Prior to Statehood, there was an attempt to minimize inaccessibility to health care in rural Alaskan communities. The Territory, through cooperation of several partners such as the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the Alaska Native Health Service, developed a plan to take much needed health care services to Alaskans in rural areas.

The plan was to deploy several mobile health units to provide health care services to those communities located along interior waterways, railways and highways. These units provided services such as dental care, vision and hearing tests, diagnostic exams, immunizations, and prenatal care.

A highway Mobile Health Unit, such as the one pictured here, was typically staffed with a doctor, public health nurse, and technician. Some of these mobile health units travelled several thousand miles and served up to 2,000 patients annually.

*About the photographer: C. Earl Albrecht was appointed by Governor Gruening to be the first Territory of Alaska, Department of Health Commissioner in 1945. He served as Commissioner until 1956 and retired from practicing medicine in 1975.*

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**Behavioral Health**

**Adult Rural Peer Support**

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.30.520-620 The Community Mental Health Services Act; and AS 47.376, Uniform Alcoholism and Treatment Act

**Description of Services:** Support existing organizations seeking to expand into rural areas, or to allow for community mental health centers in rural areas to add peer support to their existing service delivery system, or maintain peer support organizations developed through the Beneficiary Project Initiative. The intent is to promote growth and institutionalization of peer support in behavioral health systems outside Anchorage, Juneau, and Fairbanks areas.

The Division anticipates the following outcomes: increased number of peer support organizations actively serving members/individuals in rural communities; improved client outcomes for individuals engaged in peer support services; and decreased referrals for acute psychiatric services and/or intensive substance abuse treatment (detox, etc.).

**Assessment of Need:** Peer support is a recognized best practice in behavioral health. Individuals who have completed treatment or are successfully managing their recovery are often very successful in engaging and supporting their peers in the recovery process. Having trained peer support workers in rural areas would help alleviate the workforce issues faced by rural areas in the recruitment and retention of qualified behavioral health staff from other areas. These positions would also provide local, meaningful employment for peers, an important component of recovery.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Statewide other than Anchorage, Juneau, and Fairbanks.

**Alcohol Safety Action Program (Adult and Juvenile)**

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.31 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act

**Description of Services:** Case management for adults and juveniles who have current or pending alcohol/drug related misdemeanor criminal cases. Services include screening, referral, and monitoring of offenders, to ensure required substance abuse education or treatment programs are completed as prescribed by the courts.

**Assessment of Need:** The ASAP program is an integral part of the Alaska Court System (ACS), providing invaluable and necessary substance abuse services in all major communities throughout Alaska.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** Juneau, Ketchikan, Kodiak, Fairbanks, Dillingham, Bethel, Palmer/Wasilla, Anchorage, Kenai/Homer, Seward, Nome, Kotzebue and Barrow.

Criteria for allocation of funds for services are: cost per case, size of caseload, and support of the local justice system. Geographical consideration is based on number of cases per court location.

## Bethel Community Service Patrol and Sobering Center

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 18.08.010, AS 44.29.150, AS 47.30.477, AS 47.30.520 - 620, AS 47.37, and 7 AAC 71.010 - 71,300 Community Mental Health Services, and 7 AAC 29, State Standards for Alcoholism Programs.

**Description of Services:** Bethel's Community Service Patrol (CSP) will patrol the town, picking up inebriated individuals and delivering them to the appropriate facility for assessment. If needed, CSP will transport them to the Sobering Center where they can sober up in an environment that provides monitoring and protection. Individuals taken to the Sobering Center will also be screened and receive case management services that connect them to services, such as referrals for Substance Abuse or Mental Health assessments and treatment.

**Assessment of Need:** The Bethel region has been identified by the Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority (AMHTA) as a target area for specialized chronic inebriate services due to the large number of Title 47 protective holds that result in people being taken to local correctional facilities or hospital emergency rooms. Neither of these facilities have the capacity to provide services for those needing care. The CSP is an integral part of a multi-faceted service system designed to provide protection, identification, and referral for treatment for the targeted population. The sobering center will provide a more appropriate and preferable setting than the local correctional facility or emergency room.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Bethel Service Area

**Allocate Resources:** Available data documenting incarcerations associated with protective custody holds demonstrates that the city of Bethel has one of the highest incidences of protective holds in the State. Because of this, the AMHTA and Division of Behavioral Health have identified the region as a priority for additional program efforts.

**Bring the Kids Home**

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.30.520 – 620, Community Mental Health Services Act and AS 47.37 Uniform Alcoholism & Intoxication Treatment Act; 7 AAC 78 Grant Programs.

**Description of Services:** Bring the Kids Home (BTKH) serves a high-risk population of Seriously Emotionally Disturbed Youth (SEDY) and their families. The goal, when appropriate, is for the Division of Behavioral Health (DBH) to provide funding until an agency is self-sufficient. Service strategies and models will vary as needed to keep children from out-of-state placement and/or to maintain children in their community or home. The Division amended this GPA to add two fiscal years to this solicitation which allows for an inclusion of federal funds in FY14.

**Assessment of Need:** This program continues the success of keeping children from being placed in an out-of-state residential psychiatric treatment centers (RPTC) or outside of their communities and homes.

**Description of Services:** This program provides funds to the Alaska Commission for Behavioral Health Certification (ACBHC) to process certification and re-certification applications and also provide communication between the commission and those they represent from the field. Also, receives and processes ethical conduct or scope of practice of applicants and certificate holder's complaints. Standards are set by the National Association of Addiction Professionals for the certification of behavioral health associates, chemical dependency counselors, administrators and training.

**Assessment of Need:** The program provides various levels of certification. Staff verify, review, and approve/reject applications concerning experience, practicum hours, education, training hours completed, character reference, adherence to ethical practice, and criminal background disclosure, assuring a minimum level of consistent competency to clients.

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.37.030; AS 47.30.470-500 Alcoholism and Drug Abuse

**Description of Services:** Assist and support efforts to reduce and prevent substance use and abuse, suicide and self- destructive behavior; strategies will be comprehensive, integrated prevention and early prevention approaches. Overall, the goal of these grant funds is to "promote healthy communities utilizing effective practices and partnerships" to reduce risk factors and the harmful consequences of substance and poor mental health, and to promote protective factors to empower local communities to create population-level change in behavioral health conditions.

**Assessment of Need:** Through the integrated services of Behavioral Health, we are now able to address a broader view of substance use problems to look more holistically at those individuals who are also impacted by mental illness, depression, interpersonal violence trauma and other behavioral health concerns. A comprehensive, multi-disciplinary review of all substances in Alaska and the consequences of those substances on Alaskan citizens and communities has been conducted and will inform and guide strategies to be identified in this program's Request for Proposals.

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.30.520-620 Community Mental Health Services Act, AS 47.330.655-915 Alaska Civil Commitment Statutes, and AS 47.30.011-061 Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority

**Description of Services:** The Reentry program is a collaborative community project to establish and maintain a center which provides "one-stop" services for housing, positive social connections, and employment to recently released inmates. The goal is to reduce the amount of repeat crime by former offenders in Alaska, thereby protecting the public, reducing public expenditures for incarceration and related costs, and providing a model for other collaborative reentry programs in Alaska.

**Assessment of Need:** This program targets recently released inmates in Anchorage and supports a reentry center located within easy walking distance of the Anchorage Correctional Center, the Anchorage Field Probation Office and half-way houses. According to a study by the Alaska Judicial Council, 66% of released prisoners are back in custody within three years of release. Most of them, according to the study, return to prison in the first six months. Thirty percent of Alaska's prisoners and probation/parolees responded to a 2010 Housing Survey of incarcerated inmates and probationers. Of those who responded, 1,270 individuals or almost 40% reported being homeless at least once prior to their incarceration.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Anchorage and possibly Statewide.

**Allocate Resources:** Planning and funding priorities are based on a combination of need, inmate population, and location.

## Residential Care for Children and Youth

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, 7AAC 81 (Grant Services for Individuals); AS 47.40.011 (Purchase of Services for Minors); AS 47.14.100 (Power and Duties of Department Over Care of Child); AS 47.10 (Children in Need of Aid); AS 47.12 (Delinquent Minors); 7 AAC 50.100 (Community Care Licensing)

It is anticipated that the Residential Care for Children and Youth (RCCY) program will transition from the Office of Children's Services to the Division of Behavioral Health (DBH) in FY14.

**Description of Services:** Program services include emergency shelter, day treatment, specialized residential care, staffed secure care, residential diagnostic treatment, and residential sex offender treatment. Lengths of stay range from one day to approximately a year or more. A strong emphasis is placed on delivery of Behavioral Rehabilitation Services (BRS) to children in their own communities whenever possible. Services are intended to achieve immediate and long term solutions to family problems; promote the preservation, rehabilitation, and reunification of families to the extent possible; and to promote independence and the use of least restrictive alternatives. The services are provided for children and youth with behavioral health residential treatment needs, including the rehabilitation of juvenile offenders and the treatment of victims of child abuse and neglect.

**Assessment of Need:** Under AS 47.14.100 (Power and Duties of Department Over Care of Child), the Department must arrange for the care of every child committed to its custody by placing the child in a foster home or in the care of an agency or institution providing care for children inside or outside the state. The same statute allows the Department to pay necessary costs to ensure adequate care.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** The proposed service delivery area is statewide.

**Allocate Resources:** Under AS 47.40.011 (Purchase of Services for Minors), the Department shall award grants for specific numbers of beds as outlined in the Request for Proposals. To ensure the availability of space for the children referred by the Department, core capacity grant award levels will be based upon the number of beds according to estimated community needs, historical usage and present trends.

In addition to core capacity grant awards, DBH proposes to enter into Behavioral Rehabilitation Services (BRS) Provider Agreements with every agency awarded a grant. Provider Agreements will allow the Department to cover costs as services are utilized. The fees paid for such services will be based upon service need and level of care:

Level II, Emergency Shelter  
Level III, Specified Residential Treatment; and  
Level IV, Residential Diagnostic Treatment.

Provider Agreements, in conjunction with core awards, encourage maximum utilization of available treatment beds while setting higher standards for residential child care.

Services will also provide access to Fetal Alcohol Syndrome curricula, trainings on the effects of abuse and neglect on child development, train-the-trainers workshops, and technical support for staff and individualized programs. In conjunction with Bring/Keep the Kids Home and the Behavioral Health Integration Project, the awarded agency must be amenable to planning and coordination of a Department-wide training integration effort including the Division of Behavioral Health, Division of Juvenile Justice, and Office of Children's Services.

**Assessment of Need:** Hiring and retention of qualified personnel at facilities providing Residential Child Care services to children in State custody are long-standing issues. Because AS 47.14.100 (Powers and Duties of Department Over Care of Child) requires that the Department arrange for the care of every child committed to its custody by placing the child in a foster home or in the care of an agency or institution providing care for children inside or outside the state, the Department has a strong interest in supporting staff training and technical assistance for RCCY facilities. Training for staff through this grant helps to maximize resources available to the providers in assuring the highest quality of services for all children who receive services from RCCY facilities.

**Description of Services:** This program offers grants to rural substance abuse, mental health, behavioral health, and human services agencies, and to urban agencies serving people who have relocated from rural areas. The program was developed in response to the critical need for a stable system of behavioral health providers in rural Alaska by hiring, training, supporting, and supervising culturally competent village-based counselors and counselors that serve relocated villagers. This program provides the opportunity for rural people to achieve their goal of helping their own people. Training is provided through the Rural Human Services Training Program in the University of Alaska College of Rural Alaska from one of its designated Rural Human Services campuses and is a certificate program.

**Assessment of Need:** This program seeks to address the problem of scarcity of counseling and crisis intervention resources in the villages of rural Alaska and to reduce the costly reliance on itinerant service providers and employees who come from outside of a community, only to stay a year or less. The goal of the project is to ensure there is "a counselor in every village", providing continuity of care and consistency in service providers.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** Eligible applicants include rural substance abuse programs, community mental health centers, and other human services agencies, and to urban agencies serving people who have relocated from rural areas.

**Description of Services:** Funded agencies coordinate with allied service providers to find and train “gatekeepers” to identify vulnerable seniors in need of substance abuse or mental health treatment and other services. Gatekeepers connect with seniors in non-traditional settings, offer community education and outreach, work with primary care providers to enhance behavioral health screening opportunities, provide screening and referral to treatment resources, and collect applicable program data. This is not a treatment program; the services are not billable for Medicaid eligible clients.

**Assessment of Need:** By 2030, Alaska’s seniors (age 65 +) will double to comprise 13% of Alaska’s population. Those aged 85+ are expected to triple in the next 25 years, increasing the numbers of senior Alaskans with substance abuse issues and age-related disorders. In addition, Alaskan seniors have a higher suicide rate than U.S. seniors as a whole.

## Strategic Prevention Framework State Incentive Grant

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.37.030 ; AS 47.37.470

**Description of Services:** The Strategic Prevention Framework State Incentive Grant (SPF SIG) will build a solid foundation for delivering and sustaining effective substance abuse and/or mental health prevention services in Alaska. It will implement Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAMHSA) Strategic Prevention Framework with the following goals:

- Prevent the onset and reduce the progression of substance abuse, including childhood and underage drinking,
- Reduce substance abuse related problems in communities, and
- Build prevention capacity and infrastructure at the State and community levels.

The Strategic Prevention Framework is a data-driven planning model that will assist both the State and, the community grantees to assess substance use data and capacity; develop a strategic plan to address those substance use issues that data indicates are the most serious problems; explore the consumption patterns, consequences and related risk and protective factors contributing to the substance use/abuse; and develop evidence-based strategies. This program will focus on data collection and assessment; coalition building; developing community and regional prevention infrastructure and capacity; evaluation; and sustainability at the community and state level beyond the federal grant.

**Assessment of Need:** Step one for Department of Health and Social Services (DHSS) of the Strategic Prevention Framework was to conduct a statewide assessment of data-driven needs related to substance use in Alaska. The result of this months-long, multidisciplinary assessment indicated the top two priority consumption issues for Alaska are: 1) youth alcohol use; and 2) adult heavy and binge drinking. In addition, priority consequences that result from these two drinking patterns, identified by the SPF SIG Advisory Council are: suicide, interpersonal violence (including sexual assault), alcohol related mortality, DUI offenses and Minor Consuming Alcohol (MCA) citations, and alcohol related crashes and collisions. The other two issues that were discussed and identified as critical factors related to Alaska's alcohol use are the dis-proportionality of the impact of alcohol on Alaska Native populations; and the increased risk factors for youth attending Alternative High Schools vs. Traditional High schools. The state will use this information to frame the state's SPF SIG Strategic Plan and in the state's request for proposals, the related community grant awards will focus on at least one of the identified consumption patterns and once consequence related to alcohol use.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Statewide

**Allocate Resources:** The state's SFP SIG needs assessment will guide the development of a statewide competitive request for proposals for SPF SIG funding. It is expected the 5-10 proposals will be funded.

By providing SAFERR services to families referred to the Division of Behavioral Health by OCS, these OCS child custody rates will decrease as those numbers have in Anchorage.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** Services will be provided within the boundaries of the Matanuska-Susitna Borough.

Municipalities in turn purchase services through sub-grants with local non-profit agencies. These funds, by statute, are to provide essential human services whose unavailability would subject persons needing the services to serious mental or physical hardship. Some of the services that may be provided include substance abuse treatment, mental health services, food and shelter for low income families and individuals, housing and rehabilitation for the physically and mentally ill, runaway shelters, as well as sexual assault and domestic violence treatment.

**Assessment of Need:** Per AS 29.60.600 the municipality will consult with a citizen's advisory group and carry out a needs assessment to prioritize the proposed services that are necessary to prevent or alleviate serious mental or physical hardships for persons residing within the municipality or who travel to the municipality from elsewhere in the state. Applicants will be required to demonstrate that services provided under subawards are essential as statutorily defined.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** Current qualifying regions include Municipality of Anchorage, Mat-Su Borough and Fairbanks North Star Borough. The grantees are required to provide a match of 30% of the proposed project.

AS 29.60.600 determines the eligible entities; and the formula by which the level of award is determined uses the most current, certified populations for these entities.

## Federal Formula Non-Secure Attendant Care Shelter

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.05.010(7), AS 47.14.010(6)

**Description of Services:** Non-secure attendant care shelters provide short-term staff-secure placement for arrested youth and youth placed into protective custody until they can be safely released to a parent/guardian or transferred to a residential or juvenile detention facility. Referrals are made by the Division of Juvenile Justice's (DJJ) juvenile probation officers and by local judicial and law enforcement officers. Shelter attendants provide one-to-one, same gender supervision to referred youth in staff-secure settings. Shelter service is available 24 hours per day and is provided within 45 minutes of notification of need. Shelter placements may not exceed 16 hours unless an extension is authorized.

**Assessment of Need:** The Federal Formula Grants Program makes funds available to states to improve juvenile justice systems and implement delinquency prevention and intervention strategies. The Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act requires the first priority for Formula Grant expenditures be in support of strategies that bring states into compliance with the four core mandates of the Act: 1) deinstitutionalization of status offenders; 2) removal of youth offenders from adult jail and lockups; 3) sight and sound separation of youth from adult offenders in adult jails and lock-ups; and 4) identification, assessment and remediation of disproportionate minority contact with the juvenile justice system.

In FY89, DJJ began using a portion of its Formula grant to support a statewide network of non-secure shelters. A strong and viable statewide system of non-secure shelters has been instrumental in reducing violations of the first three core mandates by providing a temporary placement for arrested youth and youth placed in protective custody.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** Current utilization rates, FY10 and FY11, DJJ juvenile delinquency data, and feedback gathered from DJJ field staff and community providers indicate the need for continued operation of the existing non-secure shelters. Past, present, and projected shelter utilization rates are determining factors in awarding appropriate amounts to each provider.

Total annual funding will remain at current funding levels for one year (FY12) for communities now served by non-secure attendant care shelters with the exception of Ketchikan where funding has been reduced by \$10,000. After one year, funding levels will be reassessed based on utilization rates and may be altered at the discretion of the Division. The current rates in communities now served by non-secure attendant care shelters are as follows: Anchorage \$33,260; Juneau \$14,060; Sitka \$17,849; Ketchikan \$20,000; Wasilla \$13,100; Fairbanks \$21,740; Kodiak \$6,620. There is continued discussion and planning with DJJ field staff and rural law enforcement for the development and funding of non-secure services for communities willing to manage a non-secure shelter. Total annual funding of \$25,000 will be reserved for additional non-secure shelters.

## Title V (Formula) Delinquency Prevention

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.05.010(7)

**Description of Services:** The Title V program encourages local governments and Indian tribes to perform multi-disciplinary assessments of both risks and resources specific to their communities, and to then develop community-wide collaborative plans to prevent delinquency. Services are identified based on local assessments and reflected in the communities' written three-year Delinquency Prevention Plans. Services may be either systems improvement projects or service delivery projects. Applicants are required to include one or more activities that provide culturally competent and culturally appropriate services to minority youth. This will assist the Division of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) in developing strategies to reduce disproportionate minority over representation in the state's juvenile justice system.

**Assessment of Need:** The goal of this program is to help prevent youth from entering the juvenile justice system by reducing delinquency risk factors and enhancing protective factors. Risk-focused delinquency prevention is a comprehensive approach based on the premise that to prevent a problem from occurring, factors that contribute to the development of the problem must be identified and addressed. Risk factors for juvenile delinquency include: (1) individual characteristics such as alienation and rebelliousness; (2) family influences such as parental conflict, child abuse, substance abuse, school dropouts, and teen pregnancy; (3) school experiences such as academic failure; (4) negative peer group influences such as friends engaging in problem behavior like drugs and violence; and (5) community factors such as economic deprivation, high rates of substance abuse, and crime rates. The Federal Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention allocates Title V funds to states based on the number of juveniles below the age of criminal responsibility.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** Title V funds may be awarded only to units of local government and to Indian tribes that perform law enforcement functions. A statewide service delivery area is proposed, with no specific communities designated to receive funding under this program. While awards of up to \$45,000 may be made, proposals for lesser amounts are encouraged.

To qualify for Title V Grant funds, eligible entities must meet the following federal requirements: 1) Demonstrate compliance with the four core mandates of the Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention Act; 2) Assemble a local Prevention Policy Board; 3) Develop a three-year Delinquency Prevention Plan; and 4) Provide a 50% cash or in-kind match to the grant award.

In accordance with the Office of Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) guidelines, previous recipients of three-year Title V grants will not be awarded. Those ineligible to apply include Nunakuyak Traditional Council and the governments of Anchorage, Juneau, Kenai, Kodiak, Sitka, Valdez, Wasilla, Metlakatla, Seldovia, Seward and the Kenaitze IRA.

**Description of Services:** Services must include case screening, adjudication, disposition, and case management for you who are referred for non-violent first or second time misdemeanor offenses and/or status offenses. Youth courts/community panels may vary in composition according to youth court standards and community resources.

**Assessment of Need:** These grants are intended to supplement and broaden the range of accountability-based, restorative justice services for youth by providing early intervention diversion programs. Through the swift application of graduated responses, which work best in preventing, controlling and reducing further delinquent behavior, everyone, including victims and communities benefit.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** A statewide service delivery area is proposed. The Division will make grant recommendations to the Commissioner based on an equitable distribution of services throughout Alaska, accounting for the significant geographic and demographic extremes in the State.

## Children's Advocacy Centers

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** Children's Advocacy Centers (CACs) provide comprehensive child-centered services in a facility which allows law enforcement, child protection professionals, prosecutors, victim advocates, mental health professionals and the medical community to work together under Memoranda of Agreement to handle child abuse cases. The CAC goal is to provide a coordinated, child-centered response to child abuse cases, ensuring children are not further victimized by systems designed to protect them.

CACs utilize a multidisciplinary team (MDT) model to identify maltreated children, protect children from further harm, provide referrals, treatment and follow up, and hold offenders accountable. MDTs provide a coordinated response to addressing child abuse and maltreatment and a fully functioning MDT will exist before a CAC is formed. MDTs may exist in communities in which the volume of cases does not warrant a CAC, benefitting from training and mentoring by the MDT of a fully-functioning CAC near the community.

**Assessment of Need:** In SFY2010, CACs have responded to 1609 reports of abuse, a 10% increase over the past 2 fiscal years. The number of CAC referrals continues to increase, partly due to coordinated responses under the highly effective MDT model, and the State's support for nationally accredited, highly functioning Centers across the state.

The majority of current Centers are stable. Those in locales with more stable economic bases have diversified funding sources, creating movement toward sustainability. However, no currently operating CACs are at a point of total sustainability and those in economically disadvantaged areas continue to depend heavily on grants for operational funding.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Statewide

**Allocate Resources:** All Centers accept referrals of suspected sexual abuse and some severe physical abuse in children up to age 18. In addition, most Centers also accept referrals outside their target population for developmentally disabled children, or those with some type of cognitive impairment such as Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder. With a statewide service delivery area, it is the division's intent to allocate funds, at current levels, to the operational CACs in Anchorage, Bethel, Glenallen, Dillingham, Fairbanks, Juneau, Nome and Wasilla. Kodiak will receive a \$250,000 planning grant based on an FY12 waiver given by the legislature. Limited planning grants will be available for the formation of CACs in communities with fully functioning MDTs.

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.10 Children in Need of Aid, AS 47.17 Child Protection, AS 47.05.010 Administration, Title IV-B Subpart 2 Sec. 430 [42.U.S.C. 629](a), Adoptions and Safe Families Act (ASFA 11/19/97).

**Description of Services:** These services are designed to help families and children living in Alaska who are at risk of out-of-home placement and/or children who are in out-of-home placement needing services to reunify with their families. This is a combination of services previously solicited through multiple Requests for Proposals. Services are outlined separately as Options: Option 1: Family Preservation services are provided to Office of Children's Services (OCS) involved families to prevent the transition of children to out-of-home settings and support the reunification process when children are returned home from an out-of-home placement. Option 2: Time Limited Family Reunification services are designed to provide ongoing family contact and transportation services for OCS involved families in the agency, home or community settings; and facilitate the reunification of the child with their biological parent(s). Option 3 : Family Contact Services Center services are designed to provide ongoing family contact and transportation services for OCS involved families needing higher levels of supervision in the agency setting; and facilitate the reunification of the child with their biological parent(s).

Applicants may choose multiple options from those available in their service delivery area.

**Assessment of Need:** OCS statistics show that children are being placed in out-of-home settings at nearly three times the rate that they are being discharged from OCS services.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** Family Preservation and Time Limited Family Reunification services are being solicited statewide. Family Contact Service Centers are being solicited only in Anchorage, Western and Southcentral regions of the Office of Children's Services (OCS) service area.

Funding will be allocated based on population; numbers of children in out-of-home care; community resources; and referral rates from OCS regional offices.

## Early Intervention for Young Children

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** The primary services consist of the establishment and/or continuation of early childhood mental health consultation systems to early care and learning programs and learning networks. Such systems will include consultation, professional development and technical assistance. Services will raise the level of competency within the system and improve service capacity to reach more children and families, improving long-term outcomes. Additionally, one grantee will provide services connecting and coordinating all grantees in a statewide network.

With the additional funds, current grantees will expand current services and provide direct services to identified children and families: Standardized Social and Emotional Screening, On-Site Behavioral Services, or Brief Family Training, Education and Support.

**Assessment of Need:** The target population consists of mental health clinicians, social workers, family support workers, early interventionists, medical providers, and others working with young children at risk of severe emotional disturbances, and their families. Additional funding will expand the target population to include children and families in which the child meets specific diagnostic criteria, atypical development and/or is at risk for loss of placement in an early childhood program or foster home. There is increasing evidence that such providers lack the training necessary to meet the needs of children with mental health and social/emotional issues. Basic professional training and consultation is needed to gain specific skills necessary to identify early childhood mental health problems; to serve children with these issues in their natural environments; to intervene appropriately; and to support the children's families. These services will benefit children birth to five years old and their families, with additional funds providing for additional direct benefit.

Mental health concerns must be addressed as early as possible in the critical period of early childhood development. Delay increases the probability of children having significant health and education needs in the future. This program is part of a multi-pronged effort to raise the capacity and quality of early childhood mental health services and will further the recommendations in the DHSS Early Childhood Comprehensive Systems Plan.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** Service delivery areas are the regions of Anchorage, Fairbanks and Juneau, and up to three awards will be issued.

Services will be awarded at \$100,000 per region. The proposer awarded the coordination of services among the three regions will be awarded an additional \$50,000.

## Early Intervention/ Infant Learning Program

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.20.060-AS 47.20.290 (Special Services for Certain Children), 7AAC 023 (Programs for Handicapped Children) & 34 CFR Part 303 (Early Intervention Program for Infants & Toddlers with Disabilities)

**Description of Services:** The purpose of this grant program is to provide early intervention services to families of infants and toddlers (birth to third birthday) with disabilities and/or developmental delays to ensure improved outcomes and the development of natural supports for children and their families. Service delivery performance and program standards comply with the requirements of Part C of IDEA (the Federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act).

The Early Intervention/Infant Learning Program (EI/ILP) grantees will provide family-centered, home-based services that include developmental evaluation/assessments, service coordination, development of Individualized Family Service Plans (IFSP), and educational and/or therapeutic services as determined by the EI/ILP team. Service providers typically include two or more individuals from the following disciplines: Occupational Therapist, Physical Therapist, Speech Language Pathologists, Early Childhood Special Educators, and other disciplines based on the individual child and family needs.

The program uses a secured web-based data system to monitor and evaluate progress on child outcome measures and compliance measures including timeliness of evaluations, initiation of services and timely planning for transition to other services at age three. Cost data are collected and analyzed on a quarterly basis to ensure appropriate distribution and utilization of resources.

These services will address all three of the DHSS priority areas of *Health and Wellness Across the Lifespan; Health Care, Access, Delivery & Value*; and *Safe and Responsible Individuals, Families and Communities*. Core services will include: *Protect and Promote the Health of Alaskans; Provide Quality of Life in a Safe Living Environment for Alaskans; Manage Health Care Coverage for Alaskans in Need; Facilitate Access to Affordable Health Care for Alaskans; Strengthen Alaska Families; and Protect Vulnerable Alaskans*.

**Assessment of Need:** IDEA requires that comprehensive early intervention services be available to eligible infants and toddlers and their families in all areas of the state. Approximately 2300 infants and toddlers are referred to the Infant Learning Program for services annually.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** The EI/ILP program designates 19 service areas within Alaska. Applicants base their requests for funding on demonstrated service needs in the region(s) they propose to serve. Funding recommendations promote results-based accountability and equitable allocation of funds statewide.

Each youth in the program will be provided with a case manager who, along with the caseworker / Division of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) worker, will develop an individual case plan outlining goals the youth will work on while in the shelter.

**Assessment of Need:** Under AS 47.14.100 (Powers and Duties of Department Over Care of Child), the Department must arrange for the care of every child committed to its custody by placing the child in a foster home or in the care of an agency or institution providing care for children inside or outside the state. The same statute allows the Department to pay necessary costs to ensure adequate care. Approval of this request will ensure that critical Emergency Shelter Services will continue to be available to DBH, OCS and DJJ workers.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** The proposed service delivery area is Anchorage.

**Allocate Resources:** Anchorage contains essentially 50% of the population of the state. In more rural or in smaller urban settings, these types of services are accommodated through similar grants on a smaller scale or through the Behavioral Rehabilitation Services system of Level II shelters. Anchorage area needs are substantial and exceed the current capacity. This grant mitigates a portion of that need.

In SFY2012 there were 2810 children in out of home placement with 693 legally free for adoption. There has been an average of 350 adoptions/guardianships each year for the last 5 years.

The program provides, to foster parents in every Resource Family home, accessibility to training to meet minimum annual requirements established by 7 AAC 50.250(g).

Based on SFY11 data in the Online Resources for Children of Alaska database, OCS substantiated 2025 of the 16,178 Protective Services Reports received. In SFY 11, there were 2912 children in out-of-home placement. The number of children in out-of-home placement anticipates there will always be new Resource Families entering our system and in need of this training required for their important collaboration with OCS. In fiscal year 2011, there were 470 new Resource Families trained.

**Assessment of Need:** Federal and state mandates require that OCS make efforts to maintain cultural and family continuity while serving children and families involved in the child welfare system. Additionally, the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) requires additional mandates for Alaska Native children. Alaska has a disproportionate number of Alaskan Native children in the foster care system, and these cases require more intensive oversight and case management support. While many children reside in the urban hubs of Alaska, a significant percentage still reside in their rural communities of origin. In many of these areas, OCS must serve clients remotely and/or does not have a stable workforce to provide the close monitoring and support necessary to adequately meet the legal mandates needed to serve Alaskan Native families. We are seeking service providers with a demonstrated understanding of the ICWA, and an existing infrastructure in remote/local settings to provide culturally relevant intensive case management services.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** The service provider must be physically located in the communities where the services are to be offered. Targeted service areas are the OCS Northern, Western, Southcentral, and Southeast designated regions.

Services provide a continuum of preparation and support for foster families who adopt or become the legal guardian of a child. While services are open to all adoptive or guardianship resource families in Alaska, most served will be caring for a child from the Office of Children's Services (OCS) foster care system.

**Assessment of Need:** The program's target populations are potential, current, and post-adoptive resource families of children that have been sexually abused, physically abused and/or neglected. The program meets Department needs for pre- and post-adoption support to a continuous pool of safe and culturally appropriate families in which to place children in our custody.

Based on data in the Online Resources for Children of Alaska (ORCA) database, In FY11 there were 2,912 children in out-of-home placement, with 700 currently legally free for adoption or legal guardianship. During FY11, the program had 1423 requests for services, including multiple service requests by some families. In the same period, OCS finalized 329 adoptions and 31 legal guardianships for children in foster care.

**Description of Services:** Grant monies may be used to pay benefits to households with income between 151% and 225% of the poverty income guidelines as well as to supplement Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) block grant funding to ensure that families receive a grant comparable to the price point paid by the State's Heating Assistance Program. Grantees will be responsible for intake, determination of program eligibility, notification of award amounts per household, processing payments to heating assistance vendors, and reporting to the State.

**Assessment of Need:** Prompted by the high cost of home heating, SB 220 refined the Granting Authority legislation that created a state-funded Heating Assistance Program for households with incomes between 150% and 225% of the federal poverty income guidelines for Alaska to authorize the level of heating assistance provided to households and allow the use of general funds to supplement monies received from the LIHEAP block grant to pay benefits at levels defined in said bill.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** Service areas coincide with the areas identified by the native organizations that currently administer the federal LIHEAP program. They are the only eligible grantees to administer the State funded program. As other Alaska Native Organizations become eligible to administer a federal LIHEAP program they will be encouraged to apply for funding in the following state fiscal year. Geographical areas and specified populations not served by the grantees of this program will be administered directly by the Heating Assistance Office, DPA.

Resources will be allocated using a formula currently in use for the distribution of the LIHEAP block grant monies.

Activities include providing information to potentially eligible, low income persons and families about the benefits of the services, screening for eligibility, providing assistance with completing applications, and providing materials to assist applicants with gathering eligibility documentation. The grantee will also procure food and commodities for nutrition education classes and to help feed hungry Alaskan families year-round, with a special effort made during the holiday season.

**Assessment of Need:** Alaska's poverty rate is 9.1%. and the National Center for Educational Statistics notes that 1 of every 7 children in Alaska lives in poverty. Over 200 communities will benefit from the Alaska Food Coalition program. Population and poverty levels will be used as a guideline to target those in need.

These grantees will continue to verify payments to providers participating in the PASS II and III Programs and will be adding verification of PASS I payments to the scope of work. Grantees also monitor compliance with program requirements. Services in the Anchorage area are limited to determining eligibility for families due to the volume of work.

**Assessment of Need:** Services are provided for low-moderate income eligible families, enabling parents to attain self-sufficiency by subsidizing the cost of child care, and assisting individuals interested in participating as an eligible provider in the CCAP.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** At present, services are provided statewide by both grantees and the CCPO.

**Allocate Resources:** Resources are currently allocated based on the number of families and children served and costs proposed by individual grantees for providing the services.

In FY 2011, the CCPO completed a Functional Cost Analysis (FCA) under contract #0611-011 with Gannon Consulting, LLC. The FCA (attached) was designed to provide specific information and tools the Department could use to evaluate program delivery.

Based on the information received in the FCA, the CCPO has determined that accepting five designated regions will reduce the number of grantees to the primary regions currently doing 91% of the work. The CCPO incorporated the recommendations of the FCA in developing an equitable funding formula, see attached. **Description of Services:** Child Care Licensing Program services include: processing applications; determining provider eligibility; obtaining valid criminal history and child protection check results on providers; announced and unannounced visits to child care facilities for initial, annual and renewal inspections; investigation procedures for licensed and approved providers in the Municipality of Anchorage (MOA), and all administrative hearing practices for the providers in the MOA.

The department retains overall responsibility for the management of child care licensing efforts in the state. This involves promulgating rules and regulations governing the program, overseeing the expenditure of funds by the grantee, monitoring services, and ensuring the grantee operates within their scope of work. The Municipality of Anchorage promulgates municipal child care codes that, at a minimum, must meet state regulations.

**Assessment of Need:** The intent of the Child Care Licensing Program is to reduce the risk of predictable harm to children and support services to child care providers.

In accordance with AS 47.32.030, the department may delegate its powers relating to licensure of child care facilities to a municipality that has adopted an ordinance providing for child care licensing under the home rule powers under AS 29.10.010 or as authorized under AS 29.35.200-29.35.210. These powers have been delegated to the Municipality of Anchorage since 1998.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** The Municipality of Anchorage (MOA) is the only entity that qualifies under the provisions of AS 47.32.030.

**Allocate Resources:** Funding is based upon the amount of available resources and a funding formula which will be derived from a Functional Cost Analysis, completed at the end of FY12 (available upon request).

## Commodity Supplemental Food

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, Federal regulations - 7 CFR Part 247, CSFP State plan

**Description of Services:** Commodity Supplemental Foods Program (CSFP) grants fund local administration of the CSFP program, which increases the access of nutritious foods, increases food security, and provides nutrition education to low income women, infants, children and seniors. This goal is in compliance with federal and state regulations and policies. The relative need among geographic areas and populations for expanding or providing services is evaluated by determining the percentage of eligible women, infants, and children whose income is below 185% of federal poverty guidelines and seniors whose income is 130% of the federal poverty level.

**Assessment of Need:** Low-income pregnant, breastfeeding, or post-partum women, infants, and children and senior citizens who live in Alaska are at a nutritional risk because they may not get enough food to eat. The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) CSFP program provides a monthly box of nutritious foods to income-eligible pregnant and up-to-one-year postpartum women, children age 0-6 years, and seniors over age 60 who sign up for the program with a local service provider.

The goals of Community Supplemental Food Program are to increase:

- the percent of pregnant, breastfeeding, and postpartum women who have adequate food to meet their nutritional needs;
- access to nutritious foods for eligible children and the elderly;
- participation in food and nutrition assistance programs;
- the percent of Alaskans whose eating behaviors are positively impacted by various nutrition education activities;
- food security among Alaskan households

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Anchorage and Fairbanks

**Allocate Resources:**

Federal regulations authorize states to find the best use of this federal funding. Because of the limited funding this program is being restricted to the most heavily populated areas within the state. USDA provides funding to Alaska DHSS DPA to distribute among grantees. Grantees order, house and package the commodity foods for local partner agencies throughout the state. Partner agencies process applications and offer commodity food boxes to participants on a monthly basis. Grantees and partner agencies provide information about the commodity foods and other nutrition education and referrals.

Grantees will help the family coordinate multiple agency plans and activities, access health behavioral health and domestic violence services, and partner with state and community agencies to ensure the family is making progress.

**Assessment of Need:** UAA Institute for Circumpolar Health Studies findings show there are two primary groups of families receiving ATAP - those who have relatively few challenges and need only short-term services to get a job and close their ATAP case and those who have many challenges and long-term dependence on assistance. The target population are those families referred by DPA with parents experiencing multiple or profound challenges to getting and keeping a job, or a significantly reduced capacity to participate in activities full time.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Anchorage, Mat-Su Valley, Fairbanks, Nome, Kenai Peninsula, Southeast Alaska and rural balance of the State.

**Allocate Resources:** The amount of funds for each area will be determined by current caseload distribution, the cost of doing business in that region, and available funding.

**Description of Services:** This grant provides funding to develop work experience opportunities in remote villages, increasing program capacity to support Alaska Temporary Assistance Program (ATAP) Work Services participants as they prepare and engage in work and work experience placements.

**Assessment of Need:** The Administration for Children and Families (ACF) sets standards for parents receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) benefits for participating in work or community work experience activities and the hours of participation. States that don't meet the federally mandated participation rate targets are subject to financial penalties; this grant will help avoid significant financial penalties. Families in remote villages outside the central hub communities have very limited opportunities for potential work experience placements and other "countable" activities. Kawerak NEWS helps to support this need within the culture of the majority of the remote villages.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Services are provided in the villages of the Nome Census Area.

**Allocate Resources:** Funding allocated to the region is based on the population and reasonable costs necessary to provide for services in a remote region.

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, 45 CFR 286 Tribal TANF Provisions, 42 USC 612 Direct Funding and Administration by Indian Tribes, AS 47.27.070 Alaska Native Organizations' Family Assistance Programs, AS 47.27.200 Alaska Native Family Assistance Grants, AS 47.27.300 Regional Public Assistance Programs

**Description of Services:** The Native Family Assistance Program (NFAP) grant supplements federal funds as part of the State of Alaska (SOA) Maintenance of Effort (MOE), and will be used by potential grantees to pay benefits directly to eligible families to assist them in moving from reliance on welfare to self sufficiency through employment. Grant funds may also be used to provide supportive services to eligible families, as well as diversion to families that appear eligible in order to prevent them from coming onto assistance. In essence, these grants are a transfer of payments from the Alaska Temporary Assistance Program (ATAP) to the Native Family Assistance Program. Three of the grantees operate a regional family assistance program, serving all eligible families, including non-Native beneficiaries, in their service area.

**Assessment of Need:** 42 USC 612 authorizes Alaska Native organizations that formerly operated a Native JOBS program to develop and administer Native Family Assistance Programs and to receive Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) funding directly from the federal government for their service area (cash assistance as well as employment programs).

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** The service areas for these grants are defined by the boundaries of each of the eligible Alaska Native Entity responsible for the administration of a Native Family Assistance Program. These service areas are described in each organization's plan approved by the Federal government.

Effective with the FY15 grant year, Cook Inlet Native Council (CITC) will begin serving the Native population within the Mat-Su valley, which is currently being served by the Division of Public Assistance. (DPA) CITC's total annual funding will be increased by \$1,134,701 to serve this additional population.

Resources are allocated based on projections of how much the Division would expend in Temporary Assistance benefits for the service population covered by each Native Family Assistance Program (NFAP) identified in AS 47.27.070, and in accordance with the provisions of AS 47.27.200 and AS 47.27.300.

In addition, 45 CFR 268 and AS 47.27 further restrict participation to those entities that have a Tribal Family Assistance Program plan approved by the Federal government (DHHS Administration for Children and Families) prior to implementing a Native Family Assistance Program and thereby establish eligibility for the state grant. Others identified in AS 47.27.070 may be added to the program once they successfully establish this eligibility.

**Description of Services:** The goals of the Seniors Farmers' Market Nutrition Program are to 1) provide coupons worth \$25-50 to low-income seniors. These coupons are redeemed at participating individual farmers, farmers' markets, and roadside stands; 2) increase consumption of agricultural commodities by expanding or aiding in the expansion of domestic farmers' markets, roadside stands and 3) develop or aid in the development of new and additional farmers' markets, roadside stands, and individual farmers participating in the program. Grantees will reimburse state approved farmers for redeemed coupons.

**Assessment of Need:** Senior citizens in Alaska and the United States do not consume enough fresh fruits and vegetables. The United States Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Commodity Credit Corporation awards grant funds to provide coupons to low-income seniors that they may exchange for eligible foods at farmers' market and roadside stands. Eligible foods are fresh, nutritious and unprocessed locally grown fresh fruits, vegetables, berries, and herbs.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Anchorage, Mat-Su Valley, Kenai, Fairbanks and other areas that have access to these local farm resources.

**Allocate Resources:** This program is restricted to the portion of the state that farms fresh produce. Grant funds must be used for food only. No local administrative funding is provided.

## Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC)

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, USDA Regulations 7 CFR Part 246

**Description of Services:** The Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program provides nutrition assessment services, nutrition education, breastfeeding guidance and support, free supplemental foods that contain key nutrients often lacking in the diets of the target population, and referral for health and social services. WIC services are combined with pediatric and prenatal services wherever possible. A portion of funds are also issued under this GPA to initiate upgrades to equipment, facilities or infrastructure, including piloting new technologies and other United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) priorities, enhancing nutrition education resources, and other projects to enhance and expand services.

**Assessment of Need:** The WIC Program currently serves approximately 21,000 women, infants and children through 13 grantees at 23 fixed clinic locations with 235 additional communities served on an itinerant basis. With declining federal revenues for the program, and the need to ensure continuing and more effective service delivery with those reduced resources, the WIC program has been implementing changes to help protect the integrity of services. In FY 14, the WIC Program proposed to changes to the service infrastructure in order to achieve four primary goals: 1) Attain grantee administrative and service delivery cost efficiencies; 2) Increase grantee staff resources available for direct services; 3) Target underserved populations; 4) Increase compliance with federal standards on WIC nutrition services.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Statewide

**Allocate Resources:** FY 14 introduced significant changes to the WIC Grants intended to achieve the goals listed above, including the consolidation of service areas. (See service areas on page 21 of the attached Stellar Group Report). Over the last five years, DHSS WIC has implemented the gradual application of a funding formula designed to provide an objective, equitable distribution of available resources. Funding may also include "Operational Adjustment (OA)" funds, reserved by USDA for special projects, which they make available to WIC grantees, and the State WIC office, through annual application. Applications from grantees are submitted through the State WIC office and, if approved by USDA, WIC program grant awards are amended to support those specific federally-approved projects.

**Assessment of Need:** In 2000, the Gambell Public Assistance Office was remodeled to include a small drop in child care facility to test the effectiveness of such a program in Alaska's largest DPA office. The original intent was, if successful, the program could be expanded to other DPA offices. The program has exceeded expectations; however, additional funding is not available to expand to other DPA offices at this time. The Division recommends continuation of the program in its current form until, and if, additional funding becomes available.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Anchorage

**Allocate Resources:** The Gambell Public Assistance Office was chosen because it is the largest DPA office.

The Kenai and Mat-Su communities have limited resources to devote towards public transportation and need alternatives for families unable to afford a vehicle for personal use. This grant is to help ATAP clients meet their transportation needs.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** Grant funding under this program will support clients who live in communities for which the division has determined there is need in helping ATAP clients with transportation. The supports this grant will provide will help make transportation more affordable and help the clients become more self-sufficient.

Up to two grants will be funded in the Matanuska-Susitna and Kenai Peninsula areas.

Anchorage Project Access

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** Nationally, Project Access is a proven template for health care delivery for the uninsured in which health care practitioners provide free care to a limited number of low-income uninsured individuals each year, improving health outcomes and reducing emergency room charity care costs. Patients are screened for income eligibility and cannot be eligible for other programs.

**Assessment of Need:** Based on findings from the 2011 Alaska Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System Survey, 52,000 residents in the Anchorage/Mat-Su region (14%) had no health care coverage.

**Service Delivery Area** Anchorage and Mat-Su

**and Method Used to**

**Allocate Resources:** Anchorage Project Access (APA) will serve primary and specialty care patients who reside within the Municipality of Anchorage, and within the Mat-Su on a limited basis. Ten percent of APA's quarterly enrollments may be reserved for residents of other Alaska communities provided the resident is currently treated by an APA provider. Project leaders anticipate enrolling and serving approximately 400 patients per grant year. By investing public dollars in APA, DHSS can expect a reduction in uncompensated outpatient care.

**Public Health****Autism Evaluation and Diagnostic Services**

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** This grant will provide for the delivery of statewide pediatric neurodevelopmental evaluation and diagnostic services for autism and co-occurring neurodevelopmental conditions and other medical needs using an interdisciplinary team model of care from an established in-state provider agency. Specifically, the grantee will provide expanded diagnostic services through specialists (physicians and advanced nurse practitioners) who are specially training in autism evaluation, diagnosis and service delivery. Other services that are to be offered include psychological testing, occupational, physical, and speech-language assessment and evaluation services as well as parent navigation services for families and children with an autism spectrum diagnosis and other co-occurring neurodevelopmental diagnoses.

**Assessment of Need:** Early diagnosis of autism spectrum disorders can lead to appropriate intervention, reinforcing the need for expanded availability of diagnostic services. Currently, the average age of diagnosis is thought to be 3-5 years old in Alaska. Enrolling children in early intervention and treatment service earlier in life (preferably by age 2) can significantly alter the lifelong outcomes of children with autism and reduce or eliminate the need for and cost of services. If left untreated, autism severely impacts not only the individual with the disorder, but also their family members, classmates, teachers, and participation in the community.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Statewide but services will be delivered on a central campus where all of the pediatric specialists and therapists reside.

**Allocate Resources:** Funds are to be used to support the infrastructure needed to offer these services and that are not billable to a third party payer or the family. Applicants will need to demonstrate their ability to rapidly respond to referrals and move children through the system in a timely manner. In addition, the applicant will need to commit to an interdisciplinary model of evaluation and diagnosis.

**Public Health****Children's Health Improvement Program Reauthorization Act**

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** This project will allow the Alaska Department of Health & Social Services to participate in a tri-state collaborative effort with Oregon and West Virginia to work on the following categories of the program: (A) test federal government proposed measures of quality of children's care, (B) promote the use of Health Information Technology (HIT) in reporting on and improving children's health care delivery, and (C) demonstrate effectiveness of practice based models for improved care for children. The federal grant provides for State Medicaid and Child Health Insurance Programs to work with health care providers and other partners in their states to carry out the activities proposed in the grant guidance.

**Assessment of Need:** Alaska is collaborating with Oregon and West Virginia in applying for funds through Children's Health Improvement Program Reauthorization Act Quality Improvement RFP. The three states point out that testing measures of quality of care, demonstrating patient care models, and implementing electronic health records should be accomplished in rural states (all three are designated as rural by the federal government). CHIPRA targets children and youth 0-18. While the federal government provides funding for children's health care in the form of Medicaid and CHIPRA, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) is asking states to assist in testing more comprehensive measures of quality and effectiveness of medical services for children, and in turn is providing support for infrastructure development related to quality measures, HIT, and patient centered medical home practice models. This project will result in improved health care for Alaska children.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** Service area is statewide, with efforts to include participating practices representative of urban and rural, Tribal and non-tribal areas and providers

## Clinical Family Planning Services (Title X)

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, 7AAC 78.011-260, Title X grants are not authorized as part of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act.

**Description of Services:** This program provides funding to qualified applicants to offer low-cost, confidential, clinical reproductive health and family planning services to low-income women and men residing on the lower Kenai Peninsula and in Fairbanks. Services must include, but are not limited to: comprehensive reproductive health exams, clinical breast examinations, Pap smear screening and pelvic examinations, pregnancy testing, counseling and screening for sexually transmitted diseases and counseling and provision of contraceptive methods. In addition to clinical services, the qualified applicant must offer client education and referral to other local agencies for all pregnancy options and for sterilization procedures. The broad range of services paid for with Title X monies strictly prohibits abortion as a method for family planning. As a recipient of federal Title X funding, the clinical services provider must follow Title X policies and procedures for determining eligibility and enrolling women and men for discounted services, as well as meeting the Title X Program requirements of a clinical services delivery site.

**Assessment of Need:** The Kenai Peninsula census area has the third highest number of unintended births in the state. Planned Parenthood of Alaska operates a Title X-funded clinic in Soldotna, located on the upper Kenai Peninsula, offering low-cost, high quality clinical family planning services to low income women and men residing in the surrounding communities. The Department seeks a family planning services provider to offer comparable services to low income women and men on the lower Kenai Peninsula and surrounding areas.

Fairbanks represents the 3rd most populous urban center in the state, yet experiences the 2nd highest rate of unintended births in Alaska. The rate of births to teens aged 15-19 represented fully 16% of all births in this age group in Alaska in 2008, and births to unmarried women of any age represented a full 11% of the births in the state that same year. Fairbanks and the surrounding area lack providers of comprehensive family planning services for low income individuals and families. The closest Title X-funded service site is located 317 miles south in Wasilla (the Mat-Su Public Health Center). Also, there are no providers with fee schedules that slide to zero charge, including the Planned Parenthood clinic located in Fairbanks (not a Title X-funded site). The Fairbanks Public Health Center offers only a limited scope of reproductive health services and FDA-approved contraceptive methods. Therefore, the Department seeks a family planning services provider in Fairbanks to participate in our Title X program.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** The funds from this program target the lower Kenai Peninsula, which includes Homer and the surrounding communities and Fairbanks.

**Allocate Resources:** Historically, there have been limited family planning funds available in Alaska. In order to ensure that funds were allocated to areas with the highest need, the census areas with the highest number of unintended births (based on Alaska Pregnancy Risk Assessment Monitoring data) were identified as priority areas for family planning funds. This program has a 10% match requirement.

Community Health Aide Training and Supervision

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 18.28.010 – AS 18.28.100

**Description of Services:** Community Health Aides (CHAs) and Community Health Practitioners (CHPs) are the principle providers of health services at the village level. CHAs are responsible for giving first aid in emergencies, examining the ill, reporting symptoms to the physician and carrying out the recommended treatment. CHPs provide primary health care and preventive health services. The program provides funds for CHAs to complete 2,500 training courses, including CHA training, ETT/EMT training, and continuing education. CHA supervisors are expected to make over 15,000 contacts with CHAs as part of training and supervision. CHAs are expected to have close to 300,000 patient encounters during each fiscal year.

**Assessment of Need:** CHAs and CHPs will target isolated communities of rural Alaska where more advanced medical personnel are unavailable. There are currently 180 tribally operated village-built clinics employing approximately 500 CHA/Ps. CHA/Ps are employed by 30 tribes or tribal organizations serving 130,000 Alaska Natives. CHA/Ps provide health care in accordance with the CHAP Certification Board Standards and Procedures and the Community Health Aide Manual (CHAM). The reported rate of CHA/P certification as of June 2013, was 86%; the rate of certification has been at or higher than 80% since October 2006 (Community Health Aide Program Certification Board, Summary of Community Health Aides/Practitioners Certified, June, 2012).

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Statewide

**Allocate Resources:** AS 18.28.010 sets parameters for funding amounts for the CHATS program.

Community Health Centers - Senior Access Program

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** The goal of the Community Health Centers-Senior Access Program (CHC-SAP) grant program is to increase access to and delivery of primary care to Alaska seniors (persons age 65 years and older) through Alaska's Community Health Centers (CHCs). Funding is to help alleviate strain on CHCs resulting from their provision of medical homes for seniors who have been refused care by private practice physicians due to low Medicare reimbursement rates.

**Assessment of Need:** In this current and growing primary care crisis for seniors with Medicare as primary insurer, seniors are being refused care by physicians due to Medicare's low reimbursement rate. In some parts of Alaska CHCs are often the only providers willing to see Medicare patients. In 2005 CHCs served 5,468 Alaskans age 65 and over, a 12 percent increase over 2004, and over 13 percent of all Alaska seniors enrolled in Medicare.

Coordinated Community Older Adult Fall Prevention

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.05.010 Duties of Department

**Description of Services:** This project will establish and strengthen a comprehensive community network for fall prevention services for older adults. These services will be provided through one grantee through collaborative partnerships with several regional partners (sub-grantees), to older adults that are at-risk for serious fall-related injuries and those that currently experience repeated falls.

**Assessment of Need:** Each year, one in every three adults age 65 and older experience a fall. Falls can cause moderate to severe injuries, such as hip fractures and head traumas, and can increase the risk of nursing home placement. Falls are the leading reason for injury-related hospitalizations of older Alaskans.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Mat-Su Borough

**Allocate Resources:** Mat-Su Borough has the highest concentration of older adults in Alaska, proportionately and in absolute numbers. The concentration of beneficiaries increases the cost effectiveness of the project and the potential for measuring population-based outcomes.

## Emergency Medical Services

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** The Emergency Medical Services-Injury Prevention grant program supports the goals and objectives of the EMS system. A statewide system of grantee EMS Councils provides a conduit for client input, and additional sub-regions are served the same way by Native Organizations that also receive grants under the program. The grantees serve two main roles. First, they provide direct input to the department regarding needs and abilities of each respective community and region. Second, because direct EMS services are provided by a complex multidisciplinary system, the councils provide the knowledge of individuals from physicians and nurses, to pre-hospital EMS providers and communications experts.

**Assessment of Need:** EMS services stabilize and transport a patient to the most appropriate treatment facility as quickly as possible. The department has mandated responsibilities under AS 18.08.010: "The department is responsible for the development, implementation, and maintenance of a statewide comprehensive emergency medical service system..." The EMS-IP grant program helps meet these needs through specialized training and certification of all levels of EMS providers; through development and maintenance of the EMS continuum of care; and through assistance with the EMS aspects of disaster planning. The EMS-IP program also supports the public education, public policy, and environmental changes of targeted injury prevention.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** The statewide delivery area is served by regional EMS Councils and the North Slope Borough, plus sub-regions served by grantee Native Organizations.

**Allocate Resources:**

Historical distribution proportions, with refinements for targeted needs, will be used to allocate resources, as they promote predictability and equity between regions. These distribution proportions have proved effective over decades of service by regional grantees. A five-year procurement is requested for stability of services and to maximize use of systems and infrastructure that represent decades of state investment.

Although historic distribution proportions are effective, total program funding has not kept pace with inflation and identified needs. Total program funding was increased by less than 5% in FY10, and approximately 20% in FY07. Prior to FY07 however, the grant program experienced over 15 years of flat funding. Estimated FY11 funding is requested at FY10 levels, followed by approximate 3% requested annual increases from FY12 thru FY15.

## Healthy Start

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, 7 AAC 78, 050 and the Federal Public Health Service Act Title III, Part D, Section 330H (42 U.S.C. 254 c-8). This federal grant awarded for five years was not authorized under the Affordable Care Act of 2010.

**Description of Services:** The Division of Public Health/Section of Women, Children's and Family Health seeks to establish partnerships with non-profit service providers/agencies, or federally recognized tribal entities in Alaska to implement an infant mortality reduction project focused on high risk pregnancy and parenting women and families, especially those affected by behavioral health problems. Eligible areas based on Healthy Start criteria are: the Yukon-Koyukuk census area, Nome census area, and the Yukon-Kuskokwim and Wade Hampton census areas. The Alaska Healthy Start project will provide outreach and home visiting services using an enhanced case management model to , conduct group health education sessions, establish a consortium of local stakeholders to assure required community input, and develop a local health area action plan.

**Assessment of Need:** Women and infants in many rural areas of Alaska, where most residents are Alaska Native, experience a disproportionate burden of perinatal health problems. Alaska Native women, especially those living in the northern and southwest regions of the state, are more likely to have babies that die before their first birthdays, are born preterm, or are born with FASD or a major birth defect. These women are less likely to get early and adequate prenatal care and more likely to use tobacco (including smokeless tobacco) and alcohol during and after pregnancy, including binge drinking. They are more likely to be overweight or obese, report postpartum depression, smoke postpartum, and experience physical abuse by a husband or partner. These women and families are mostly poor and many women lack a high school education or supportive partner.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Eligible communities are the Norton Sound Census Area, Yukon-Koyukuk Census Area, and the Bethel and Wade Hampton Census Areas.

**Allocate Resources:** Services will be provided by an agency working in one of three communities determined to be eligible for services, based on Healthy Start criteria. These criteria include: infant mortality rate, percentage of pregnant women with anemia, percentage of pregnancy women entering prenatal care in the first trimester less than 80%, and percentage of children under 18 years with family incomes below the Federal Poverty Level exceeding 19.9% for 2000. The department anticipates granting \$175,445 for FY12 to the agency submitting the successful application. An additional \$180,000 will be awarded each year from FY12 through FY16, contingent upon the availability of federal grant funding and ongoing grantee performance.

## HIV/AIDS Care/Ryan White

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, Public Health Services Act, sections 2611-23; AS 44.29.020; and 7 AAC 78.

**Description of Services:** The State of Alaska receives formula funding under Part B of the federal Ryan White HIV/AIDS Treatment Extension Act of 2009. The State uses these funds to provide grants to community agencies enhancing access to a comprehensive continuum of high quality, community-based care for low-income individuals and families living with HIV, including access to medications and purchase of health insurance. Services provided by funded agencies include: 1) medical case management; 2) purchase of high-priority outpatient medical/dental and supportive services, and 3) access to medication as well as health insurance for eligible individuals.

**Assessment of Need:** Many individuals and families living with HIV have limited financial and social resources for addressing medical and other needs associated with HIV. Nationally and in Alaska, services funded with Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program have proven vital in addressing these needs. Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program helps people living with HIV access medical care and services they cannot otherwise afford. Assistance provided by Ryan White funded agencies is consistent and of high quality.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** Service delivery area is statewide. State grantees are required by the federal funding agency to be entities with access to and a history of service to persons living with HIV.

Resources for HIV Care services are allocated roughly in proportion to the estimated distribution of potential services recipients, with consideration for the generally higher costs of providing or purchasing services in outlying areas. Resources for the HIV ADAP Program are allocated based upon the number of persons enrolled in the last year and an estimate of those needing services in the future. State grant award amounts are affected by the amount of federal funding awarded to Alaska annually.

## HIV/AIDS Prevention

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, Public Health Service Act, Section 201, 42 U.S.C. 241; 2010-2012 Alaska HIV Prevention Plan, AS 44.29.020.

**Description of Services:** Grants are awarded to carry out HIV prevention interventions. Services include one or more of the following interventions newly required by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC): 1) HIV testing; 2) prevention with positives; and 3) condom distribution. Funding up to \$350,000 for the required interventions will be available throughout the 3-year procurement period.

Services also to be provided are evidence-based behavioral and social marketing interventions recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). This funding will be used to continue currently funded interventions that would otherwise be discontinued due to drastic budget cuts from CDC. Funding up to \$120,000 for the recommended interventions will be available for the first year of the procurement only.

The previous procurement (2011-2013) cannot continue due to drastic budget cuts from the federal funding agency (CDC) and a re-focus on required HIV prevention activities to be conducted or funded by state health departments. The new procurement (2013-2015) reflects the federal funding cuts and the re-focus of services.

**Assessment of Need:** The HIV/STD Program, in conjunction with the HIV Prevention Planning Group, identified priority target populations based on epidemiological data. The interventions identified and required and the evidence-based behavioral and social marketing interventions recommended by CDC will be targeted to the priority populations identified in the epidemiological data and provided Statewide (with the majority of funding going to Anchorage as described below).

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Statewide

**Allocate Resources:** The HIV/STD Program is required to identify the geographic area(s) in Alaska with at least 30% of the HIV epidemic and ensure that funding and prevention resources will be allocated to those areas with the greatest burden of HIV disease. The majority of funding must go to Anchorage, the only area of the State to meet this criterion.

Medicare Rural Hospital Flexibility

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, 42 U.S.C. 1395i-4, SEC. 1820 Medicare Rural Hospital Flexibility Program; 44.29.020.

**Description of Services:** For the purpose of this grant, services will be provided by the Alaska State Nursing Home Association (ASHNHA) directly or through contractors. The grantee will provide a variety of deliverables including sponsoring and/or organizing training opportunities and performing oversight of surveys and other data/fact-gathering initiatives. The proposed services that the grantee may deliver include travel to rural hospital sites to assist hospital administrative staff with FLEX Program initiatives, coordinating and funding travel for the staffs of Critical Access Hospitals (CAH) and CAH-eligible hospitals to attend meetings, conferences, and seminars that further the goals of the FLEX Program.

**Assessment of Need:** The purpose of the program is to stabilize and strengthen small, rural hospitals and the health systems network. Nineteen of the smaller acute care hospitals serve most of the communities in rural Alaska with most being regional health care centers for many small, isolated communities inaccessible by road. The Alaska FLEX Program's work with rural initiatives ensures hospitals' timely access to information on resources and training.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** The services provided under this grant program will affect health care agencies, professionals, and clients statewide.

Non-Marital Pregnancy Prevention

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** The Division of Public Health, Section of Women's, Children's and Family Health seeks to establish partnerships with non-profit service providers, federally designated tribal entities in Alaska, or political subdivisions of the state to implement non-marital pregnancy prevention projects. The projects will be designed to educate providers and young men and women about the prevention of non-marital pregnancies using abstinence primary messages as appropriate. Grantees will work collaboratively with healthcare providers, health educators and at risk men and women. The target audience for this funding will be young women aged 15-29 years at risk of non-marital pregnancies living in regions of the state with high percentages or numbers of non-marital births (based on Bureau of Vital Statistics data), and their partners.

**Assessment of Need:** Non-marital pregnancy is associated with several critical social issues including poverty and income, overall child well-being, education and child welfare. In some rural Alaska communities, the percentage of non-marital births is extremely high. Applications will be accepted from organizations throughout Alaska.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Services will be provided by partner agencies working in regions of the state with high percentages of non-marital births.

**Allocate Resources:** The Department anticipates issuing \$100,000 to be divided between 2 partner agencies for FY 2015 with an additional \$100,000 for FY 2016, contingent upon the availability of funding and on-going grantee performance. The Department is seeking 2 grantees.

## Obesity Prevention and Control K-12

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** Through recommendations in the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) Make a Difference at Your School!, the Obesity Prevention and Control (OPC) K-12 Grant Program is intended to support high-quality physical education in schools, increase daily physical activity for students, and improve the school nutrition environment. Each grantee will work to provide comprehensive obesity prevention services in their school district.

**Assessment of Need:** Obesity is expected to overtake tobacco as the leading cause of death. It already surpasses tobacco in estimates of annual direct medical costs in Alaska (\$459 million vs. \$318 million). Alaska's obesity-related Medicaid costs will be \$684 million annually by 2030 if obesity rates continue as predicted. Childhood obesity rates tripled over the past four decades and today's youth are faced with chronic conditions previously not seen in children, including type 2 diabetes. In Alaska, 26% of high school students are overweight or obese. In the Anchorage School District, 36% of K-12th graders are overweight or obese. Comprehensive school-based obesity prevention strategies have shown promise in reducing the death, disability, and economic burden caused by childhood obesity.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Proposed service delivery is statewide.

**Allocate Resources:** OPC increased original awards from six (6) to seven (7) school districts for the four-year grant duration. Additional FY14 funding became available to support first an 8th, and now a 9th school district from among original FY14 applicants. DPH intends to fund the 8th and 9th grant projects for the duration of the grant procurement if funding remains available.

## Parent Navigation

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** Parent Navigation services are designed to provide support and assistance to families of newborns and young children with cleft lip/palate, hearing loss or deafness, or autism and other co-occurring neurodevelopmental disorders. Services support families from the initial screening at the hospital or birthing center or a health care provider office, through the diagnostic evaluation, to assisting with treatment and payment options, as well as providing information about early intervention and available short and long term resources. Parent Navigation services ensure that: 1) all children with special health care needs have medical homes; 2) families are involved as decision-makers and partners in their child's care; 3) families are satisfied with services received; and 4) the necessary linkages with other services and resources are facilitated as needed.

Parent navigators receive referrals of families who need support and care navigation from hospitals and health care providers at the time of birth and early infancy for children born with hearing loss or cleft lip/palate. Children with developmental concerns or delays or children with autistic related behaviors are referred in early childhood by community professionals, early intervention specialists and health care providers. Families are assisted with early intervention referrals, linkages with private therapists, transportation vendors. and assistance with payment options.

**Assessment of Need:** Parent Navigation enhances the quality of services provided to families and improves outcomes for children by ensuring earlier linkages with the many providers and resources necessary through the course of their treatment and ongoing care. Parent navigation differs from care coordination or case management as families are linked with trained parents who have experienced having children with similar conditions. Their role is to assist newly diagnosed families move to independence and feel competent and confident to care for their child and know the resources to turn to when they are in need. In addition, the parent navigator assures a firm and ongoing linkage to the child's medical home for ongoing assessment and communication to assure health care is optimized and outcomes are the best possible for the child. This program will assist the Parent Navigation program in meeting the 1/3/6 month national goals for hearing screening diagnosis and intervention as outlined by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and treatment for children with autism and other neurodevelopmental disorders. The availability of parent navigators also assists the State to meet Health Resources Services Administration (HRSA) and National Performance Measures established by the Maternal Child Health Bureau in organizing "community-based systems so that families can use them easily".

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** Services are available statewide through clinics held in Anchorage and Fairbanks for cleft lip/palate, and several communities around the state for autism screening. There are no formal clinics for hearing screening.

Program Navigation Program services Alaska families of children ages 0 to 21 years who experience a cleft lip and /or palate, hearing loss or deafness, or autism and other co-occurring neurodevelopmental disorders. Services are provided statewide based on referrals from an audiologist, a program manager, or birthing facilities.

## Peer Education to High Risk Youth - Promoting Health Among Teens

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, 7 AAC 78.050 and the federal Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2010 in the Office of Adolescent Health, Department of Health and Human Services, Office of the Secretary, Office of Assistant Secretary of Health.

**Description of Services:** The Division of Public Health, Section of Women's, Children's and Family Health seeks to establish partnerships with non-profit service providers/agencies, or federally recognized tribal entities in Alaska to implement peer education projects focused on teen pregnancy prevention using an abstinence primary curriculum. Peer educators in communities that experience high numbers or rates of teen births will implement the curriculum in settings that serve high risk youth, such as alternative schools, juvenile detention facilities, in-patient behavioral health facilities and so on. The projects will be designed to teach high risk youth about abstinence, pregnancy prevention, and STD/HIV prevention. The target audience for this funding will be high risk Alaska youth ages 14-19 living in communities with high rates or numbers of teen births.

**Assessment of Need:** Teen pregnancy risks include several adverse outcomes affecting both mother and infant. Compared to adult mothers, infants born to teen mothers have a low birth weight incidence 2 times higher and a neonatal mortality rate 3 times higher. Risk factors such as low maternal age and the lack of a high school diploma have been found to be associated with an increase in the death of infants more than 30 days of age in Alaska. In addition, maternal mortality rates are 2 times higher among teen mothers. Teen mothers are more likely to experience poor maternal weight gain, preterm birth, pregnancy induced hypertension, anemia, and sexually transmitted diseases. Teen pregnancy is also associated with several critical social issues including poverty and income, overall child well-being, education, child welfare and out-of-wedlock births. Alaska experiences rates of Chlamydia and Gonorrhea higher than any other state but one in the nation. High risk youth are at increased risk of contracting HIV, and rates among youth are growing in Alaska. Youth in detention centers, alternative schools and behavioral health facilities comprise this high risk group. In addition, an analysis of data from the 2009 Youth Risk Behavior survey indicated 82% of alternative school students reported every having sexual intercourse and 64% had not used a condom during the last intercourse. In 2009, the birth rate for women ages 15-19 years in Alaska was 41.2 per 1,000 (Alaska BVS). In certain areas of the state the rates of teen births are extremely high, reaching 105.9 per 1,000 in Wade Hampton in 2009.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Services will be provided by four partner agencies working in communities with high rates and numbers of teen births in Alaska.

**Allocate Resources:** The Department anticipates issuing an award of seventy five thousand dollars (\$75,000) to each partner agency for FY 2012; with an additional \$50,000 for FY 2013-FY 2015, contingent upon the availability of federal grant funding and on-going grantee performance.

## Primary Prevention of Sexual Violence

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** The grant will provide for the delivery of statewide sexual violence primary prevention activities aligned with the statewide strategic plan under the federal Rape Prevention and Education program. Specifically, this grant will provide supplemental resources to increasing youth leadership opportunities through the LeadOn program, support of the multi-media campaign, Stand Up, Speak Up, training school personnel for the 4th R curriculum, and Coaching Boys to Men to Choose Respect programs.

**Assessment of Need:** Alaska has one of the highest rates of sexual violence in the nation, with 37.1% of Alaskan women reporting some level of sexual victimization in their lifetime in a 2010 survey conducted by the University of Alaska Anchorage Justice Center. Sexual violence can impact health in many ways, including serious and long-term health problems. These include chronic pain, headaches, stomach problems, and sexually transmitted diseases. Sexual violence can also impact emotional health, leaving victims fearful and anxious. The anger and stress that victims feel may lead to eating disorders, depression and suicide ideation.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is working to build a cadre of evidence-based practices that prevent sexual violence from ever occurring. Some examples that have proven to be effective include engaging high school students in skill-based activities that address healthy sexuality and dating relationships, helping parents to identify and address violent attitudes and behaviors in their children, creating policies at work, in schools and throughout communities that promote healthy gender roles and relationships, and using mass media messages to promote norms and shared beliefs about healthy sexual relationships. Alaska's strategic plan, adopted in June 2009, incorporates our best knowledge of the extent of the problem, as well as builds on the best evidence to date on how to address sexual violence. The program's focus is on primary prevention.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** The service delivery for this grant is statewide, with services provided through media, the Internet, print, and centralized training venues.

**Allocate Resources:** Funds will be used in conjunction with other state, federal and non-governmental sources to implement the projects.

## Public Health Nursing

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** The Municipality of Anchorage, North Slope Borough, and Maniilaq Association receive grants from the Division of Public Health, Section of Public Health Nursing. Grant funds are intended to provide partial funding for public health nursing staff and delivery of core public health services to all area residents. Public health nurses are expected to provide population and systems based health promotion and disease prevention services to communities and regions, and direct clinical preventive services to individuals and families. Services include prevention and control of infectious and non-infectious diseases through immunizations, screening, testing, treatment, contact investigation, education and outreach; public health emergency preparedness and response activities; outreach to families and children at medical and social risk; referral and linking of individuals and families with needed services; and direct provision of health services when they are otherwise unavailable. Public health nursing services should include and incorporate public health leadership through community assessment, advocacy and systems development activities designed to help communities identify and resolve health problems and participation in community partnerships to address issues of public health concern.

Federal funding from Section of Epidemiology for tuberculosis program staff and services are included in the grant to the Municipality of Anchorage. In prior years, the Municipality also received funding from Section of Epidemiology for Immunization program staff and services. Due to reduced funding from the Federal grant agency, effective FY 2012 Immunization services will no longer be funded under the Municipality of Anchorage Public Health Nursing grant.

In prior years, Norton Sound Health Corporation provided Public Health Nursing services to residents of the Bering Strait region. As stated in the attached letter from the President of Norton Sound Health Corporation, the agency has withdrawn from the Public Health Nursing grant program and the State will provide these services effective July 1, 2011.

**Assessment of Need:** Currently we do not have state-run public health centers in the proposed service delivery areas. The Municipality of Anchorage, North Slope Borough, and Maniilaq Association, are the only organized governing bodies vested with health powers that serve each of these geographical areas. Grants with these three governing bodies are deemed the most effective and appropriate means of providing area-wide public health nursing services. A disruption in the delivery of these services would place residents at increased risk of infectious disease and would reduce preventive health services available to high-risk/medically underserved women and young children.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** The Municipality of Anchorage proposed service delivery area includes the Municipality of Anchorage and the Girdwood, Eagle River, and Chugiak communities. The North Slope Borough proposed service delivery area includes the community of Barrow and the villages of Atkasuk, Kaktovik, Nuiqsut, Point Lay, and Wainwright. The Maniilaq Association proposed service delivery area includes populations of the City of Kotzebue, and the villages of Ambler, Buckland, Deering, Kiana, Kivalina, Kobuk, Noatak, Noorvik, Selawick, Point Hope, and Shungnak.

Funding level for each grant is based on population served, need, and funds available.

## Public Health Preparedness and Response for Bioterrorism

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 44.29.020; PHS 309(A) 317 (K)(1)(2) 319, 42 USD 241(A); 42 USC 247d-3a

**Description of Services:** Organizations receiving grants under this program will increase preparedness for and response to public health, emergencies and disasters and participate in the development of a statewide assessment of needs, development of coordinated emergency plans, and implementation of the 15 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) target capabilities. The 15 target capabilities are Community Preparedness, Community Recovery, Emergency Operations Coordination, Emergency Public Information and Warning, Fatality Management, Information Sharing, Mass Care, Medical Countermeasure Dispensing, Medical Material Management and Distribution, Medical Surge, Non-Pharmaceutical Interventions, Public Health Laboratory Testing, Public Health Surveillance, and Epidemiological Investigation, Responder Safety and Health and Volunteer Management. Through a federal grant from the CDC, two grants will be awarded to support the implementation of the 15 CDC target capabilities for Alaska Native healthcare facilities and communities and the local health department, recognized by the Citizens Readiness Initiatives, Metropolitan Service Area.

**Assessment of Need:** The threat of a public health emergency or disaster involving natural and technological hazards - including the events of September 11, 2001, Hurricane Katrina 2006, Eagle flooding 2009, H1N1 pandemic 2009/2010, and the 2011 Japan earthquake/tsunami and nuclear meltdown, have put extraordinary pressures on the public health system to be ready to respond to a large scale emergency. The impact of a potential catastrophic event on individuals and communities can be minimized by a coordinated emergency response plan and the development of the 15 CDC target capabilities. Alaska's ability to actively respond to a pandemic or natural disaster and rapidly communicate with other partnering agencies involved in the response efforts is imperative.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** Target groups for this grant program are Alaska Native healthcare facilities and the people they serve and the population within and surround the Municipality of Anchorage.

Grantees under this program work in collaboration with the Department of Health and Social Services Public Health Preparedness Program to achieve statewide preparedness goals.

## Rural Veterans Health Access Program Tele-Health Pilot Project

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, SSA, P.L. 112-74 section 1820 (g) (6)

**Description of Services:** The Division of Public Health, Section of Health Planning & Systems Development's Rural Veterans' Health Access Program Tele-Health Pilot Project (RVHAP) establishes a multi-site pilot tele-health network and improves existing networks of Community Health Centers (CHCs), Community Mental Health Centers (CMHCs) and Critical Access Hospitals (CAHs) for rural veteran care coordination between providers and the Alaska Veterans' Affairs Healthcare System & Regional Office (AVA). Per funding, RVHAP cannot duplicate current collaborative between Alaska Tribal Health Systems and the AVA. RVHAP funds non-tribal CHCs, Federally Qualified HCs, CMHCs, and CAHs.

**Assessment of Need:** Alaska has the most veterans per capita of any US state. Many Alaska veterans live in rural and remote communities and have significant need, but limited access, to health care and behavioral health services from the Veterans Administration (VA). Tele-health and tele-behavioral health is an effective and possibly cost-effective means to increase access and quality of care to veterans and other rural residents.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** Three RVHAP pilot sites will serve a total of eight communities. Alaska Island Community Services (AICS); Juneau Alliance for Mental Health, Inc. (JAMHI); and Sitka Community Hospital/Mountainside Family Healthcare (SCH) combined will serve: Wrangell, Naukati, Coffman Cove, Gustavus, Juneau, Elfin Cove, Tenakee Springs, and Sitka.

AICS, JAMHI, and SCH were selected by one or more of: CHC/CMHC tele-health gap analysis, provision of VA back up services, and specialized traumatic brain injury (TBI) care, while not duplicating Alaska Tribal Health Systems and VA collaboration.

**Tobacco Prevention and Control (Community Based Grants)**

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 44.29.020; AS 47.05.010

**Description of Services:** Through recommendations in the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) Best Practices for Comprehensive Tobacco Control Programs the Tobacco Prevention and Control (TPC) Community Grant Program is intended to: prevent initiation of tobacco use among youth, eliminate exposure to secondhand smoke, promote tobacco cessation among youth and adults, and identify and eliminate tobacco-related disparities. Each grantee will work to provide comprehensive services in their region and collaborate with other TPC funded agencies or partners.

**Assessment of Need:** Comprehensive TPCs in communities across the state are a proven effective means to reduce the death, disability, and economic burden caused by tobacco use.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Proposed service delivery is statewide. TPC anticipates funding approximately three (3) grantees per Public Health Labor Market Region and two (2) statewide grantees, for a total of 20 grantees. Funding preference will be given to agencies that serve geographically

## Youth Pregnancy and Violence Prevention

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** The Division of Public Health, Section of Women's, Children's and Family Health seeks to establish a partnership with a youth-serving organization in Alaska to administer community empowerment mini grants. The partner will administer no more than 10 mini grants to youth groups in Alaska. The mini grant projects will be designed to strengthen and increase positive experiences that prevent teen pregnancies, promote healthy relationships, and empower young Alaskans to develop into healthy, respectful, caring, and responsible citizens. The partner will issue a request for proposals for no more than 10 youth groups to apply for funds to initiate prevention projects in their community. Partners do not need to indicate what programs will be used by prospective grantees, but must only accept proposals from those who are committed to evaluating their success. Projects will be centered on the themes of intimate partner violence prevention and/or pregnancy prevention. Youth group activities will be conducted by youth, with the assistance of an adult. The partner will oversee distribution of the mini grants and reporting and evaluation requirements from the youth groups. The partner will submit an end of the year report to DHSS.

**Assessment of Need:** The teen birth rate in Alaska was 41.2 births per 1,000 teens aged 15-19 years in 2009. Teen pregnancy risks include several adverse outcomes affecting both mother and infant. Teen pregnancy is associated with several critical social issues including poverty and income, overall child well-being, education, child welfare and out-of-wedlock births. In addition, teens who have been victims of child abuse or intimate partner violence are more likely to have an unintended pregnancy and to engage in sexual risk behaviors. In Alaska in 2009, 13.3% of high school teens reported being hit, slapped, or physically hurt on purpose by their boyfriend or girlfriend in the past 12 months.

The partner organization must choose grantees who work in regions that have a high incidence of early sexual onset, high rates of teen births or high rates of intimate partner violence as demonstrated by data and/or knowledge of community and population behaviors.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Rural Alaska

**Allocate Resources:** Services will be provided by one partner agency administering no more than 10 mini grants of \$1,000 or more each to youth groups in rural Alaska. Up to \$2,000 may be used toward the cost of administering the mini grants.

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.05.010 (17) Duties of the Department; AS 47.65 Service Programs for Older Alaskans and Other Adults; 7 AAC 130.200-319 Medicaid Home and Community Based Waiver Services

**Description of Services:** Adult Day services (ADS) provide an organized program of services during the day in a facility-based group setting, including supervision and a secure environment for individuals who experience Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders (ADRD), physical, emotional and/or other cognitive impairments. Services incorporate person-centered planning approaches in response to an evaluation of the person's functional health, social needs and interests. ADS programs are non-residential and occur during part of a day but less than 24 hours per day.

**Assessment of Need:** ADS provides supervised care during the day to eligible individuals at risk for institutionalization. Services provide therapeutic activities and supports that maintain or increase optimal mental and physical functioning. Additionally, services provide respite to caregivers to support continuing care at home, forestalling or avoiding the need for institutionalization. Expansion of Adult Day services is needed to meet the needs of the increasing number of seniors with ADRD.

**Service Delivery Area** Statewide

**and Method Used to**

**Allocate Resources:** \$100,000 is added to the funding in FY13 for development or expansion of Adult Day Services with the expectation that service delivery will begin in FY14. In FY14, Adult Day funds are allocated to all eligible Adult Day Programs based upon the Adult Day funding formula; to be solicited through a Non Competitive Request for Proposals. The Adult Day Services grant award methodology is two-fold, taking into account the basic costs of operation and performance. Approximately 50% of the available funding will be used to award each successful applicant a base grant. The remainder of funds will be awarded using a formula that includes past measures of grant service delivery and the applicant's history of providing Medicaid reimbursable services.

- Description of Services:**
1. Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRC) grantees serve the public as an unbiased resource for information and assistance related to Long Term Services and Supports (LTSS). Target populations are seniors, and people with disabilities and their caregivers and families. Core functions include: information, referral and assistance; Options Counseling; streamlined benefits screening; and person-centered transition support; as well as outreach and training to the community at large.
  2. Medicare Counseling and Outreach (MCO) grantees provide coordination of Medicare outreach, counseling, and referral, and data-entry activities consistent with the State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) and Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP) grant goals and performance measures. Work is performed both on-site and/or over the phone, and outreach is provided throughout the community at numerous locations and events.

**Assessment of Need:** With a growing senior population and rising costs for long term support services, the need for easily accessible, unbiased information, as well as expertise concerning available options and supported decision making, is an increasingly essential service to Alaskan individuals and families. This includes information concerning Medicare benefits provided to 72,000 Medicare beneficiaries and their caregivers and families in Alaska.

- Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:**
1. The five ADRCs serve Anchorage; Kenai/Valdez/Cordova; Southeast Alaska; Bristol Bay/Kodiak and Matanuska-Susitna Borough areas.
  2. MCO services are funded in: Anchorage, Fairbanks and the Kenai Peninsula, and Southeast Alaska.
  3. Per the Alaska ADRC Statewide Plan SFY 2012-15, the funding methodology for the ADRCs uses a base operations rate per region, plus a population based rate adjusted to available funding.
  4. MCO funding is allocated to maintain or increase availability of support in highly populated areas of the state. The plan for expanded outreach is prioritized using Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services National Performance Reporting data with new funding available to add MCO services to beneficiaries in Southeast Alaska in FY15.

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.80 Persons with Disabilities

**Description of Services:** This grant will be awarded to a single oversight agency to administer the funds for the AMHTA Developmental Disabilities Mini-Grant Program.

The Mini-Grants are one-time awards not to exceed \$2,500 per recipient for basic living needs not covered by other grants or funding sources. Services and supplies purchased through Mini-Grants are designed to help beneficiaries attain and maintain healthy and productive lifestyles. The kinds of supplies or services the Mental Health Trust considers appropriate for Mini-Grants include, but are not limited to, therapeutic devices, access to medical, dental and vision care, or special health care needs. Assistance with basic living needs necessary to avert a crisis that is not covered by another funding source is also allowable, e.g. medical transportation, heating oil, and winter clothing. Mini-Grant applications for services or equipment that are covered by other public benefits, a person's private insurance, Medicaid, or Indian Health Services are not approved.

**Assessment of Need:** Mini-Grants are available to individuals determined eligible for Developmental Services per AS 47.80.900(6) or currently enrolled in the Early Intervention/Infant Learning Program. Applications may be submitted through Developmental Disabilities agencies, Short-Term Assistance and Referral (STAR) Programs or Infant Learning Program. The Mini-Grants objectives are essentially the provision of medical, dental, vision, hearing, therapeutic devices and services and environmental modification not otherwise available. A statewide agency is needed to oversee the evaluation and award process of these grants to avoid any potential conflict of interest resulting from the regional direct service providers determining awards to the clients they serve.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Statewide

**Allocate Resources:** Funding for Mini-Grants will be awarded to a single oversight agency who will receive consumer applications from the STAR Programs, Infant Learning Programs and Developmental Disabilities grantee agencies. These entities will be the link between the individuals and the Mini-Grants oversight agency.

**Description of Services:** Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders (ADRD) Education and Support provides statewide education and support services to people with Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders including Vascular Dementia, Parkinson's disease, Pick's disease, Huntington's disease, Lewy Bodies, HIV and alcohol related dementia and others. Services help families and caregivers to maintain the ADRD client at home, forestalling or preventing institutionalization. The scope of work includes education and dissemination of information about ADRD to the general public, healthcare professionals, professional caregivers, agencies and organizations to increase awareness of ADRD and link caregivers and agencies with resources available in their area to continue caring for the individual with ADRD in their home and community.

**Assessment of Need:** People with dementia live an average of eight years and it is estimated that 7 out of 10 people with ADRD live at home. Alzheimer's afflicts 1 in 8 persons over 65 and nearly half of all people over 85, and it is estimated that by 2025 Alaska will have approximately 9000 individuals diagnosed with Alzheimer's Disease.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Statewide

**Allocate Resources:** The grantee will maintain staff and offices in Anchorage, Fairbanks, Mat-Su, and Juneau and with the increment adopted by the 2013 Legislature, services will be expanded, targeting rural and underserved areas statewide.

**Description of Services:** As required by AS 47.80.100, the Department must, within the limits of appropriation, implement a comprehensive system of services and facilities dispersed throughout the state. The services required under this statute are specialized and directed towards addressing minimal habilitation and crises needs of people with developmental disabilities (DD) who display high risk behaviors. This program addresses the severe statewide shortage of qualified direct care staff and professionals with critical expertise necessary to deliver services to people with DD.

**Assessment of Need:** Statewide services are targeted for individuals with developmental disabilities who display high risk or inappropriate behaviors and are at risk of institutionalization in corrections facilities, as well as individuals who, because of their disability, are more vulnerable to abuse. Training or support provided by this program must be accessible to direct service staff, school paraprofessionals, family members of people with disabilities, and other interested students in their home communities.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Statewide

**Allocate Resources:** Funds are allocated to provide services through a single provider with specialized expertise and capability.

## Community Developmental Disabilities

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.80 Persons with Disabilities

**Description of Services:** The Community Developmental Disabilities Grant (CDDG) program provides funding for services to and enhance the quality of life for consumers impacted by developmental disabilities. The CDD grants address the needs of individuals with developmental disabilities (DD) for "habilitation" which is the acquisition and maintenance of skills to live with independence and improved capacity, and to minimize institutionalization and provide care in the local community.

The needs of individuals receiving services through the CDDG are assessed and a plan of care is developed and reviewed annually. Each individual plan of care varies depending upon the person's employment, respite care, care coordination, day habilitation, case management, and Core services. Successful applicants receiving CDD grants must assure that individuals have a choice when selecting from an array of service providers dispersed throughout the state and their community.

Community DD Providers link individuals to services that will assist them until they are enrolled in more comprehensive services under grant funds or a Home and Community Based Waiver. These grants assist with purchasing units of services earmarked for eligible individuals waiting for comprehensive services.

**Assessment of Need:** Under AS 47.80.100 the Department provides people with developmental disabilities specialized services directed towards their social personal, physical, or economic habilitation. Applying a national prevalence factor (1.8%) for the occurrence of developmental disability to the Alaskan population, it is estimated that there are 12,000 to 13,000 Alaskans with developmental disabilities. Only about 3,547 people receive services funded by a CDD grant or Medicaid Waiver. Currently, there is a registration of 851 people awaiting selection for a Medicaid Waiver or who do not meet the criteria for Medicaid waivers and are in need of various CDD direct services.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Statewide

**Allocate Resources:** Methodology is relative to the target population. Resources will be distributed based on the population of the census area and the number of current and potential consumers, applying the national prevalence factor (1.8%).

CDD grants support programs and direct services that assure individuals have a choice when selecting from an array of service providers dispersed throughout the state and their community. The specialized nature of CDD services and the needs of the population require access to a level of expertise not commonly available to the general population. This expertise and ability to respond is limited to organizations that can deliver services in the home community of the recipient. As a result, CDD services are available across the state.

Resources will be distributed based upon a census of current recipients of services per CDD Applicant Agency. Annually, this census is reconciled with each provider and funds are allocated upon the necessary capacity to sustain services to eligible individuals and to provide for the target populations.

**Description of Services:** The Deaf Navigator Program will provide a range of resources and services designed to improve long-term employment and housing outcomes to Alaskans who are deaf or hard of hearing. The Program will provide assistance navigating and accessing available resources, coordinate siloed services systems for individuals with multiple disabilities, provide training to employers and service providers on deaf culture values, coordinate with the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation to maximize employment supports, and assist individuals who are deaf and hard of hearing in accessing and maintaining appropriate and affordable housing.

**Assessment of Need:** Rates of homelessness, unemployment and incarceration of individuals who are deaf and hard of hearing have increased over the last 6 years due to the elimination of the Anchorage Deaf and Hard of Hearing Center. Deaf individuals report increasing difficulty accessing available resources, finding and maintaining employment and housing due to lack of understanding of complex systems and communication barriers. Assistance with communication and coordinated service system supports can help ensure positive long term outcomes.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Statewide

**Allocate Resources:** Funding is allocated to support one position with services made accessible to eligible individuals statewide.

Alaska has an increasing population of adults aged 60 and older. Most older adults have at least one chronic condition and many have multiple conditions. Adults over age 60 are increasingly likely to fall, which can result in loss of independence and entry into institutional care. Prevention activities, including self-management of chronic conditions, falls prevention, physical activity, and medication education have been proven to improve emotional and physical health, wellbeing, and to sustain ability to carry out activities of daily living and instrumental activities of daily living, so the person is able to remain at home.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Statewide

**Allocate Resources:** Resources will be allocated to support existing evidence based Health Promotion/Disease Prevention programs (i.e. Falls Prevention and/or Chronic Disease Self Management) that demonstrate successful outcomes for participants. In addition to supporting existing programs, resources may be used to initiate new evidence based or other programs aimed at reducing the risk of disease, disability, and injury among older adults. A 10% match is required.

**National Family Caregiver Support**

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.05.010 (16) and (17) Duties of the Department; AS 47.65 Service Programs for Older Alaskans and Other Adults; Title III of the Older Americans Act.

**Description of Services:** The National Family Caregiver Support Program (NFCSP) provides support to unpaid caregivers of individuals age 60 or older, persons with Alzheimer's disease or related disorders (regardless of age); and grandparents, age 55 or older, raising children no older than age 18 to eligible applicants to provide caregiver support services that include assistance with accessing long term care services, training and education to help caregivers address problems and make decisions, respite for temporary relief, and supplemental goods and services to help continue providing care.

**Assessment of Need:** Informal, unpaid family caregivers provide the majority of home and community-based long-term care services. Research from the last decade shows that 61% of frail older adults receive assistance from family caregivers and in 2009 the cost of this informal care was estimated at \$450 billion. Research shows that when caregivers are supported in their roles, they may be able to provide better care for longer periods of time, which as a whole, benefits the individual, family, and society.

**Allocate Resources:** 1) 10% of the total available funding will be available to provide support statewide to grandparents raising grandchildren; 2) Approximately 5% of funding will be available to provide legal services to caregivers; and 3) The remainder of the funds will be distributed statewide based upon the funding formula approved in the Alaska State Plan for Senior Services.

Nursing Facility Transition Program

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, Americans with Disabilities Act; Olmstead Decision; New Freedom Initiative

**Description of Services:** This program allows people with disabilities or the elderly to live in the least restrictive setting possible, and integrate into, and participate in their community. Up to two grants will be sought to provide planning and procurement of individualized services for two target populations that include clients under age 60 and clients over age 60 in need of transition services. Grantees will assess the individual's needs and arrange and pay for appropriate transition services or supports to be provided, which have been approved by the Transition Program Coordinator. Services and supports are as diverse as security deposits for housing, groceries, trial visits to assisted living homes, or transportation from the nursing facility to the community setting.

**Assessment of Need:** The transition of persons from nursing facilities into the community is delayed by the length of time necessary for state warrants to be issued to pay for transition services or supports, prior to admission to the Medicaid Home & Community Based Waiver program. The transition of a person from nursing home care to waiver services results in a major savings for the Medicaid programs.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Funds for services may be allocated for up to two grants to ensure available services statewide.

**Allocate Resources:**

In order to qualify as a Nursing Facility Transition grantee, applicants must demonstrate the ability to represent eligible clients statewide and coordinate services through cooperative agreements where necessary. A preference will be included in the procurement evaluation for proposals that limit administrative costs, in order to maximize the use of the available funds for direct services. Also, to maximize the benefit of the available resources, eligibility will be limited to agencies with existing infrastructure already providing services to seniors and the disabled.

**The Nutrition, Transportation and Support Services and Nutrition Services Incentive Provider Agreement for Senior Meals through Schools** A Provider Agreement for reimbursement per senior meal, piloted with the Lower Kuskokwim School District, which has been determined to be a successful strategy for meeting the nutritional needs of seniors in rural and remote areas of the state and will be replicated where applicable.

Protection and Advocacy

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, Public Law 106-402 Americans with Disabilities Act; AS 47.80 Persons with Disabilities

**Description of Services:** The Protection of Rights & Investigation of Abuse Program provides people with developmental disabilities (DD) and their families training and assistance in methods to resolve grievances they may have with providers of community developmental disability services. Services funded by the program range from information and referral, negotiation and mediation, various interventions in line with administrative recourse and, as a last resort, legal consultation and remedies. Under the Federal DD Act, the state must have a system of protection and advocacy that has the capacity to provide administrative and legal remedies to civil rights concerns for people with developmental disabilities. The program exists to assist eligible individuals, sometimes through their families and guardians, to engage in their own advocacy. In collaboration with the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services, this grant has been used to emphasize training to recipients in such areas as special education, social security and the Americans with Disabilities Act.

**Assessment of Need:** In 1975, the US Congress mandated the creation of Protection and Advocacy agencies in every state. This designation gives the grantee agency unique authority under Federal law to enforce both state and federal laws concerning the rights and benefits for individuals with disabilities. Further, the agency must be independent of any service-providing agencies.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** These funds are provided statewide for assistance and training.

**Allocate Resources:** The grantee agency will provide the Department with an immediate state response to complaints of abuse and neglect by persons meeting the definition of being developmentally disabled as described in AS 47.80.900.

**Senior In-Home Services**

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.05.010 (17) Duties of the Department; AS 47.65 Service Programs for Older Alaskans and Other Adults.

**Description of Services:** Senior In-Home Services provide care coordination and in-home services to eligible seniors who do not qualify for Medicaid Waiver services and need assistance with activities of daily living. The goal of the program is to support Alaskan seniors so that they may remain in their homes and communities for as long as possible, thereby forestalling or eliminating more costly institutional care. Services include Care Coordination, Chore, Respite, Extended Respite and Supplemental Services (up to \$500 per household per year) for items or services that support the “low-income” senior in avoiding a crisis that would jeopardize their ability to remain independently in their home.

**Assessment of Need:** These services offer a safety net for low income seniors who do not meet the level of care for the HCB Medicaid Waiver program especially those with Alzheimer’s Disease and related disorders. By providing care coordination and in-home assistance, the SIH program is able to extend the time an individual can live independently in their own home and communities, reducing need for costly institutional care. This continues to be very important as Alaska’s senior population is now the fastest growing per capita in the U.S.

**Service Delivery Area** Statewide

**and Method Used to**

**Allocate Resources:** Programs are funded using the FY 12-15 regional funding formula in the State Plan for Senior Services. The target population for services are individuals of any age with Alzheimer's Disease or related disorders and individuals age 60 and over with a disability who need assistance with activities of daily living or instrumental activities of daily living. The priority for services is to individuals who are: 1) of any age with ADRD, 2) at risk for institutionalization; 3) of the greatest social and economic need; 4) Alaska Native; 5) residing in an isolated rural area. Services are provided on a sliding fee scale and no one is turned away due the inability to pay. Depending upon funding and staffing resources, waiting lists for services are maintained following the priority for services.

## Senior Residential Services

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.65 Service Programs for Older Alaskans; AS 47.33 and 7 AAC 75 Assisted Living Homes

**Description of Services: SRS:** The Senior Residential Services (SRS) grant provides essential grant funds to rural remote providers for supported residential living services to frail elders who do not have access to Pioneer Homes or other Long Term Care facilities in their community or region. Residents receive individual support in a residential setting for assistance with Activities of Daily Living; personal care, and Instrumental Activities of Daily Living; meal preparations. The SRS grant provides consistent funding to support providers in sustaining the operation of the services and off-set the significant costs to provide services in rural remote communities. The SRS grantees also provide support to elders living in the community or region who may stay short term until their overall health improves and they can return home.

**SRS Planning:** A portion of the SRS funds are made available to plan for development of new Senior Residential Services programs through Supported Housing, or an Assisted Living Home (ALH) in communities and/or regions currently without these services that meet the goals and objectives of the SRS Program. Planning funds may be utilized to fund a Program Manager, hire a consultant or contractor, conduct a needs assessment, market analysis, site preparation, architectural and/or structural drawings, or other planning activities approved in the proposal. Eligible projects considered for funding include: 1) Current projects funded through State Capital Funds for Senior Supported Housing or Assisted Living Homes; 2) An existing housing unit or facility to be converted to Senior Supported Housing or Assisted Living Homes; or 3) Development of a new Senior Supported Housing or Assisted Living Home or Senior Supported Housing project.

**Assessment of Need: SRS:** Senior Residential Services allows frail elders in rural areas to continue living in or near their home communities and avoid the need to leave their families, culture and familiar surroundings for institutionalization in large urban settings.

**SRS Planning:** Due to the closure of Maniilaq Association's assisted living facility in FY12, the SRS grant program has an additional \$257,200 after awarding grants to two new grantees. At this time only three eligible centers exist in the state and plans for additional ALH's in rural/remote Alaska are unknown. However, there is not an ALH in each region. SRS planning grants will require proposed projects to identify the level of need.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** Senior Residential Services are targeted to Rural/Remote Alaska; with planning grant funds directed to areas where a Pioneer Home or an equivalent Assisted Living Home or Supported Housing project does not exist. Once planning grants have ended, successful planning grant recipients may become eligible to apply for small operating grants from the SRS program.

Funding for this program was set aside in the Senior Residential Services component. These funds were established through an appropriation from the Legislature through DHSS. SRS funds are available through rural remote senior service providers for seniors 60 and over who are unable to live alone, but who can maintain themselves in a supervised setting with minimal assistance.

The STAR program serves as the entry point for families into a state-funded developmental disability service system and provides assistance, as needed, in identifying the needs of the individual, completing DD and Medicaid applications, and referral to other applicable community-based and natural supports. Each STAR program has staff dedicated to helping families or individuals who need assistance accessing services including short-term emergency assistance.

**Assessment of Need:** The STAR program is designed as a safety net to assist eligible individuals and their families with accessing community based supports in a timely manner.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** Program services are delivered statewide.

**Allocate Resources:** Up to 12 STAR programs may be funded.

**Student Living Center Services for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing**

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.70 Persons with Disabilities

**Description of Services:** The program provides residential services and daily support to students from outside the Anchorage area while they are attending the Alaska State School for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (ASSDHH), within two licensed board and care homes and one foster care placement home. Individuals participate in life skills training, community activities and after school sports or clubs. Services are provided 24 hours a day, seven days a week during the academic year. During the Summer, when students do not occupy the living center, the residences may be used as temporary housing for families of developmentally disabled children who are in Anchorage for medical treatment or evaluation.

**Assessment of Need:** The Student Living Center (SLC) provides residential services and daily support to students from rural areas of Alaska while they are attending ASSDHH. The program also provides residential services to students from Anchorage, as space permits, with priority given to rural students outside of Anchorage's school district. A Division of Senior and Disabilities Services representative must refer the child to the center in order for the child to become a member of the SLC family. The services are provided 24 hours a day, seven days a week during the academic year.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** The Center in Anchorage serves students from all of Alaska.

**Allocate Resources:** Funding is provided to the Department of Health and Social Services via a Reimbursable Services Agreement with the Alaska Department of Education and Early Development.

## Traumatic and Acquired Brain Injury

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, 7 AAC 78 Grant Programs, and AS 47.80.500 Statewide Traumatic or Acquired Brain Injury Program.

**Description of Services:** In an effort to coordinate services and prevent duplication, SDS will combine its Traumatic and Acquired Brain Injury (TABI) service components under one comprehensive TABI Grant Program. The TABI Grant Program, administered by the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services, currently includes Case Management and Mini-Grant services and will expand to include Resource Navigation and Tribal Liaison services to increase access and improve outcomes for eligible individuals. Case management supports individuals living with brain injury to utilize a comprehensive array of services including medical, rehabilitative, social, educational, vocational, in-home and other needed services to improve quality of life and maintain independence. TABI Mini-Grants are intended to quickly respond to the needs of individuals to access services not covered by Medicaid, including medical, dental, behavioral training, and to purchase adaptive equipment and other items to implement compensatory strategies for cognitive disabilities. Resource Navigation provides brain-injury-specific information, referral, contact assistance, and follow up services to individuals who experience traumatic and acquired brain injury and their family members, including working with hospital discharge planners to connect patients with service providers upon discharge. The Navigator will serve the entire state of Alaska by maintaining an up-to-date database of services and providers located around the state and by connecting people affected by brain injury with available resources. Tribal Liaison services will link Alaska Natives to services both in Anchorage and in home communities, and will connect providers in outlying communities to TABI-specific trainings to build capacity for addressing TABI needs in rural settings. The Tribal Liaison will work with Alaska Native Medical Center staff on improving discharge planning, especially to rural communities, as well as improving the availability of training for providers in those communities.

**Assessment of Need:** The DHSS Trauma Registry reports that approximately 2,500 new TBI survivors, 640 whom are seriously injured, join an estimated 10,000 to 12,000 Alaskans currently living with brain injury every year. While the all-Alaska TABI rate is 90 per 100,000 people, the occurrence rate for Alaska Natives is 174 per 100,000, and in Northwest Alaska, the TABI rate is 4.5 times that of all-Alaska. Most people with TABI leaving acute care settings are discharged to home, where they piece together the limited supports available. Individuals who have experienced a brain injury have difficulty gaining access to health care providers who are trained in helping people with TABI. Resource Navigation, Case Management, Mini-Grant and Tribal Health Liaison services provide a direct link between individuals with TABI and professionals and paraprofessionals who provide assistance so they can maintain independence in their homes and communities.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** Case Management services are provided in Fairbanks and Anchorage. Additional funding in FY15 will be used to expand case management in rural areas, primarily into the Northwest Alaska region. All other TABI programs, including Resource Navigator and Tribal Liaison and TABI Mini-Grants serve persons statewide.

Case Management funds are specifically allocated to serve Anchorage and Fairbanks and for expansion into rural Alaska by Legislative appropriation.

The TABI Mini-Grant program may serve those individuals statewide with a diagnosis of an acquired or traumatic brain injury.

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs,

AS 47.80.500. Statewide Traumatic and Acquired Brain Injury Program

**Description of Services:** Case management supports individuals living with brain injury to utilize a comprehensive array of services including medical, rehabilitative, social, educational, vocational, in-home and other needed services to improve quality of life and maintain independence.

**Assessment of Need:** The Department of Health and Social Services Trauma Registry reports that approximately 2,500 new Traumatic Brain Injury survivors, 640 whom are seriously injured, join an estimated 10,000 to 12,000 Alaskans currently living with brain injury every year. Since Medicaid provides extremely limited options for sub-acute treatment and rehabilitation services for this population and no Targeted Case Management under Medicaid is available, this grant-funded option is a critical service.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to Allocate Resources:** Currently, services are provided in Fairbanks and Anchorage. Additional funding in FY14 will be used to expand case management in rural areas, primarily into the Northwest Alaska region.

Funds are allocated to serve Anchorage and Fairbanks and for expansion into rural Alaska by Legislative appropriation.

**Traumatic and Acquired Brain Injury Mini-Grants**

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.80.500. Statewide traumatic or acquired brain injury program.

**Description of Services:** The Traumatic and Acquired Brain Injury (TABI) Mini Grant Program is intended to quickly respond to the needs of individuals with TABI who are receiving state-funded case management services. Mini-grants allow the individual to access medical, dental and behavioral training services needed to diagnose and treat TABI and associated conditions, if not covered by Medicaid, and to purchase adaptive equipment and other items needed to implement compensatory strategies for cognitive disabilities.

**Assessment of Need:** Every year, the Department of Health and Social Services Trauma Registry reports about 800 traumatic brain injury cases resulting in hospitalization or death. Besides the 640 seriously injured Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) patients that survive their injuries and are discharged from Alaskan hospitals each year, an estimated three times as many suffer a mild TBI. This adds up to upwards of 2,500 new TBI survivors in Alaska each year, joining the estimated 10,000 to 12,000 Alaskans living with brain injury. The TABI Mini-Grant Program will continue to serve individuals who have unmet needs for equipment, services or home improvements that will improve their quality of life and increase independent functioning.

**Service Delivery Area and Method Used to** TABI Mini-Grants are available statewide to individuals with unmet needs.

**Allocate Resources:** The TABI Mini-Grant Program serves those individuals who are receiving case management services through either the Senior and Disabilities TABI Case Management Program grantee, or through the new Medicaid case management services through community providers.

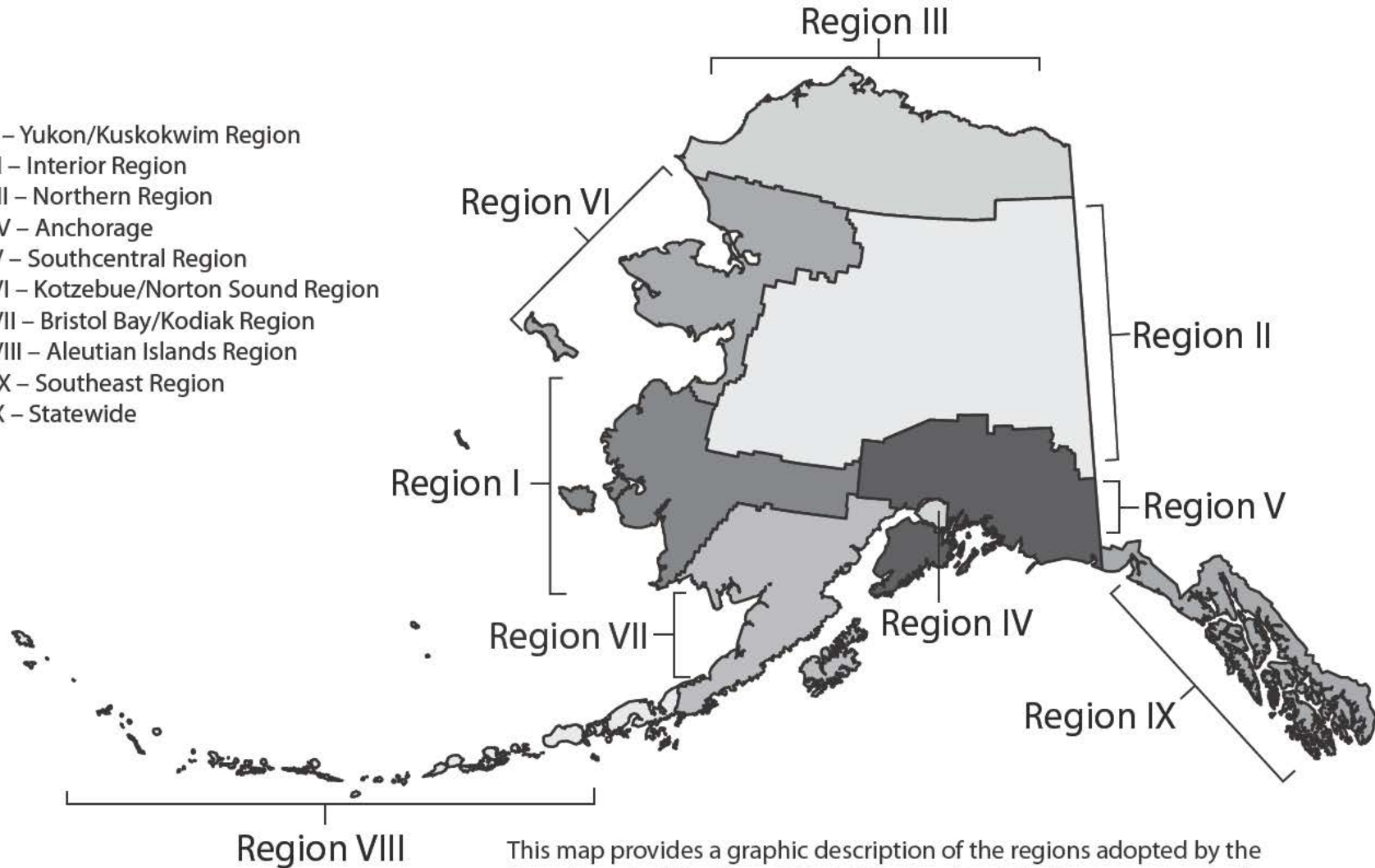
