.30.520 - .620, AS 47.30.376, and AS 47.30.465.

Priorities: The program goal is to divert children at risk of entering Residential Psychiatric Therapeutic Centers (RPTC) or who have been in RPTC and to maintain these children in their families and community. Grantees will do this by effectively implementing Parenting with Love and Limits ® (PLL), an evidence-based program combining a 6-week parent education and group therapy program with 4 or more individual "coaching" (family therapy) sessions for adolescents and their parents. The services are designed for youth between 10 and 18 with extreme emotional or behavioral problems (running away, extreme disrespect, chronic truancy, depression, drug or alcohol abuse, etc.). Target Group: Services will be provided to families with children and to children, aged 10-18 in the areas being solicited. Children in the target population will have or have had experienced a severe emotional disturbance and also meet one of the following two criteria, child is: 1) at risk of RPTC placement:

- In community, not improving and has been referred to RPTC; or
- Has been in acute care recently and is at risk of a return to acute care; or
- Child has been in other residential placements and is not improving, etc.); or
- 2) currently in RTPC, requires intensive family therapy to return home successful, and has one of the following:

- Child has a co-occurring substance use disorder as a primary risk factor; or
- The family is involved with multiple systems (adult behavioral health, adult justice, child protective services, juvenile justice, adult public assistance, adult or child developmental disabilities).

Resource Allocation: The Division will award one grant in each of the following described areas: 1) Juneau (Juneau Youth Services), 2) Ketchikan (Residential Youth Services), 3) the North Star Borough (Fairbanks) (Presbyterian Hospitality House) and 4) the Matanuska-Susitna Borough (Wasilla) (Alaska Family Services) for a total of 4 grant awards for FY12-FY13. Agencies awarded are RBRS (Residential Behavioral Health Services) with a current Provider Agreement in place with the department to provide Level II and Level III services.

Criteria: All applicant agencies must have a minimum of 3 years history in Alaska of providing residential behavioral health rehabilitation services to children and/or adolescents with a severe emotional disturbance. The agencies awarded must be current Residential Care for Children and Youth (RCCY) facilities and have current Residential Behavioral Rehabilitation Services (RBRS) Provider Agreements in place with the Alaska Department of Health and Social Services (DHSS). (DHSS) purchases residential care for children and youth (RCCY) services through grants governed by statute under AS 47.40.011 – 47.40.091 and under 7 AAC 53.900 – 7 AAC 53.999 for certain facilities required to be licensed under AS 47.32 and 7 AAC 50. Care required is Level II and Level III as defined in the Alaska Department of Health and Social Services' RBRS Handbook, page 9.

Rural Community Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault

Authority: AS 47.37 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act; AS 47.30.470-500 Alcoholisim and Drug Abuse; 7AAC 78 Department of Health and Social Services Grant Programs.

Priorities: In an effort to reduce domestic violence, sexual assault and substance abuse in rural Alaska, the intent of these grant funds are to establish rural community pilot projects to develop innovative, multi-disciplinary, collaborative approaches/strategies to domestic violence (DV) and sexual assault (SA) early intervention and prevention. Proposals can be made from a region, a sub-region or a community and/or group of communities that are regionally or culturally connected.

Resource Allocation: \$1.3 million in State General Funds

Criteria: The intent of this request for proposals is to generate regional or community-wide commitment to changing the current status of domestic violence and sexual assault; to think about DV and SA in a comprehensive, holistic and multi-disciplinary way. Applicants are encouraged to think bigger than a single program or agency and to look at all aspects of DV and SA; their origins, impact on the overall wellness of the region/community, and consequences on the region/community/families and individuals.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Behavioral Health.

Rural Human Service System

Authority: AS 47.30.470-500 Mental Health; 7 AAC 78 Department of Health & Social Services Grant Programs

Priorities: The program was developed in response to the critical need for a stable system of behavioral health providers in rural Alaska by hiring,

training, supporting, and supervising culturally competent village-based counselors, and counselors that serve relocated villagers. The program provides the opportunity for rural people to achieve their goal of helping their own people.

Training is provided through the Rural Human Services Training Program in the University of Alaska Fairbanks, College of Rural and

Community Development, Interior-Aleutians Campus.

Target Group: Eligible applicants include substance abuse programs, community mental health centers, and other human social service programs

whose service areas include villages, usually with a predominantly Alaska Native population.

Resource Allocation: Resources are designated according to the following service priorities:

1) Programs currently funded and adequately performing; 2) Expansion to new regions of the state;

3) Expansion of existing grantees to allow for the addition of villages not currently serviced by RHS counselors;

and 4) Funds to non-rural agencies for tuition, room/board, and travel costs related to attending training.

Criteria: Criteria for allocation of funds for these services are: 1) Those programs working to fulfill the goal of a counselor in every village of rural Alaska; 2) Those programs sending RHS graduates to the RHS II training program; 3) Those urban programs serving people relocated

from rural Alaska.

Criteria for awarding grants are derived from statute and regulation. Evaluation of applications includes proposed costs, project

description and goals. Recommendations are based on evaluation of the information provided in applications.

This provides an alternative to incarceration until a parent

Target Group: The target group is youth who are in need of protective custody and/or youth who do not require secure detention.

Resource Allocation: Allocations are made to communities according to the service demand in each area.

Alaska Transition Training Initiative

Authority: U.S. Department of Education (DOE) funding is awarded to the Alaska Department of Education and Early Development and is passed through to the Department of Health & Social Services. Funds are awarded to a non-profit agency chosen by both Departments for the

provision of services under AS 44.29 Department of Health and Social Services, AS 47.20 Special Services for Certain Children, and 7

AAC 78 Department of Health and Social Services Grant Programs.

Priorities: The U.S. Department of Education provides funding for the training of providers who help families whose children have disabilities with transition from the home-based Early Intervention/Infant Learning Programs (EI/ILP) to the local school district or Head Start program at

Ten of the twelve non-profit tribal organizations have expressed an interest in participating. In accordance with the Settlement Agreement, the \$1,200,000, will be divided equally (\$120,000 each).

Criteria: The case filed by the Native Village of Curyung et al contends the State has violated the Indian Child Welfare Act and the Adoption Assistance & Child Welfare Act of 1980 by failing to 1) properly screen children for special needs, 2) provide the villages with adequate notice of the children's placement transfers, 3) comply with placement provisions and 4) adequately recruit and retain native foster homes. The compliance grants provide the identified regional non-profit corporations the opportunity to use their resources to improve the State's compliance with ICWA in the areas of moving children up or into ICWA Preference Placements and/or increasing and retaining the number of State licensed Native foster homes. As a requirement of the Agreement, each grantee awarded an ICWA Compliance Grant will generate reports demonstrating the success of the compliance grants. Continuation of the program will depend on if reported outcomes demonstrate an improvement in compliance.

Appropriation: Funds are appropriated to the Department of Law and then to the Office of Children's Services through Interagency Receipt.

The Coalition is also partnering with University of Alaska Fairbanks, Cooperative Extension Services in supporting Food Stamp Nutrition

Education efforts.

Target Group: The target group is low income individuals and families in need of emergency food programs. The National Center for Educational

Statistics notes that 1 of every 7 children in Alaska lives in poverty. There are over 200 communities that benefit from the Alaska Food

Coalition Campaign.

Senior Farmers Market Nutrition

Priorities: Senior citizens in Alaska and the United States do not consume enough fresh fruits and vegetables. The United States Department of

Agriculture's (USDA) Commodity Credit Corporation awards grant funds to provide coupons to low-income seniors that they may exchange for eligible foods at farmers' markets and roadside stands. Eligible foods are fresh, nutritious and unprocessed locally grown

fruits, vegetables and herbs.

The Seniors Farmers' Market Nutrition Program helps to increase consumption of agricultural commodities by providing coupons worth \$25-\$50 to low-income seniors; thereby increasing consumption of agricultural comodities and expanding or aiding in the expansion or

development of domestic farmers' markets, roadside stands, and individual farmers participating in the program.

Target Group: Target group and geographic areas include senior citizens, aged 60 and older, with incomes at or below 185% of poverty level, in the

Fairbanks, Anchorage and Mat-Su Valley areas. Disabled adults, under age 60 and qualified for Medicaid, are also eligible to participate

in the Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program.

Resource Allocation: This program is restricted to the portion of the state that farms fresh produce: Anchorage, Mat-Su Valley, Kenai, Fairbanks and other

areas that have access to these local farm resources. Funding for these awards is based on the anticipated coupon redemption by

participating senior citizens and payment is made to grantees on a reimbursement basis.

Criteria: Grantees are awarded grants to pay farmers involved in this program for redeemed coupons. No administrative funding is provided.

The relative need among geographic areas and populations for expanding or providing services is evaluated by determining: 1) the incidence of low birth weight among newborn infants; 2) the rate of infant mortality; 3) the percentages of births to women under 19 years of age; 4) the rate of participation in the Food Stamp Program; 5) the rate of employment; and 6) the percentage of people whose income is below 185% of federal poverty guidelines. Families enrolled in Denali Kid Care with incomes above 185% of

the federal poverty level are adjunctively WIC income-eligible.

Target Group: Those persons served by the programs administered by these grantees include: pregnant women, breast-feeding women, and

postpartum women, and infants and children up to 5 years old at nutritional risk. The target area is statewide. The projected number of clients to be served is 26,000 per month. Participation data is collected and reports are generated and maintained on the number of

women, infants and children served.

Resource Allocation: The first priority for funding is for the continuation of services to enrolled families. Criteria include: staff needed to provide program

services; number of satellite clinics; other program expenditures; and in-kind contribution/resources available to the local agency.

Priorities: Provision of clinical family planning and related preventive health services to low-income women and men in compliance with Title X

The target group in the Kenai Peninsula Borough is further narrowed to the lower Kenai Peninsula for funding under this grant program, as communities of the upper Peninsula are served through another non-profit agency with a clinic in Soldotna (not part of this grant

program).

Resource Allocation: Family planning funds are awarded to a single agency serving the target group in each area identified above.

Criteria: The family planning services provider will offer low cost, high quality clinical family planning and related preventive health services to the

Community Health Aide Training and Supervision

Authority: AS 44.29 Department of Health & Social Services; AS 18.28.010 Community Health Aide Grants; and 7AAC 78 Department of Health & Social Services Grant Programs

Priorities: Services are for the training and supervision of Community Health Aides (CHAs) and Community Health Practitioners (CHPs). The training is established by and monitored by the Academic Review Committee and the Review and Approval Committee; committees established by and under the direction of the Community Health Aide Director's Association.

Target Group: CHA/Ps are located predominantly in the rural areas where more advanced medical personnel are unavailable. These grants target the CHA/Ps themselves and the rural population they serve. All regional and local health organizations that receive contract funds from the federal government for a community health aide program are eligible for funding through this program. The program provides funding for CHAs to complete approximately 2,500 training courses, including CHA training, ETT/EMT training, and continuing medical education. Additionally, CHA supervisors are expected to make over 15,000 contacts with CHAs as part of training and supervision. Finally, CHAs are expected to have close to 300,000 patient encounters during each fiscal year. These projections are based on required self-reporting.

Resource Allocation: The funding level is derived from a formula established during the 1985 legislative session. It is adjusted based on the amount of funding appropriated.

Criteria: The potential grantee must have a contract with the Indian Health Service for community health aide services.

Criteria: Applicants for grants are asked to demonstrate a history of: 1) involvement in developing/implementing community-based diabetes intervention projects; 2) providing diabetes services to minorities, medically underserved and/or elderly known to be at high risk for developing diabetes and its complications; and 3) monitoring health outcomes.

Appropriation: Grant funds are appropriated to the Division of Public Health.

Emergency Medical Services

Authority: AS 18.08 Emergency Medical Services; 7 AAC 78 Department of Health & Social Services Grant Programs.

Priorities: The EMS grant program helps accomplish the goals and objectives of the EMS system. Services received through the grants include: 1) planning, development and coordination of regional EMS systems; 2) training and testing for EMS personnel; 3) identifying and prioritizing equipment needs; 4) assisting in EMS data collection training and activities; 5) providing injury prevention services. The seven Regional EMS Councils provide direct input regarding the needs and abilities of each respective community and region. Because the EMS system is highly complex, involving many disciplines, the EMS Regions traditionally are comprised of knowledgeable people in many different fields, from physicians and nurses to pre-hospital EMS providers and communications experts.

Target Group: Services are delivered to the state through the EMS Regions. Whenever a life-threatening injury or sudden illness occurs, the EMS system serves to stabilize and transport the patient to the most appropriate treatment facility as quickly as possible. The EMS program also provides specialized emergency medical training to physicians, mid-level practitioners, and nurses in the pre-hospital, rural clinic, and hospital settings. EMS grants train and certify approximately 4,000 pre-hospital EMS providers. These providers transport an estimated 50,000 patients to hospitals by ground ambulance and perform several thousand emergency air ambulance transports. Approximately 2,000 people are provided Emergency Trauma Technician, Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation, and first aid training each year. The EMS Regions work with local communities to identify, prioritize and seek funding for essential equipment. Finally, the EMS Regions operate injury prevention programs which provide information and materials regarding injury prevention activities to thousands of Alaskans.

Resource Allocation: Resources are allocated statewide through the Regional EMS Councils.

Criteria: Grantees are required to address nationally and state recognized components of an EMS system in terms of goals, objectives, and

methodology for achieving those goals.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Public Health.

Public Health Preparedness and Response for Bioterrorism

Authority: AS 44.29.020 (Department Authority); 7 AAC 78 Department of Health & Social Services Grant Programs

Priorities: Organizations receiving grants will participate in development of a statewide assessment of needs, communication plans and targeted communication strategies. Services provided will increase preparedness for and response to bioterrorism, outbreaks of infectious disease, and other public health threats and emergencies with three specific areas of focus.

The Alaska Native health system focus will develop a plan describing the role of the Alaska Native health system in a bioterrorist attack; ensure Native health system issues and resources are identified in and coordinated with the State of Alaska plans: promote participation of the Native health system organizations and personnel in preparedness training, and federal drills and exercises; and surveil for key infectious disease syndromes.

The greater Anchorage area focus will enhance direct surveillance activities; increase capacity for planning and coordinating activities, including pharmaceutical caches; coordinate testing the Emergency Response Plan of the Municipality Health Department; participate in development and implementation of the Health Alert Network; and develop a training plan for public health staff and assist in continued participation in the Alaska Public Health Training Network.

The healthcare facilities focus will develop and implement regional preparedness plans and protocols for hospitals, outpatient facilities, EMS systems and poison control centers in collaborative statewide or regional models. Preparedness services will also address nonterrorist epidemics of rare diseases, exposure to chemical toxins and radiological materials, and mass casualties due to explosions.

Priorities: As a means to reduce death, disability and the economic burden caused by tobacco use, evidence-based tobacco control programs are needed that respond to the four goal areas of the State of Alaska Tobacco Prevention and Control (SOA-TPC) Program, and the current Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) Best Practices for Comprehensive Tobacco Control Programs. Priorities: The mission of the Tobacco Prevention and Control (TPC) Program is to improve the health of all Alaskans by decreasing death, disability and economic burden caused by tobacco use and exposure to second hand smoke. Tobacco use continues to be Alaska's number-one public health problem. This grant program provides funding to communities that are actively involved in population-based, policy-focused tobacco prevention and control strategies.

The Alaska TPC Program has developed four major public health goals:

- (1) to prevent initiation of tobacco use among young people;
- (2) to promote quitting among adults and young people;
- (3) to identify and eliminate tobacco-related disparities in specific populations identified as of special vulnerability or with above-norm tobacco use patterns; and
- (4) to eliminate exposure to secondhand smoke.

The structure of Alaska's tobacco program is based on recommendations from the CDC's Best Practices for Comprehensive Tobacco Control Programs. The statewide program is organized, funded, and managed as program components designed to accomplish and measure the TPC Program goals. The program components include:

- (1) community-based programs to reduce tobacco use;
- (2) enforcement (in Division of Behavioral Health);
- (3) statewide programs that increase the capacity of local programs by providing technical assistance on evaluating programs, promoting media advocacy, implementing smoke free policies, and reducing minors' access to tobacco;
- (4) cessation programs;
- (5) media/counter-marketing;
- (6) surveillance and evaluation; and
- (7) administration and management.

Target Group: Alaskans who are affected by tobacco use.

Resource Allocation: Tobacco prevention and control community-based grants are funded through State of Alaska Tobacco Use Education and Cessation funds.

Criteria: Community based grantees that demonstrate broad-based community involvement in their local tobacco control alliance, and submit an action plan that includes long-term policy interventions.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Public Health.

targeted case management service.

Priorities: Adult Day Services programs provide an organized program of services during the day in a community group setting, for the purpose of

supporting adults personal independence and promoting their social, physical and emotional well-being. Services include a variety of program activities designed to meet the individual needs and interests of the participants, and referral to and assistance in using appropriate community resources. The provision of these services allow families and other caregivers to continue caring for individuals, so that they can continue to live at home. Adult Day Services often help stabilize individuals after a health crisis, and by providing assistance in daily living activities, help clients remain in their communities. For persons with Alzheimers Disease and Related Disorders (ADRD), these programs provide an environment that helps individuals maintain function even while the disease progresses. Adult Day programs in Alaska strive to promote the individuals level of functioning and independence in a therapeutic setting; provide support, respite and education for families and other caregivers; provide opportunities for social interaction; and serve as an integral part of the

community service network.

Target Group: The target group are individuals who require assistance with supervision due to physical, emotional, or cognitive impairments who are 60 years or older, 55 years or older who are at risk for institutional placement, persons of any age with Alzheimers Disease or Related

Disorders, or adults 18 years or older with similar disabilities and service needs as Older Alaskans.

Resource Allocation: The service area is statewide. The funding methodology takes into account basic costs of operation and performance. Each site is

given the same base grant and a percentage of remaining funds based upon an average of hours of service provided over a four-year

period.

Criteria: Grantees must be a certified Adult Day Care provider under the most current DSDS Medicaid Waiver regulations. In addition, all Adult

Day Care providers must meet and maintain standards as set forth in the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services Adult Day Program

The ADRCs help to streamline a consumer's ability to access sufficient long-term care services by consolidating information, providing referrals, and assisting the consumer in accessing services specific to their needs. ADRCs provide long-term care options counseling that provides information about housing, in-home services, Medicaid, Medicare Part D, home modifications, informal supports, transportation, disability determination, behavioral health services, Social Security Disability Insurance, Social Security Insurance, Adult Public Assistance, case management, Personal Care Attendants, and other home and community based services. The Aging and Disability Resource Centers work in concert with the department's Rural Long Term Care Coordinator and other care providers to develop and improve access to long-term care services for Alaska Mental Health Trust beneficiaries and their families, so that they do not have to leave their homes and communities. The Centers are partners with local hospitals in a Care Transitions initiative to improve the health outcomes and self-management skills of patients discharged from the hospital to their homes. The Aging and Disability Resource Centers are Local Contact Agencies for Section Q in working with nursing facilities and Senior and Disabilities Services to

transition residents wishing to return to their home.

Target Group: There are no income, geographic or age restrictions for ADRC services. The target population for this grant is Older Alaskans (as

defined in AS 47.65.290) or Persons with a Disability (as defined in AS 47.80.900), and their families or caregivers.

Resource Allocation: The ADRCs in operation serve Southeast Alaska; Bristol Bay and Kodiak; Kenai Peninsula, Valdez, Cordova, and the MatSu; and

Anchorage.

Criteria: ADRCs improve the long term support service system by minimizing confusion, enhancing individual choice, supporting informed

decision-making and increasing the cost effectiveness of long term support systems.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services.

Priorities: The Community Developmental Disabilities Grant (CDDG) programs provide funding for services to and enhance the quality of life for

consumers impacted by developmental disabilities. The CDD grants address the needs of individuals with developmental disabilities (DD) for "habilitation" which is the acquisition and maintenance of skills to live with independence and improved capacity, and to

minimize institutionalization and provide care in the local community.

The needs of individuals receiving services through the CDDG are assessed and a plan of care is developed and reviewed annually. Each individual plan of care varies depending upon the person's age, unique needs, and existing supports. Services provided to individuals include supported employment, respite care, care coordination, day habilitation, case management, and Core services. Successful applicants receiving CDD grants must assure that individuals have a choice when selecting from an array of service

providers dispersed throughout the state and their community.

Community DD Providers link individuals to services that will assist them until they are enrolled in more comprehensive services under grant funds or a Home and Community Based Waiver. These grants assist with purchasing units of services earmarked for eligible

individuals waiting for comprehensive services.

Target Group: Under AS 47.80.100 the Department provides people with developmental disabilities specialized services directed towards their social,

personal, physical, or economic habilitation. Applying a national prevalence factor (1.8%) for the occurrence of developmental disability to the Alaskan population, it is estimated that there are 12,000 to 13,000 Alaskans with developmental disabilities. Only about 3,547 people receive services funded by a CDD grant or Medicaid Waiver. Currently, there is a registration of 851 people awaiting selection

for a Medicaid Waiver or who do not meet the criteria for Medicaid waivers and are in need of various CDD direct services.

Resource Allocation: Resources will be distributed based upon a census of current recipients of services per CDD Applicant Agency. Annually, this census is

reconciled with each provider and funds are allocated upon the necessary capacity to sustain services to eligible individuals and to

provide for the target populations.

Criteria: Standards of care are expressed as Service Principles stated in AS 47.80.

National Family Caregiver Support Program

Authority: Federal Title III-e of the reauthorized Older American Act; AS 47.05.010 (16) and (17) Duties of the Department; the Older Americans Act; AS 47.65 Service Programs for Older Alaskans and Other Adults; and 7AAC 78 DHSS Grant Regulations.

Priorities: The Older Americans Act programs have long recognized caregivers as key players in meeting the needs of the Older Persons in the community. The creation of the National Family Caregiver Support Program (NFCSP) in the 2000 Reauthorized Older Americans Act for the first time requires all State units on aging to focus on the caregiver rather than the Older Consumer, and to provide service primarily for the benefit of the caregivers themselves. The program includes five basic services: 1) Information to caregivers about available services; 2) Assistance to caregivers in gaining access to supportive services; 3) Individual counseling, organization of support groups, and caregiver training to assist caregivers in making decisions and solving problems relating to their caregiver roles; 4) Respite care to enable caregivers to be temporarily relieved from their caregiver responsibilities; and 5) Supplemental services up to a maximum of \$500 a year toward items and services that complement care.

Target Group: Caregivers eligible for services are caregivers of individuals with Alzheimer's Disease (of any age); caregivers of older adults (60 years of age or older) and grandparents or older relative caregivers (55 years of age or older) caring for a child related by blood, marriage or adoption.

Resource Allocation: Allocation of resources is based on the Federally approved State Plan for Senior Services and funding limitations as indicated in Title III-e.

Criteria: Grantees must have demonstrated knowledge and experience in providing services to the target population.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services.

Nursing Facility Transition Program

Authority: Federal Authority: Americans with Disabilities Act; Olmstead Decision; and the New Freedom Initiative

State Authority: 7 AAC 78 Department of Health & Social Services Grant Programs

Priorities: The Nursing Facility Transition Program provides services for people with disabilities or the elderly to move from nursing facilities into

the community in order that they might live in the least restrictive setting possible and integrate into and participate in their community. Grantee Transition Coordinators work closely with nursing facility social workers and discharge planners and the DSDS-LTCU staff for timely and efficient discharge and transition. Funds from these grants may provide services as diverse as security deposits (no rent payments); groceries; trial visits to home or to an Assisted Living Home; or transportation, room and board for a caregiver from a rural

area to an urban area for training in the care of the recipient.

Services to be provided may include: outreach and counseling, assessment of the consumer for appropriateness of transition, peer counseling, home assessment for safety, transition planning and implementation of the plan. Needed items or services may be approved by the State Program Coordinator, such as funding for: home or environmental modifications, Travel/Room/Board for rural caregivers to receive client specific training, trial trips to the home or assisted living home, short-term payment for an appropriate worker of a skill level needed, security deposits, one-time initial cleaning of the home, basic furnishings necessary to set up a livable home, transportation to a new home, ongoing follow-up and counseling as needed, evaluation of effectiveness of services, and evaluation of

continuing quality of life for the consumer.

Target Group: The Nursing Facility Transition Program targets any Alaska resident over the age of 21 who resides in a nursing facility and who wants to transition back into the community. Clients must have, or be expected to have, Medicaid Waiver approval within six months. This

program is available to any resident of a nursing facility in Alaska. Alaska residents residing in a facility outside the state will be

considered on a case-by-case basis.

Resource Allocation: Priority is given to applicants who document that they can provide staff time as matching in-kind funds and/or other resources necessary

to deliver and coordinate services statewide.

Criteria: Proposers must have a statewide network specific to the type of services requested and the capability to coordinate activities with

satellite agencies or through agreements with like agencies. Applicants must submit a map showing the location of satellite offices or agreement agencies. The description of proposed services through satellite agencies and/or coordination with like agencies must be

fully supported by written agreements.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services.

Authority: Federal Title III Older Americans Act; AS 47.05.010 Duties of the Department of Health and Social Services; AS 47.65.010 Service Programs for Older Alaskans and Other Adults: 7 AAC 78 Department of Health & Social Services Grant Programs.

Priorities: The Nutrition, Transportation and Support Services (NTS) Program, authorized under the Title III of the Older Americans Act, provides grants to local community organizations such as senior centers, non-profit agencies, and tribal or local governments in order to meet the needs of Alaska's aging population. NTS program provides services to Seniors age 60 and over, helping them to remain independent and healthy in their communities. Services are targeted to those with the greatest economic and social need through a State Plan funding formula developed by the Alaska Commission on Aging in collaboration with the Department of Health and Social Services.

Congregate and Home Delivered Meals

Services provided thought this program include:

- Assisted and Unassisted Transportation
- Homemaker Services
- Outreach, Information and Assistance
- Nutrition Education to groups and Counseling to individuals
- Health Education to groups and Services to individuals
- Medication Management
- Legal Services
- Media Services (provides partial funding for the Senior Voice)
- Community Services; Senior Companion, Foster Grandparent/Elder Mentor, and Retired Senior Volunteer Programs

Target Group: These services are available to Alaskans 60 years of age and over. These individuals are those with the greatest economic and social need with particular attention to older persons that are low income, minorities, live in rural areas, and are frail. Applicants for grants identify the population to be served and provide assurance that preference will be given to serving the target population defined by Older Americans Act.

Resource Allocation: Funding is allocated through the Intra State Funding Formula approved in the State Plan for Senior Services using the most current U.S. Census data. Each of nine regions in the state receive an allocation of funds based on the number of individuals 60 years old and over, and the target populations stated above with specific weighting factors.

Criteria: Applicants must meet the requirements for program delivery. Proposals are evaluated based on the criteria in the Request for Proposals and prior year performance.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services.

Authority: Programmatic: Public Law 106-402 DD Act; Americans with Disabilities Act; AS 47.80 Persons with Disabilities and 7 AAC 78

Department of Health & Social Services Grant Programs

Priorities: The Protection of Rights & Investigation of Abuse program provides people with developmental disabilities (DD) and their families

training and assistance in methods to resolve grievances they may have with providers of community developmental disability services. Services funded by the program range from information and referral, negotiation and mediation, various interventions in line with administrative recourse and, as a last resort, legal consultation and remedies. Under the Federal DD Act, the state must have a system of protection and advocacy that has the capacity to provide administrative and legal remedies to civil rights concerns for people with developmental disabilities. The program exists to assist eligible individuals, sometimes through their families and guardians, to engage in their own advocacy. In collaboration with the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services, this grant has been used to emphasize

training to recipients in such areas as special education, social security and the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Target Group: In order to receive this grant, an organization must have the capacity to provide the Department with an immediate statewide response

to complaints of abuse and neglect by persons meeting the definition developmentally disabled as described in AS 47.80.900.

Resource Allocation: A single agency provides statewide Protection and Advocacy Services. This award incorporates and makes maximum use of other

federal, state, and private funds, which are awarded directly to the sole provider to establish and maintain protection and advocacy services to Alaskans with mental illness and other unique populations with concerns similar to those of persons with developmental

disabilities. The Disability Law Center has continuously performed these unique services for 25 years.

Criteria: The grantee must have the unique legal authority under state and federal law to investigate complaints by vulnerable people with developmental disabilities, of abuse and neglect in institutions. Additionally, the grantee must assist and train the target population statewide in identifying and obtaining needed services from generic public benefits and entitlement programs, and special education for

statewide in identifying and obtaining needed services from generic public benefits and entitlement programs, and special education for adolescents with developmental disabilities. The Disability Law Center (DLC) was created in 1977 to meet the requirements of Alaska Statute 47.80.020 to have a system of protection and advocacy for people experiencing developmental disabilities (DD).

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services.

Priorities: Senior In-Home Services provide care coordination and in-home services to eligible seniors who do not qualify for Medicaid Waiver

services and need assistance with activities of daily living. The goal of the program is to support Alaskan seniors so that they may remain in their homes and communities for as long as possible thereby forestalling or eliminating more costly institutional care. Services include Care Coordination, Chore, Respite, Extended Respite and Supplemental Services (up to \$500 per household per year) for items or services that support the "low-income" senior in avoiding a crisis that would jeopardize their ability to remain independently in their

home.

Target Group: These services offer a safety net for low income seniors who do not meet the level of care for the HCB Medicaid Waiver program

especially those with Alzheimer's Disease and related disorders. By providing care coordination and in-home assistance, the Senior In-Home program is able to extend the time an individual can live independently in their own home and communities, reducing need for costly institutional care. This continues to be very important as Alaska's senior population is now the fastest growing per capita in the

U.S.

Resource Allocation: Resource allocation is based on the funding formula in the Alaska State Plan on Aging. Service area is statewide.

Criteria: Grantees must be a certified Care Coordination, Respite and/or Chore provider agency under the most current DSDS Medicaid Waiver

regulations. In addition, all Care Coordination and Respite providers must meet Care Coordination and Respite standards adopted by

the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services.

Living.

Criteria: Grantees must meet the standards for assisted living facilities licensed and monitored by the Department.

Senior and Disabilities Services

Short-Term Assistance and Referral Programs STAR

Authority: AS 47.80 Persons with Disabilities and 7 AAC 78 Department of Health & Social Services Grant Programs

Priorities: The Short-Term Assistance and Referral program (STAR) exists to assist individuals with developmental disabilities (DD) and their

families by providing short-term assistance to ameliorate a crisis before it occurs. The STAR program also acts as the conduit to services by assisting with DD applications, as well as resource identification and referral to other applicable community-based and natural supports. Many individuals who are on the DD waitlist access STAR programs while waiting for more comprehensive services. STAR is designed as a "stand-alone" program within a grantee agency due to its unique functions and ability to quickly provide time-

limited supports in a private, unobtrusive fashion.

In addition to funding a full-time STAR Coordinator, each STAR program has an allocation of \$15,000 in discretionary funds to assist recipients. Each recipient may apply for a maximum of \$2,500 per year. Allowable costs under the STAR program include, but are not limited to: respite, transportation, adaptive equipment, and services that assist the family, such as behavioral training or counseling, or

for Medical appointments not funded by another source.

Assistance with basic living needs necessary to avert a crisis that are not covered by another public or private program, such as emergency medical transportation and clothing may be approved on a limited basis. Rent and utilities expenses may be approved as a

one-time payment if necessary to keep the family in the home and while other resources are being secured.

Target Group: People with developmental disabilities and their families may access STAR services.

Resource Allocation: STAR grants are allocated geographically and provide funding for personnel and operating costs to enable grantees to serve people

within their census area.

Senior and Disabilities Services

Student Living Center Services for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing

Authority: AS 47.80 Persons with Disabilities; 7 AAC 78 Department of Health and Social Services Grant Programs

Priorities: The program provides residential services and daily support to students from outside the Anchorage area while they are attending the

Alaska State School for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing, within two licensed board and care homes and one foster care placement home. Individuals participate in life skills training, community activities, and after school sports or clubs. Services are provided 24 hours a day, seven days a week during the academic year. During summer, when students do not occupy the living center, the residences may be used as temporary housing for families of developmentally disabled children who are in Anchorage for medical treatment or evaluation.

Target Group: Services are provided statewide to persons who meet specific criteria outlined in the State of Alaska's definition of developmental

disabilities (AS 47.80.900) in need of educational services at the Alaska State School for Deaf and Hard of Hearing. Priority placement

is given to children from outside the Anchorage area.

Resource Allocation: Services are provided in Anchorage where the Alaska State School for Deaf and Hard of Hearing is located. Funding is provided to

DHSS through a Reimbursable Services Agreement with the Alaska Department of Education and Early Development.

Criteria: Grant funds are distributed through the Department's grant process. Each grantee is required to be reviewed regularly by the Division's

Quality Assurance review team, and by an independent financial auditor. A Division-approved action plan is required from the grantee, responding to any recommendations made by the review team. Standards of care are expressed as Service Principles stated in AS

47.80.

Appropriation: Grant funding is appropriated to the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services.


